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DRIVER IN HOLIDAY ACCIDENT IS FINED

Found Guilty Of Reckless Operation But Most Of Fine Is Remitted By Court

Henry Cox of Cold Springs, N. Y., driver of the automobile that figured in the accident with a car driven by Miss Alice Ethier of Spencer, Mass., on Fourth of July afternoon, was represented by Attorney William J. Shea when he appeared in the police court last night.

Judge Thomas Danner presided as usual. Miss Ethier, who had been taken to the hospital after the accident, their being indications that there may be a civil suit as the result of the accident.

Attorney Shea and Prosecutor Leamer agreed to the facts of the case. It being a question of the man being guilty of reckless driving or a violation of the rules of the road. The prosecutor summed up the case from the report of Officer Walter Casella which he pointed out that the car driven by Cox had passed a "stop" sign at Middle turnpike east, and Summit street. The rate of speed was given as being between 30 and 35 miles an hour. When they came together both cars were badly damaged and the marks indicated that the Cox car had struck the Ethier car at the rear left side. Eight went to the hospital.

Shea pointed out that there was a car parked on the north side of the road which may have cut off the view of the sign and that Mr. Cox was a stranger to the town.

He told the court that Mr. Cox was a post commander of the F.V.W. in Cold Springs, N. Y., and that he had been to Massachusetts to take relatives to his home in Cold Springs as his sister was in poor health. It was also told the court that just about the time that the accident took place his sister had died. Since the time of the accident and the death of his sister Mr. Cox's wife has suffered a breakdown and that Cox is now without work. His occupation is that of a carpenter and he has a small family.

The court in passing sentence said that it was a case of reckless driving in the court's opinion, and that more care should be taken. He found the accused guilty of reckless driving and imposed a fine of \$25 with costs. He ordered that \$15 of the fine be remitted and the payment of the fine and costs, \$25.00, was made by a friend of Mr. Cox who drove him to Manchester from Cold Springs to be present in court last night. Miss Ethier came from Spencer to attend the trial and was wearing a patch on her forehead.

Stanley Savlonis, 18, of Ash street, pleaded not guilty to operating a motor vehicle without registration. Probation Officer Conran told the court that the young man was working on a 1925 car that he was having one of the wheels replaced in the yard and drove it but a few feet on South Main street.
