INSURGENTS OPEN DAMS IN EFFORT TO HALT ADVANCE

Spanish Government Insists Communications Lines Still Open Despite Drastic Action Taken By Rebels.

Hendaye, France, (at the Spanish frontier) July 29.—(AP)—Spanish insurgents opened all dams today in an attempt to sweep away bridges behind the government's advancing armies on the Catalan front.

An insurgent news agency report from St. Jean-de-Luz, France, said Generalissimo Francisco Franco's high command had released a swirling nine-foot-high wave of flood-water from dams high in the Pyrenees mountains.

It said the torrents "made the river impassable" in 30 minutes. Government officials admitted the Ebro had risen noticeably, presumably from the opening of dams. They denied, however, that their bridges had been swept away and insisted their communication lines were intact.

Insurgents said they had breached all the dams of the No-guera-Pallaresa river and the Negro hydro-electric system above the government's feeder lines across the Ebro.

The waters, swollen by recent rains, were said by the insurgents to have carried away all that was left of the position bridges after three days of air bombardment.

Just before the dams were opened, the insurgents said, Flying Officer Heruello Guiter was sent to take aerial photographs of the flood's effects.

ARGUMENTS MADE IN HARLAN TRIAL

Defense Attorney Declares If Doubt Exists As To Guilt Jurors Must Free Accused

London, Ky., July 29.—(AP)—A hill country jury trial weighed today a defense lawyer's declaration that "it takes more than a bullet hole in a hackery tree to prove a conspiracy" and his reminder that "the burden of proof rests with the prosecution."

The lawyer, H. T. Tye, was the last of four defense attorneys who stopped before the jurors, one after another, to declare the government had failed to prove a conspiracy existed.

The defendants—56 Harlan county coal operators, former peace officers and coal corporations—are charged with conspiracy to violate the Wagner act through opposition to organization efforts of the United Mine Workers of America.

Defense Counsel Today.

Forney Johnson of Birmingham, Ala., and former Federal Judge Charles I. Dawson of Louisville were selected to deliver the defense today. They will be followed by Brian "Bert" Cline, chief of the prosecution staff, and Henry Schweinhart, who will conclude the jury might receive the case Saturday, but Federal Judge H. Church Ford said he would not accept a verdict on Sunday and a decision would be delayed until Monday.

The bulk of the defense arguments were directed at the seven-hour government summation Wednesday by Wally K. Hopkins, assistant U. S. attorney-general.

"This top-heavy wage structure casts a shadow over the entire building industry. It discourages honest contractors in their efforts to maintain payrolls, and it is responsible for excessive cost of construction work."

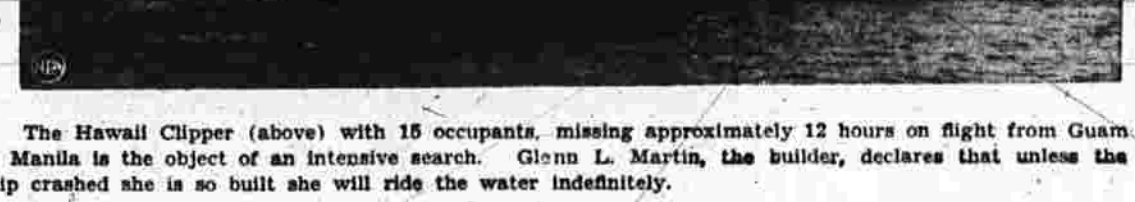

MILITARY FIRE INTO RIOTOUS BURMA CROWDS

Authorities Authorize Soldiers And Police To Shoot Persons Caught Attacking Others Or Found Looting.

Rangoon, Burma, July 29.—(AP)—British military police fired into riotous crowds of Burmese Buddhists and Indian Moslems today for the first time in four days of fighting in which 47 persons have been killed and more than 300 wounded.

After renewed fighting through the streets today, authorities posted a public notice authorizing soldiers and police to shoot any person attacking another or found looting.

Troops Patrol Streets.

Chinese dispatches from Nanchang said Japanese raiders forced 3,000 refugees in the Lushan mountain south of Kiating and dropped bombs on them, killing "uncounted hundreds."

A Japanese naval communiqué charged that Chinese planes bombed the Japanese hospital ship Tachibana Maru near Kiating although she flew a Red Cross flag. No mention was made of the damage.

Another report asserted Japanese soldiers raised the Japanese flag on the Kiating-Nanchang area, and destroyed many houses.

JAPS BOMBARD REFUGEES, KILL MANY HUNDRED

Planes Spy Out 3,000 In The Hills, Drop Bombs; Chinese Claim Success; Marines Bar Shanghai Zone.

Shanghai, July 29.—(AP)—Japanese planes were accused in Chinese reports today of causing hundreds of civilian deaths during persistent bombardments of the middle Yangtze river region.

Chinese dispatches from Nanchang said Japanese raiders forced 3,000 refugees in the Lushan mountain south of Kiating and dropped bombs on them, killing "uncounted hundreds."

STATE'S RIGHTS BATTLE LOOMS OVER RULING

New Haven Road Counsel Indicates Court Fight on Action Of Massachusetts Public Utilities Board.

Boston, July 29.—(AP)—Massachusetts' order that the New Haven railroad reopen nine stations it closed on direction of a Federal district court today threatened a fight over state's rights.

Counsel for the road has indicated it would fight in court a Public Utilities Commission in Massachusetts, which ordered the reopening of nine stations.

POPE IN ATTACK RAPS RACIALISM

The Pope also was quoted as denouncing Catholic Action, saying that someone had said "between Catholic Action and the Fascist party there exists an incurable doctrinal divergence."

His concluding remarks were reported as:

"Who injures Catholic Action, injures the Pope and who injures the Pope, injures the Church."

Fascists Push Campaign.

The Pontiff's remarks, in which he attacked racialism and exaggerated nationalism, were made during a speech today in the Vatican city, which he said was pushing a vigorous campaign in favor of its race.

INACTION AROUSES BITTER COMMENT

Laborite Members Criticize Report Destroyer Took No Action When Ship Hit.

San Francisco, July 29.—(AP)—The Hawaii Clipper with 15 occupants, missing approximately 12 hours on flight from Guam to Manila, was made the object of an intensive search by air, sea and underwater craft today.

Seven planes, eight navy ships, six submarines and an army transport were thrown into the hunt for the \$450,000 (Martin) flying boat which literally vanished from the air midway on her 1,600 mile flight over the Pacific ocean.

Fears for the safety of the six passengers and crew of the plane increased as the hours dragged by without word since the last message received from the Clipper's radio at 11:09 P.M. July 28, Thursday, eastern standard time.

The army transport Meigs, nearest ship to the Clipper's last position, was within the area where it was believed the Clipper was forced down.

Searchlights Swept Area.

Shortly after 10 p.m. (9 a.m. eastern standard time) she began sweeping the sea with powerful searchlights. Rockets were sent up every 15 minutes. Flares were lit hourly. Her radio continually sent the Clipper's call letters. Rain made visibility poor and a 15 mile an hour wind made it likely the Clipper had landed safely, was blown far from the position.

No reason was advanced as to why she might have been forced down, but it was pointed out that if she made a safe landing, a count float on the Pacific ocean as well as any boat.

Ordered To Search Area.

The army transport Meigs, only 87 miles away from the Clipper's last reported position, was immediately ordered to search the area. The Navy tender Penguin was sent from Guam at 9:20 p. m. Guam time (8:50 a. m. Eastern Standard Time), carrying a Pan American rediron and an airway mechanic. She was expected to reach the scene Monday.

Seven Army planes were ordered to take off from Ceylon on Manila Bay at dawn Saturday for Legaspi, on the southwest coast of Luzon island, and to search for the Clipper.

From Legaspi the two amphibians and five bombers were directed to search a widespread area for a trace of the flying boat. The planes, each with a flying range of 1,100 miles, were instructed to sweep over a path 70 miles wide, flying ten miles apart.

Three Destroyers Available.

Navy officials said three destroyers were available in Manila Bay—the Edsall, John D. Ford and the Stewart—to be thrown into the search if requested.

Several hours after the Clipper's usual landing time—between 2:30 and 3:30 p. m. (1:30 and 2:30 a. m. Eastern Standard Time)—American officials insisted they were not "worried."

At 4:30 p. m. one official, although unable to explain the Clipper's failure to report by radio at the regularly scheduled intervals, said:

"She had to go around the storm and back towards us, therefore we did not expect her until 10:00 or 11:00 o'clock tonight (8 a. m. local time) now we consider her only a half hour late. But that is not unusual."

600 Miles From Nearest Land.

The last position given by the flying boat was 12 1/2 north latitude, 150.60 east longitude. This is approximately 400 miles east of the Philippine island of Samar.

BERT COLLYER DIES, NOTED HORSE EXPERT
 Was Publisher of "Collyer's Eye" and A Race Handicapper; Once Reporter.

Chicago, July 28.—(AP)—Bert E. Collyer, 61, nationally known horse race handicapper and publisher of "Collyer's Eye," a sports and information paper, died last night.

Born in Durham, Ont., Canada, Collyer ran a print shop in his youth before going to Alaska during the gold rush of '98. It was there he gained recognition as a newspaperman for his accurate dispatch on the Chilkoot Pass avalanche April 4, 1898. His papers were killed at the pass and many injured.

Employed by Hearst newspapers on the Pacific coast, he subsequently was transferred to the Chicago American and named turf editor. In 1914, he established his publication, "Collyer's Eye," in Chicago. He disclosed the Chicago Black Sox scandal in 1919. In addition to winning recognition as a gentleman rider, Collyer had owned many horses, both jumpers and flat runners.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Frances L. Collyer; a brother, Lally Collyer, of Columbia, Ky.; and two sisters, Mrs. Eva of Burlington, Ontario, and Mrs. Mildred Hendy of Goshen, Ontario. Burial will be in Goshen.
