

HOT PRIMARY BATTLES LOOM FOR CONGRESS
Rules Committee Members Meeting Stiff Opposition From Candidates Supporting President's Program.

Washington, July 27.—(AP)—Electoral House members, whose campaigns generally have been overshadowed by senatorial races, are in the midst of some hot primary battles of their own.

A number of anti-administration Democrats, including a few members of the House rules committee, are encountering stiff opposition from pro-Roosevelt candidates. Some of the President's ardent supporters also are having their troubles.

Labor's Nonpartisan league, political arm of the C. I. O., is leading the assault against the rules committee bloc that held up action on wage-hour legislation for months.

The league included six rules committee Democrats in a blacklist of House members whose records, it said, called for opposition from labor.

Two of the blacklistees, Carolan and Dies of Texas, already have obtained renomination. A third, Lewis, of Colorado, was chosen by a district Democratic assembly for renomination without opposition.

Two others, Smith of Virginia and Cox of Georgia, are under fire from candidates who are making an issue of administration support. The sixth, driver of Arkansas, is opposed by State Senator E. E. Smith in his district.

Cox is opposed by W. Jewel Crow, who is campaigning as a supporter of New Deal objectives. Cox has voted against the administration on several occasions, and was one of the leaders in the fight against the wage-hour bill.

Assailed as Reactionary.

Smith, who has a similar record, is having his first primary opposition since he entered Congress in 1915. William E. Doherty, Jr., son of the former ambassador to Germany, is running on a 100 per cent New Deal platform, and has assailed Smith as reactionary. Smith has

CARNEGIE HEIRESS BRIDE OF LAWYER
Groom And Many Guests Wear Kilts At Ceremony Held In Scotch Cathedral.

Dornoch, Scotland, July 27.—(AP)—Kilted highlanders, English peers and New York businessmen mingled at the picturesque wedding today of the granddaughter of the late Andrew Carnegie, and heir to part of his large fortune, to an Edinburgh lawyer.

Miss Louise Miller of New York, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rowell Miller, and J. F. Gordon Thomson, son of the late William Thomson, well-known Edinburgh businessman, were married in Dornoch cathedral in his quaint little Scottish town.

The bridegroom is 40 years old.

The bridegroom wore formal morning attire, but many of the guests wore kilts.

The cathedral held only 400 persons, but after the ceremony 1,000 guests attended the wedding luncheon in the vast Skibo castle, retreat of the Carnegie clan, which was built by American dollars.

Figures Play As Party Eastern.

Scottish pipers played while the bride party entered the castle. Thousands of spectators came to Dornoch to see the pageantry.

When Miss Miller arrived at the cathedral with her father, the organist played the wedding march from Lohengrin. She wore an ivory satin gown with lace sleeves and a long train. Her bouquet was of aurantia lilies and ferns.

Invitations were sent to the police lines held back crowds while the invitations of social leaders of Scotland, England and New York were carefully scrutinized as they entered the church.

The bridesmaids were dressed in deep shawl pink satin crepe gowns with puff sleeves. They wore leg-horn hats trimmed with velvet ribbon to match their dresses. They carried bouquets of sweet peas.

JAPANESE NAVAL UNITS PRESS UP YANGTZE RIVER
Concentrate Efforts On Opening River Channel As Soon As Possible And Do Not Attempt To Land Troops.

Shanghai, July 27.—(AP)—Japanese naval units pressed relentlessly up the Yangtze river today after helping powerfully in the occupation of Kukiang, gateway to Hankow.

Officers said "many" ships had progressed beyond Kukiang, just 180 miles below the provincial Chinese capital. All efforts were concentrated on opening the river channel as quickly as possible and no attempts were made to land troops.

Chinese troops routed from Kukiang yesterday were said to be retreating still without attempting a stand.

Japanese spokesmen believed the Chinese would flee as far as Nanchang, 90 miles south of Kukiang, before turning westward.

These sources added that a further checkup of foreign properties in Kukiang revealed far greater damage than had been indicated.

Death Leap Ends 11 Hours of Indecision on 17th-Floor Hotel Lodge



The broken body of John Ward, 26, hurtles off the steel and glass marquee of the Hotel Gotham, 55th Street and Fifth avenue, New York city, to the pavement below the thousands who saw Ward leap from the 17th floor lodge of the hotel, rush to safety in the lobby. This remarkable picture was taken the instant that Ward's body struck the marquee and bounced off amid a shower of glass as he ended his eleven hours of indecision on his perch on the 24-inch ledge just as a huge cargo net being hoisted by rescuers workers along the face of the hotel had reached the 14th floor. All attempts to persuade him to come back into the room after he had climbed on the ledge in the forenoon following a spat with his sister were met by threats to let anyone dared come out to pull him back.

SPANISH LOYALISTS REACH GANDESA; FALL IS IMMINENT
John Ward Waits Nearly 11 Hours on Hotel Gotham Ledge Before He Jumps.

New York, July 27.—(AP)—Those who saw John Ward go to his death wondered today what queer obstinacy and indecision kept him waiting, perched on the ledge for nearly 11 hours on a narrow ledge 17 stories above the street before he jumped.

"To all that time he had kept thousands waiting in a morbid suspense, thousands who watched him from the street, from bus stops, from windows and from the tops of buildings—a tiny bit of a man in a white shirt, who drank whisky, who wore a white shirt, who through the long summer afternoon while police called him in vain at attempts to dislodge him from thoughts of suicide."

With the coming of night he had become a pale blur as darkness crept up the limestone walls of the Hotel Gotham, Fifth avenue and 55th street, a blur sometimes lost in the gloom, sometimes faintly picked out by the spark of a freshly relit cigarette.

In the beginning, fear had chilled the hearts of all who saw his plight. But fear had passed and speculative talk was exchanged in the lobby, arguments, wisecracks.

Drew Attention For Day.

Obeying his wife, a 26-year-old unemployed bank teller of Southampton, Long Island, became the subject of a long story for a day in the city for a day.

And so a kind of perverted holiday spirit grew upon the crowd that watched him teetering on his dizzy perch. There were ovations of criticism. He wouldn't jump. Not by a long shot. Amateur psychologists debated the point. All agreed he would jump.

GERMANS REGARD AS TRIUMPH SELECTION OF BRITISH ADVISOR

Believe Degree of Sovereignty Yielded By Czechoslovakia in Accepting Viscount Runciman As Mediator Even Though His Efforts Termed Unofficial.

Berlin, July 27.—(AP)—Official circles regarded as a clear triumph for Germany today the appointment of a British advisor in the Czechoslovak minority dispute.

First, in German eyes, Czechoslovakia yielded a degree of her sovereignty by accepting the English Viscount Runciman as mediator. His mediatory efforts were to be unofficial.

Second, Britain ignored the League of Nations and other international institutions to take direct action in efforts to safeguard peace; hence the internationalism which Germany ridicules received another blow.

"No really sovereign state would accept an advisor such as Viscount Runciman," one prominent Nazi editor said.

His comment was typical of the German view.

"Can you imagine Switzerland, for instance, standing for such an advisor?" he continued. "This shows once again what a poor makeshift the Versailles treaty was. 'It (the world war treaty) created a state (Czechoslovakia) which can be kept alive only with the aid of its sponsors."

"When there is trouble these sponsors come running."

It is taken for granted here that the Czechoslovak government can now be persuaded more easily to accept the program of autonomy sponsored by Konrad Henlein, the Sudeten German party leader, on behalf of the tiny republic's 3,500,000 Sudeten German minority population.

German spokesmen refer with glee to the British effort toward direct mediation, seeing therein evidence that Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain found by experience that Chancellor Hitler's way of dealing nation to nation is better than international conferences. The League of Nations or the Hague Court for International Settlements.

The press generally was quick to point to the appointment as recognition by Britain and France that the Sudeten problem constitutes a threat to peace.

It was swift diplomatic action by the two closely allied Democracies that prevented possible conflict after two Czech Nazis were slain by Czechoslovak border guards at a frontier May 2. Evening frontier troop movements gave rise to a

CONN. MAN SEES 'MAGIC KEY' IN HOUSING PLAN
T. F. Cooney Of New Haven Has Scheme To Save The Country 17 Billions In 5 Years, Give Jobs To All.

New Haven, July 27.—(AP)—T. F. Cooney, retired New Haven real estate man, has figured out a plan which he believes would solve "the tragic problem of unemployment" by the government since the Wall Street crash of 1929 sent the nation into the economic doldrums.

Cooney's program—which he calls the "magic key" that will open the door to the treasure house of prosperity—has been submitted to Connecticut's senior senator, Augustine Lonergan, who in turn has passed it on for consideration by President Roosevelt and other administration officials.

Housing Program.

"In brief, the plan calls for a concentrated attack on the nation's housing problem, and recommends these three methods to stimulate private building:

1. An outright government subsidy equal to 10 per cent of the cost of construction of each new home.

2. Municipal tax exemption on new homes for five years.

3. Comparative concessions by material dealers and labor.

Cooney estimates that a housing program would create 10,380,000 new jobs—enough to absorb virtually all the nation's unemployed—and in solving the unemployment problem would cost the government only ten per cent of the amount now spent for relief.
