

HUGHES ROARS OVER FINISH LINE

ITALY ASSERTS ARYAN QUALITY; JEWS ANXIOUS

Proclaims Doctrine of Racial Superiority Like Nazis' But Denies Intending To Adopt German Policy.

Rome, July 14.—(AP)—A ten-point Fascist doctrine of race similar in many respects to Nazi Germany's Aryanism was published today under the auspices of the ministry of popular culture. The doctrine proclaimed Aryan supremacy and affirmed the Italian's right to call itself Aryan. It declared that Jews "do not belong to the Italian race."

"Jews represent only a population which never has been assimilated in Italy because they are composed of non-European racial elements absolutely different from the elements from which Italians originated," the declaration said.

"The present-day Italian population is Aryan," it continued, "is predominantly of Aryan origin and its civilization is Aryan."

"It is the Italian's duty to defend themselves frankly and resolutely against the introduction into Italy of German racial theories as they now exist or the assertion that Italians and Scandinavians are the same thing."

"It means only to point out to Italians the physical and above all psychological model of the human race which, because of its purely European character, is separated completely from all non-European races."

To strengthen Aryanism, Fascist leaders regarded the declaration as further evidence of the Fascist regime's desire to reinforce the political bonds of the Rome-Berlin axis with cultural ties.

Coming soon after the recent anti-Semitic outbreaks in Berlin, the statement provoked fresh anxiety among Italian Jews, who fear the growth of Fascist anti-Semitism of the Nazi type.

In an official declaration of policy five months ago, the Fascist regime declared there was no anti-Semitism in Italy and that Jews would not be permitted to acquire a position in Italy disproportionate to their numbers.

Italy has only about 47,000 Jews in a population of 46,000,000, an Italian official revealed yesterday, and, therefore, "has no Jewish problem."

Government officials early this year acknowledged an anti-Semitic movement existed but declare it was checked only against "international antisemitism" and not against Jews in Italy.

Premier Mussolini publicly disavowed anti-Semitism in the early days of Fascism and the Fascist regime has undertaken no moves against Jews except to warn them not to associate with international Jewish movements, including Zionism.

SEE NEW CIVIL AIR BOARD AS MODEL AGENCY

Division of Legislative and Administrative Responsibility Believed To Meet Views of Supreme Court.

Washington, July 14.—(AP)—Members of the new Civil Aeronautics Authority gathered today to organizers what some administration advisers call a model regulatory agency. In a sense, it is President Roosevelt's long-delayed reply to a Supreme Court decision which blocked any White House control over the executive functions of independent agencies.

The new body differs from similar agencies, such as the Interstate Commerce Commission, in that it consists of an independent administrator as well as a commission.

This administrator is responsible to the President and exercises all of the agency's executive authority. The board is responsible to Congress.

GASOLINE BID MUDDLE SOLVED BY SELECTMEN

Rescind Previous Action And Then Award Contract To Boland Oil Company, Has Been A Puzzle For The Board of Selectmen.

At a special meeting of the Board of Selectmen held last night, the

market at the time the Boland bid was accepted. The entire gasoline business has been in a muddle since last week when three local oil companies, acting on a request to submit bids for the supplying of the town's needs, turned in sealed bids. Background of the recent muddle is that the town's oil company, the Boland Oil Company, had been awarded a contract for the supplying of the town's needs for several years, but under direct award method, the Boland Oil Company, conceded to be a two low bidder on a differential basis among the offers previously submitted, but whose bid will was above the price at which the town had been buying gas in the open market.
