

### INSURGENTS CLOSE FRENCH FRONTIER; BOMB BARCELONA

#### Report Confirmed Franco To Lead New Offensive; Air Raids Described As Being Worst For Many Months.

Hendaye, France, (At the Spanish Frontier) Aug. 18.—(AP)—Spanish insurgents closed the French frontier and looted a heavy air raid on Barcelona today in preparation for a general offensive.

Insurgent military leaders confirmed that Generalissimo Francisco Franco himself would lead a new drive. Franco named General Juan Yague, former chief of staff of the northern insurgent army, chief of his personal staff.

French border guards said insurgent authorities had shut the frontier tighter than at any time since the start of the civil war more than two years ago.

Offensive Against Catalonia—Insurgent sources said they expected the offensive would be directed against Catalonia, possibly coupled with a simultaneous drive against besieged Madrid.

The goal of the campaign apparently was to end the civil war before it reached its third winter.

A number of insurgent officers who have been on leave were recalled to duty effective Aug. 21.

Insurgents said they bombed Barcelona three times between dawn and noon today. Reports reaching the border said persons were killed and 100 wounded.

Raids Worst In Months—(Fragmentary reports from Barcelona, seat of the Spanish government and center of the war, described the raids as the worst in months.)

Several bombs were said to have fallen in Barcelona's old quarter, surrounding the war front district.

The bombing of Hendaye and reports that the insurgents were preparing a heavy new offensive followed charges that large numbers of Italian troops and quantities of material recently have been sent to France.

The British embassy in Rome has drawn "attention" to the fascist government to three charges.

Government dispatches said an insurgent thrust against Almaden, key to the productive mercury mines.

### CZECHS OFFER CHOICE PLUMS TO SUDETENS

#### Premier Discloses Government Plans After Conference With Viscount Runciman On Minority Issue.

Prague, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Premier Milan Hodra today disclosed the Czechoslovak government would give choice political plums in an attempt to pacify its clamorous, autonomy-seeking Sudeten German minority.

The premier made the disclosure in a conference with Viscount Runciman, unofficial British mediator in the troublesome minority issue.

Lord Runciman's conference with Hodra followed his meeting for the first time yesterday with Konrad Henlein, leader of the 3,500,000 Nazi-supported Sudeten Germans. Some quarters believed their interview might have found a way for softening the Sudeten Germans' intransigent demands.

To Get Postmasterships—Seven postmasterships in larger cities—including Eidenbach, Aach and Rumburg—are to be given the Sudeten Germans.

From their ranks, it was said, also would be selected the chief of oversight—who directs public works—(Brunn) district governors at Aach, Trautmann and possibly other communities, and more employees of the railroad administration.

The premier said the Ministry of Justice was giving favorable consideration, too, to appointment of a Sudeten German as president of the Regional court at Eger.

A member of the British mission said these were concessions of a positive, open nature.

Lord Runciman told Hodra he welcomed the action taken by the government in this respect.

### JAPANESE CALL MILLION MORE MEN TO ARMS

### HEWES ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY HOPES

#### Pledges Himself To Objectives Of F.D.R. And Cross In Seeking Party Honor.

"The task to which I refer and in which I have a profound interest is the achievement of decent government, increased employment, a steady improvement in the standard of living for large numbers of our people and a new era of peace, understanding and good-will."

### MINISTER BLAMES DEVIL FOR CRIME

#### In Courtroom Speech After Convicted For Murdering Maid And Burning Body.

Mandan, N. D., Aug. 18.—(AP)—Rev. Helo Jansen, Evangelical Lutheran pastor at Krem, began a 1½ hour sermon today a few hours after pleading guilty to poisoning his 16-year-old housemaid, and cremating the body.

The minister, 31, admitted he killed Alma Kruckenberg because she was pregnant. District Judge H. L. Berry sentenced Jansen to a 10-year term in the state penitentiary.

The arraignment followed swiftly after Jansen signed a confession before State's Attorney Floyd Sperry of Mercer county admitting he perpetrated the crime Monday and buried his ten-room house.

Sperry For Wife And House—The devil overcame me in the past, said impulsively, "I did wrong. I have a very good Christian wife and I feel only too sorry that I bring such grief to them."

### GOOD BUSINESS POINTS TO EXPENDITURES CUT

Washington, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) of the House ways and means committee today broadcast an appeal for peace-minded people to support the program to reduce or cancel expenditures.

The veteran legislator, whose committee drafts all the tax bills, predicted there would be no need to reduce or cancel expenditures.

Doughton said he was not prepared to commit himself on a proposal to broaden the income tax base by lowering exemptions and to increase the levies on incomes in the middle brackets.

O'Connell, seeking re-nomination for a sixth term on both Democratic and Republican tickets will be opposed by the Democratic primary by a "100 per cent New Dealist" James E. Fay, deputy collector of internal revenue.

Challenge of America.—"It is not the challenge to me personally that matters," O'Connell said. "The President's attack on me and other members of Congress is a challenge to America and its present form of government."

"The repetitious diatribe of any desire to become a dictator cannot be taken at full faith when actions evidence the contrary," he said. "No dictator in Europe would for one moment admit he is a dictator. They all palaver and practice honied words about 'democracy' and it is they who claim to be supported by a mandate from the people."

Science Plans To Tap Hidden Fuel Reserves

By HOWARD W. BLAKELEE, Associated Press Science Editor.

Plans of science to tap 43 per cent of the United States' "energy reserves" now largely inaccessible were described today at the newly opened station of the U. S. Bureau of Mines.

The reserves are sub-bituminous coal and lignite, because their storage quality has hampered storage of the fuels and much beyond local and seasonal markets. The fuels contain large amounts of oxygen, when they dry they are more susceptible to reaction with the oxygen in the air...

Under authorization of Congress the U. S. Bureau of Mines is undertaking investigations to enable these fuels to carry on when coal, oil and gas supplies dwindle or grow expensive, and when water power spreads to its limits.

Two-Fifths of All Energy. On the "energy scale," latent heat available from these low-grade fuels are about two-fifths of that of the more expensive and "tractable" water power. The highest estimate of the main power source, coal, is 100 billion horsepower in 1937 by A. C. Fletcher, chief of the laboratory group at the Bureau of Mines, gives American coal a life of from 100 to 200 years.
