

### CORONER PREDICTS SIX MORE ARRESTS IN PRISON DEATHS

Investigation Indicates At Least Eight Implicated in 'Baking' of Four Convicts Who Led Hunger Strike.

Philadelphia, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Arrest of at least eight persons in the "baking to death" of four convicts who led a hunger strike at the Philadelphia county prison, was predicted today by Coroner Charles A. Mersch.

He said the investigation he is conducting with District Attorney John A. Boye indicated that at least that many would be implicated in the deaths of the men in steam-heated, almost air-tight punishment cells.

Dr. Mersch did not indicate whether the investigation involved employees of the prison, or officials. Two guards already have been held as material witnesses.

Investigators to "Turn On Heat." State prison investigators said they planned to "turn on the heat" and enter the study cells to learn whether the punishment cells were "a deliberately planned roast."

Charles I. Engard, secretary of welfare, directing the state's investigation of the deaths, disclosed the men from the office and two state policemen were in the cells when the heat was turned on.

He said they would subject themselves to the same conditions the prisoners faced in the heated cells, termed as horrible as the Black Hole of Calcutta.

Steam Pressure Same Degree. "The plan to close the windows and ventilators," he said, "just as we understand they were closed Sunday night, and have the steam pressure in the radiators turned on to the same degree they were when the prisoners were in them."

He said he wanted to know if large radiators in the cell block were really needed just to heat the building in the winter, or if there was something else in mind.

William B. Mills, superintendent of the prison, said the building was deliberately planned as a "cooler," he was unaware of it.

To Ask for State Troopers. Coroner Mersch announced he would ask Governor George H. Earle for state troopers to take over the prison during the investigation.

With two guards already held as material witnesses, Mersch said he had warrants for the arrests of four other persons and declared additional arrests might result in a breakdown of the prison administration unless the entire staff was reorganized.

The coroner said the convicts suffocated in almost air-tight cells, where they were confined during an organized revolt against a "monotonous" diet. Steam radiators were turned on full, he declared, and "in two days steaming, they (the con-

### FARLEY CALLED FOR PURGE TALK

Roosevelt Summons Political Generalissimo To Discuss Anti-New Deal Democrats

Hyde Park, N. Y., Aug. 25.—(AP)—President Roosevelt called James A. Farley today for a conference which may result in an interesting administration drive to defeat anti-New Deal Democrats in Congress.

The Roosevelt-Farley talk, scheduled for sometime today or tomorrow, was considered one of the most politically-important of the President's stay at the White House.

Mr. Roosevelt presumably wanted to talk with his political generalissimo about campaign developments in a half dozen states. Farley's advice was expected to determine in part whether the President will make a personal bid in Maryland for the defeat of Senator Millard T. Ewing, an aggressive foe of the administration.

Connecticut Probable Topic. Also among probable topics of conversation between the two were the political situations in New York, Idaho, Georgia, South Carolina and Connecticut.

Thus far, Farley has had no part in the President's drive against anti-administration Democrats seeking re-election. While the President was traveling westward on his recent campaigning trip, Farley was making general political inquiries in the Democratic primary west to Alaska.

Speaking On Farley's Attitude. There has been general speculation regarding Farley's attitude toward Mr. Roosevelt's proposed "purge" of anti-administration Democrats.

The projected conference between the chief executive and his political master general was expected to clarify Farley's stand.

Information from Farley as to what the administration might accomplish in the Democratic primary would be of great value to the President.

In Idaho, the chief executive's problem is whether to throw administrative support to Attorney General James P. Pope if the latter, defeated in the Democratic primary, should run for re-election as an independent.

Support For Lehman Question. The New York situation involves the question of whether Mr. Roosevelt will support Governor Herbert Lehman.

### CHAMBER URGES WAGNER CHANGES

Recommended To Correct Influences Now Working Against U. S. Recovery.

Washington, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce recommended changes in the Wagner Labor Relations Act today to correct what it termed "influences working strongly against economic recovery."

George H. Davis, president of the Chamber, criticized both the act and its administration, in a statement which followed by only a few days President Roosevelt's announcement that some revision of the law would be considered.

Mr. Roosevelt told reporters last week he had no specific changes in mind but agreed with President William Green of the American Federation of Labor that the act should be clarified.

Amendments Wanted. Davis said the Chamber of Commerce wanted amendments to: Prohibit coercion of employees by union groups and others, as well as to define unfair labor practices so that unions also would be held responsible.

Permit employers to ask action of the labor board. This now is limited to charges.

Davis charged that the board's proceedings "have not been fair and impartial and there has been ample demonstration of the fact that the legislation has not fulfilled its stated purpose of lessening industrial disputes."

Does Not Favor Protection. He asserted the act does not protect the employer.

### BELIEVE 12 KILLED IN ATTACKED PLANE

American Pilot Of Airliner Riddled By Machine Gun Bullets Heard Bomb Explosions Later In Day.

Hongkong, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Airline officials said tonight they believed at least 12 persons died in the Chinese-American airliner which was forced down and machine-gunned by Japanese warplanes yesterday between Canton and Macao.

A spokesman for the China National Aviation Corporation, the Chinese, said the plane's reports indicated the plane, riddled by machine-guns, was entirely submerged in the small river on which the American pilot, H. L. Woods, was winged, Kas. set it down.

### SEEK ECCENTRIC AS TORSO SLAYER

Detectives Turn To New Lead, Tracing Cartons To City's Market District.

Cleveland, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Admittedly checked on the trail of a "murder" victim, detectives turned today to a new lead in their hunt for the homicidal maniac who has butchered a dozen persons since 1935.

More Hubber Cost and Began. Detective Peter Merylo quoted the clerk as saying "Doc" appeared late in June wearing a heavy rubber coat and rubber boots despite the warm weather.

Asked why he wore heavy clothing, the clerk said the eccentric "is a loner and that keeps him out in the winter. I go without a shirt and believe it's hot and that keeps me warm."

Traced To Rag Dealers. The rag dealer who was used by the killer to wrap other sections of the victim's body to be found, a junk man identified it as one he had to a junk man. Officers traced it to a rag dealer who bought it from the junk man.

The rag concern is located on the near East Side, where the dismembered body of the victim was found. A search was made and the victim also lived in the neighborhood.
