CORRIGAN WILL SAIL FOR HOME ON MANHATTAN

Books Passage On American Liner As Five Ship Concerns Seek To Carry Him; Spurns Night Club Lures.

Dublin, July 21.—(AP)—The "Pride of the Corrigan," as the Irish call the young American flying hero, booked passage home today on the American liner Manhattan, sailing next week.

"I am still battling with the lack of answering hundreds of cablegrams people keep sending me," the aviator said.

"I am still holding out offers of contracts from Hollywood until I get home, but it's not on night club appearances, I'm no crooner."

Asked about the possibility of a night across the United States at the Golden Gate Exposition, he said, "My uncle must have fixed that up—depends on United States authorities whether they release my plane. I am very doubtful if they will."

Corrigan is overjoyed about what the home folk may do to him. He has been getting along nicely in Ireland, chatting informally with the highest of the land, but the thought of a big welcome in America is something else again.

"I certainly hope they have stopped being Corrigans and what I get back to America," is how he puts it.

"A hero by mistake"—that "compas error" that took him to Ireland instead of California, you know—Corrigan apparently is willing to call off the rest of the show.

Today he turned down a five-year film contract with a guarantee of three pictures yearly—although yesterday he thought he might be interested in the movie—and he refused a \$20,000 vaudeville contract.

The main problem decided today was what ship to take home. The State Maritime Commission, even offered its steamship Leigh for the trip.

11 FIREMEN HURT IN ANSONIA BLAZE

Police Estimate Damage At \$50,000—Big Rooming House Partly Destroyed.

Ansonia, July 21.—(AP)—Fire swept through a section of the city's "red" district today, sending three persons to the hospital and injuring eleven firemen, some seriously.

PICK-A-BACK PLANE CROSSES ATLANTIC; LANDS IN CANADA

First Flight of Its Kind Proves Successful; To Continue To New York, Then Fly Back To Europe.

Montreal, July 21.—(Canadian Press)—The first trans-Atlantic flight of a pick-a-back plane ended here at 10:30 a. m. e. s. t. today when the British seaplane Mercury alighted on the St. Lawrence river.

Completing the first of eight scheduled experimental flights to Canada this year, the silver seaplane cut her engine and coasted into an area of the harbor marked "No Boats."

A flag decked yacht steamed out into the river to greet Captain Donald Bennett and Wireless Operator Albert Coster, the Mercury's crew.

The Mercury was to unload part of her 1,000-pound cargo here and then take off for New York after replenishing her fuel tanks.

Throughout the night and early today the Mercury, having been freed by the Mass. in military, was taken to the St. Hubert Airport near here.

Only once, at 8 p. m. e. s. t. last night, when approaching midocean, did Coster report bad weather. Then he said the plane was flying through "continuous rains" for "a turbulent sea" four hours later it was flying into clear weather at 140 miles an hour.

This morning Coster radioed the Mercury might halt at Quebec, but Bennett later decided to continue to Montreal.

FRANCE SHOWS GEORGE SOME OF HER TEETH

Parades New War Machines Not Heretofore Displayed In Review Of 50,000 Men; 6 Inch Guns, Big Tanks.

Paris, July 21.—(AP)—France paraded her newest war machines for the first time today to demonstrate to King George VI of Britain the strength she can lend to their common cause.

The spectacle, a highlight of King George's state visit to France, attracted to the atom bomb that unite Europe's great democratic powers.

101 Gun Salute When King George reached Versailles a 101-gun salute was started. It continued throughout the parade on salvo each minute.

The King and President Lebrun were taken from a bullet-proof automobile flanked by a mounted guard of Spanish, Queen Elizabeth and Mme. Lebrun arrived by special train and were accompanied by mounted Spahis to the Versailles chateau to attend a sumptuous luncheon in the Hall of Mirrors, where the Versailles treaty ending the World War was signed.

Vast throngs lining the route of the parade saw implements of war the French army never before had shown publicly. The watched columns of trucks swiftly, pulling six-inch guns on pneumatic rubber tires and mechanized three-inch anti-aircraft guns with trucks for ammunition.

HAYES AND OTHERS IN WATERBURY CASE PLEAD NOT GUILTY

10 Killed in Baltimore Tunnel Blast

Courtroom Crowded As 23 Defendants Are Called In Superior Court; Judge Continues Cases Until The September Term; Allocates For Speed In Proceedings

Waterbury, July 21.—(AP)—Lieut.-Gov. Frank Hayes and 22 other defendants accused of conspiring to "cheat and defraud" this city of over a million dollars during his eight-year regime as mayor pleaded innocent today in Superior Court.

Before a courtroom packed with spectators, Mayor Hayes, long a dominant figure in Democratic politics in Connecticut, answered with a firm "not guilty" to the accusations based on an extraordinary Grand Jury's investigation of his administration.

All Called To Bench Former City Controller Daniel J. Leahy, Carl D. Olsen, ex-mayor Waterbury banker, Alderman Thomas P. Kelly—all accused by the Grand Jury of being Hayes' principal aides in a "powerful, ruthless and corrupt" regime responsible for looting the city treasury—were called to the bench with the mayor, as was his superintendent of streets, Thomas J. Fleming.

Superior Court Judge Ernest A. Inglis continued the case until the September term of court, turning down a plea by special state attorney Hugh M. Alcorn to set a definite trial date.

Judge Inglis disclosed that under present arrangements another judge would preside over the trial. Court attaches said Judge Ernest A. Shippson had been assigned here for the full term when the trial is scheduled to start.

Harry E. Mackenzie, Fairfield political leader and one of the 24 of the 27 accused summoned to appear in court this morning, was absent and Alcorn informed the court he was ill in a hospital. Aides of the special prosecutor later said the defendant would be indefinitely delayed.

After all the defendants had entered their pleas—a formality which took only 12 minutes—Alcorn tried in vain to forestall the filing of a brief of fact by the court as a basis for an appeal to the Connecticut Supreme Court of Errors from a decision denying the defendants access to the Grand Jury minutes.

Alcorn protested that defense counsel were trying to delay the trial by the appeal, but Judge Inglis said that he had "no right to preclude any defendant from his right to appeal to the Supreme Court and would make the necessary ruling of fact."

Although Storm Is General Deluge His Different Sections Of Town On Different Days.
