### INSURGENTS HALT GOVERNMENT PUSH ALONG EBRO RIVER

#### Rebels Hastily Withdraw Troops From Valencia Front To Stop Offensive In Catalonian Terrain.

Hendaye, France (At the Spanish frontier), July 30.—(AP)—The Spanish government's smashing offensive on the Catalonian front appeared today to have been stopped by insurgent reinforcements hurriedly withdrawn from the drive on Valencia.

The front line along the Ebro river was but little changed in the past 48 hours and the city of Gandesa district headquarters for the insurgents, still was a no-man's land claimed by both sides.

Government reports of gains were limited to isolated hill tops and crossroads.

Shanghai, July 30.—(AP)—Chinese and Japanese war dispatches agree today that a fierce slaughter is in progress in the bitterly-contested Yangtze valley below Hankow.

Japanese maintained generally that their infantry and air forces were advancing full speed westward from Kukiang, a Yangtze river town they occupied Tuesday, the provisional Chinese capital 135 miles west.

Chinese, however, asserted their counter-attacks were effective on the south bank of the river, Kukiang and behind Japanese lines, forcing the invaders.

The defenders asserted the Japanese had concentrated 10,000 men from Shanghai and Anhwei provinces near Fukow, opposite Nanchang.

### FAIR WEATHER FORECAST

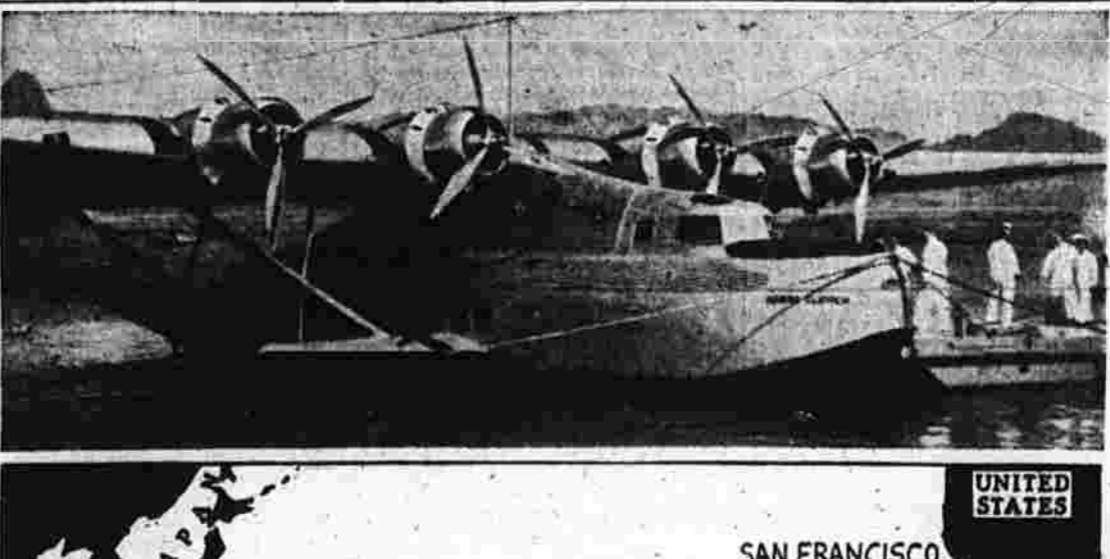

### OIL AREA DISCOVERED BY MEIGS IN SEARCH FOR OCEAN AIRLINER

#### Slick Directly In Course Of Missing Plane's Flight From Guam To Manila Leads To Presumption Trans-Pacific Airliner Hit Ocean; Lifeboat Lowered To Take Samples Of Oil.

San Francisco, July 30.—(AP)—A "thick oil" area, marking the spot where the trans-Pacific Hawaii Clipper presumably hit the ocean, was discovered by the army transport Meigs today 80 miles from Manila.

A radio message from the search-in-progress, intercepted here, told of the discovery of the thick oil slick directly in the line of the Clipper's course when she disappeared Thursday night with 15 men aboard her on a flight from Guam to Manila.

The message, signed by the captain of the Meigs and directed to military headquarters in Manila, said the oil-coated area was about 1,500 feet in circumference. A lifeboat was immediately lowered to investigate the slick and take samples of the oil and water. The message was later confirmed by army headquarters in Manila.

At Pan American's airways headquarters here, where officials awaited confirmation of the message, hope was held that the 20-ton flying boat had made an emergency landing, rather than marking the spot where the craft sank.

Carried Off For Landing.

The Clipper carried a supply of heavy oil to quiet seas for emergency landing. Airways officials said this may have been dumped for an emergency landing and drifted to sea farther than the Clipper.

But this did not account for the failure of the Clipper to radio as emergency landing was necessary, or report later by her wireless, capable of communicating while drifting on the sea.

Pending further investigation the Meigs was remaining in the same position at latitude 12 1/2 north longitude 130 3/4 east. This is about 500 miles from Manila, or sixty five miles east of the position given by the Clipper when her radio suddenly went dead.
