S. EMIL JOHNSON DEAD; 26 YEARS ASSESSOR HERE

Cerebral Hemorrhage Claims One Of Town's Best Known Residents; Funeral To Be Held At 3 Sunday.

S. Emil Johnson, 76, of 19 Johnson Terrace, building contractor and for 26 years a member of the town Board of Assessors, died early this morning at the Memorial hospital following a long illness. He was one of Manchester's best known citizens. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage March 7, this year, while on jury duty at the Hartford County courthouse and was admitted to the hospital July 6 after another similar attack. He was born March 18, 1862 in Aker, Sweden. He learned the carpenter's trade, while in Forestville, Me., in 1882 and settled in Forestville, Conn., where he lived for five years. While in Forestville he worked at his trade and when the Swedish Lutheran church in that town was built he came here upon the invitation of the pastor and worked on the church building and assisted in the installation of the church pews.

Married 48 Years
Mr. Johnson moved to Manchester in 1887 and three years later, in 1890, married Miss Emma Cecelia Anderson, officiating clergyman at the wedding was Rev. Augustus G. Wilson, pastor of the Swedish Lutheran church. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson both joined the church at the same time.

For many years Mr. Johnson was employed by George Barber, building contractor, and during his active years in the trade he assisted in the construction of many of the Chaney homes and the town's prominent buildings. He also learned the art of wood carving, and when the new Emmanuel Lutheran church was built, he constructed and carved the beautiful oak pulpit. For many years he followed the building contracting business and in 1918 he was appointed building inspector of the town and served four years in that office. He was elected a member of the

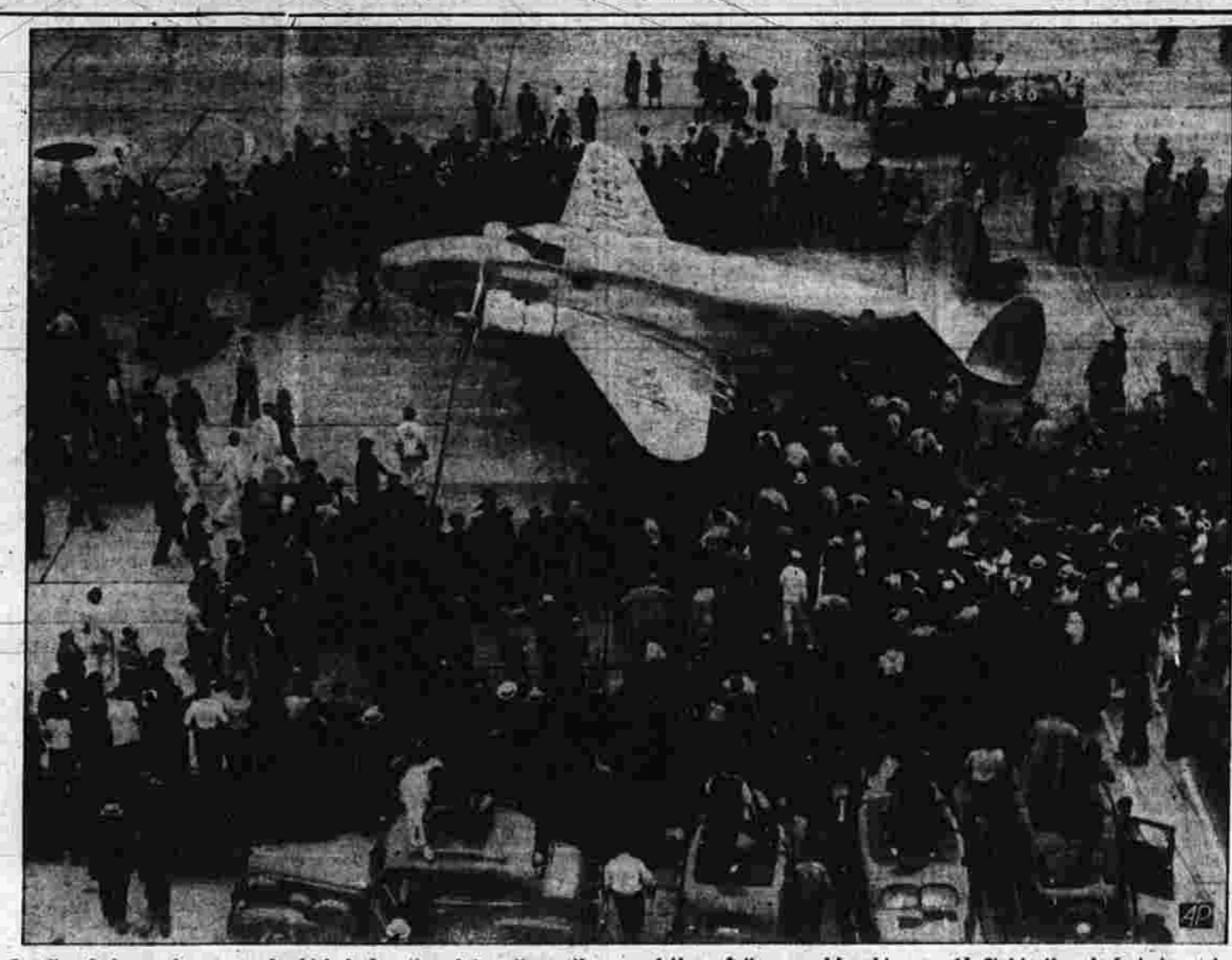

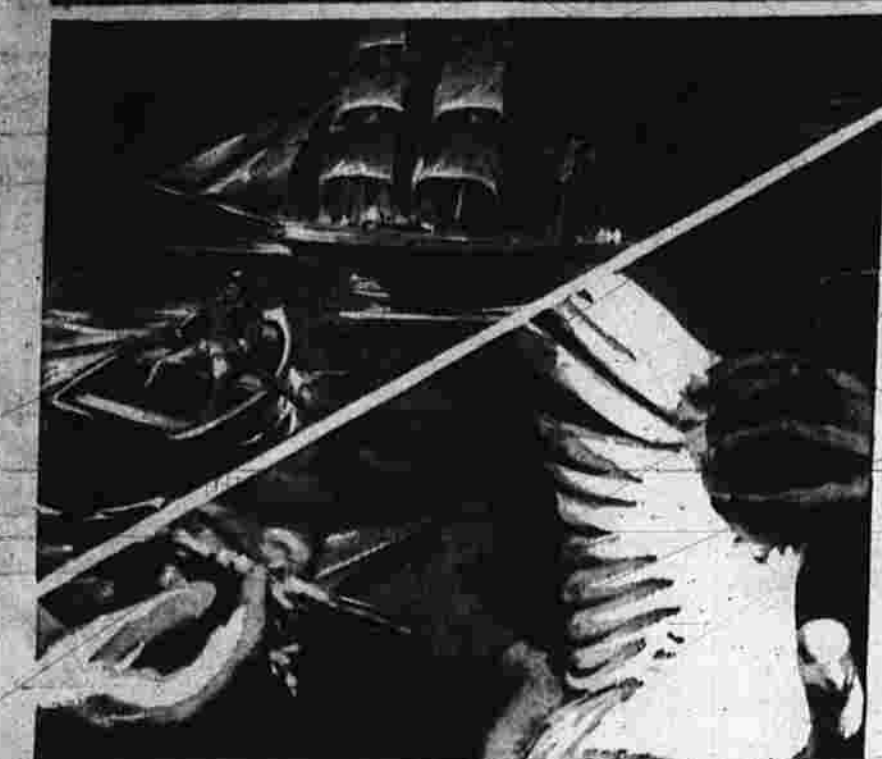

The Romance of News! — by THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The Story Behind a 90th Anniversary



Fixed bayonets sweep Nippon's flag into a shell-smashed Chinese village. . . Lights burn at 10 Downing Street while Britain grapples with an empire crisis. . . An heirless clop with a hog caller. . . The Department of Justice uncovers a new nest of international spies. . . and even as these events occur detailed accounts stream over 285,000 miles of Associated Press news wires to 1,400 member newspapers all over the nation.

Do you know the 90-year story of this AP?

On a black November night in 1811 young Samuel Toppliff showed his rowboat into Boston harbor to learn the cause of distant cannonading. His perilous trip—guns of a British fleet were sounding the prelude to the War of 1812—was the first systematic attempt to gather news.

Out of that plucky beginning grew the first important news gathering organization, founded in 1848. It was called The Associated Press. The year 1938 marked the 90th anniversary of that name in newspaperdom.

In Toppliff's time there were few daily newspapers; they printed little news because they had no way of obtaining it. There were no big cities, no telegraph, telephone, oceanic cable, wireless.

As the country grew, mechanical means for transmitting news developed apace with a mounting demand for public information. The years, however, showed one potential flaw in the early news gathering system. It was a proprietary commercial organization and there was the danger that private interests might prostitute the news for personal profit.

One far-sighted publisher, Victor Lawson of the Chicago Daily News, recognized this peril. Staunch believer in the need for an uncontrolled press, he led what has become known as "The Revolution of 1893." This ended the old private news monopoly. In its place, Lawson and his allies set up the new Associated Press—first and only world-wide, non-profit, cooperative news gathering organization, dedicated to ideals of accuracy and impartiality.

In 1900 AP's maximum news output was 15,000 words a day to 612 members. Today 1,400 member newspapers are linked in a 285,000 mile wire network which transmits 200,000 words every 24 hours.

Once the AP staff was a mere handful. Today 100,000 men and women, directly or indirectly, help gather and transmit each day's report. Once \$10,000 covered AP's budget. Today it exceeds \$10,000,000 annually, yet the organization makes no profits, declares no dividends.

In every country, in every state, news bureaus operate. In virtually every hamlet on the globe there is a correspondent. Bureau staffs range from a single reporter to as many as 500 employees.

All this is a far cry from Toppliff's primitive day. Not the least of today's wonders is Wirephoto, which transmits AP pictures from coast to coast with the speed of light.

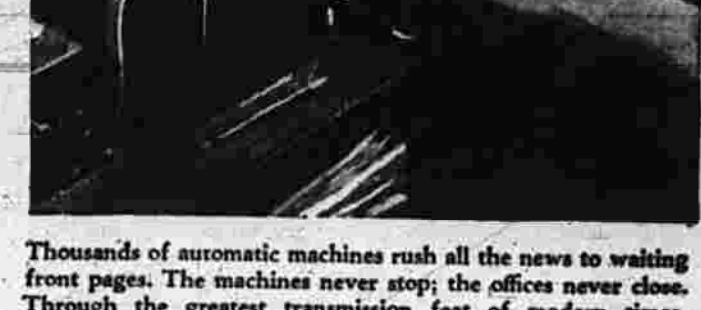
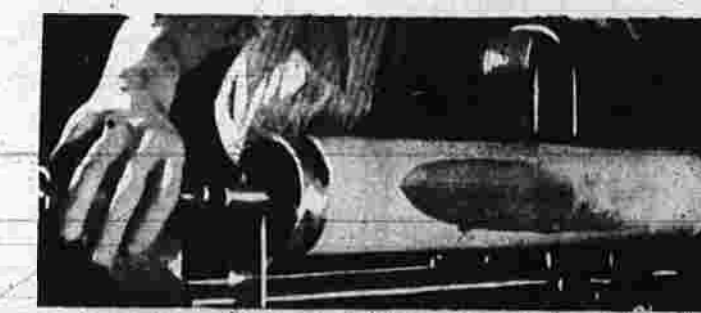

OPPOSITION GROWS AGAINST \$75 LEVY

Proposed Sewer Connection Fee Attacked; Cost Called Four Times Too High.

Opposed to the reported move originated by the town's water department under which a \$75 fee would be charged for all sewer connections from main to property lines in the future, a group of Manchester Green residents have announced that they will appear at a public hearing scheduled for Monday night in the Municipal building, and will vigorously oppose the enactment of any rule for the laying of the \$75 fee, which they regard as excessive. The \$75 cost would not be in a house with the sewer line, but is only the contemplated charge for laying a lateral from a sewer main to the property line. An extra cost accrues to a homeowner for the extension of the lateral from the property line to his house, resulting in an average cost for a house back some \$25 from property line, of almost \$100, on the proposed fee.

This sum has been called excessive, and one local builder has announced that he stands ready to post a bond, and take all of the lateral connection business from main to property line at "from \$15 to \$20 per connection, and will be making 100 per cent profit in most cases."

According to Selectman David Chambers, the \$75 figure is one he considers fair, although he could not state if the town will make a profit on the fee. Chambers said that in some cases, rock had to be hauled through, and pavement dug up in order to make a connection, and that in the course of a year, the \$75 per connection average would not be found too high.

"If the town wants to attract people here, it should go easy with the making of any profit on building operations such as utilities connections," said W. Harry England, Manchester Green merchant and builder. "There is no need for any such cost of the installing, in most cases, of less than 50 feet of pipe," England said. He pointed out that the cost for running pipe from the property line to the main should be but little above the cost of making the run from the line to a house. "And this," England said, "can be done for about one quarter the amount the town wants to get."

Not only property owners at the Green, but those in the other several parts of the town served by utility lines are resolved against the making of the \$75 charge. Persons whose property adjoins the line of Bigelow brook, and who have been ordered to connect with sewer lines instead of dumping refuse into the brook, will be hard hit, according to
