

34 DEAD, HUNDREDS INJURED AS TOKYO SWEEP BY TYPHOON

Yokohama Struck First; Ships Driven Aground, Communications Crippled, Many Homes Damaged.

Tokyo, Sept. 1.—(AP)—At least 34 persons were known to have been killed and scores of others were missing today after a 75-minute typhoon that caused heavy damage in Tokyo and Yokohama.

Meager reports over crippled communications lines indicated heavy property losses outside Tokyo but casualties, apparently, were comparatively small.

The typhoon roared northward toward the Japan sea toward the mainland of Asia. Meteorologists said it might change its course, however.

Police estimated 15,000 persons were homeless in Tokyo alone as the terrific winds flattened many homes.

FIVE KILLED AS HOUSE HIT BY AVALANCHE

Climb, Loosed By Violent Rains, Plunges Down On Jammed Apartment Building, Smashing Structure.

Quebec, Sept. 1.—(Canadian Press)—A cliffside avalanche, loosed by violent rains, plunged down on a crowded four-story apartment house in a Quebec suburb today, killing at least five persons and leaving an estimated 15 trapped in the ruins.

At least eight other deaths were attributed to the same rains. Six persons were drowned when swollen waters rushed down the St. Lawrence river at Fortville, 40 miles west of here. Two died in the derailment of a Montreal-Quebec passenger train caused by a washout.

The apartment house tragedy occurred at St. Gregoire de Montmorency, a small town six miles east of Quebec, where a landslide, at 4:15 a. m., tore the roof of a building from its foundations.

45 Believed in Building

Eighteen persons were injured.

PENSIONS PLAYING IMPORTANT ROLES

Proposals Making New Political History Throughout The Entire United States

Washington, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Elderly persons hoping for security in state or federal pensions are making new political history this year from Maine to California and from Washington to Florida.

Senators are playing an important role in determining the outcome of primary elections and shaping the issues for the fall campaign in several states.

The Democratic nomination of Theodore Roosevelt over Senator William G. McAdoo in California Tuesday emphasized the political potentialities of the voters, who want more and bigger pensions.

Dewey campaigned as an advocate of a system which became known as the "80 every Thursday" plan. He said all unemployed persons over 50 years of age should get the equivalent of \$20 a week in state scrip. President Roosevelt called it a "fantastic shortcut to Utopia," and McAdoo also criticized it.

JAPS REOCCUPY STRATEGIC POINTS

Chinese On Hankow Front Repulse 13 Day Aid Night Attacks West Of Juchang

Shanghai, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Japanese troops gained strength for their disrupted offensive against the Yellow river today by reoccupying strategic villages along the north bank of the stream and pushing Chinese defenders from Mengshan in Honan province.

On the Hankow or Yangtze river front about 200 miles to the south the Chinese maintained their over-come Japanese smokescreen and artillery fire and repulsed 13 aid night attacks west of Juchang, 100 miles southeast of Hankow, the provisional capital. Chinese repulse the Japanese on many fronts.

The defenders reported they were holding firm on all other fronts.

Flames Bomb Chinese Positions

More than 100 Japanese planes in near flight bombed Chinese positions near Tachin, in Kiangsu province and on the Nanchang-Kiating railroad, in efforts to bring aid to the Japanese and advance toward Nanchang, Chinese officials said.

The Japanese conducted Chinese movements from Juchang. A Japanese column met desperate resistance on the north bank of the Yangtze. It is reported that the distance between Juchang and Nanchang is 400 miles and that the Japanese are 40 miles away. (Continued on Page Two.)

HENLEIN MAKES SECRET VISIT TO SEE HITLER

Departure Closely Followed Conference With Aid Of Viscount Runciman, British Mediator In Impasse.

Prague, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Konrad Henlein, chief of the Sudeten Germans in Czechoslovakia, stepped off today to Berchtesgaden to see Reichsfuehrer Hitler, self-avowed protector of the Sudeten Germans in their demands for autonomy.

Henlein's departure for the German Fuehrer's mountain retreat followed closely his conference at Marienbad last night with F. T. A. Ashton-Oswald, chief aide of Viscount Runciman, British mediator in the Sudeten German impasse.

Informal persons, though unable to say when Henlein would see his protector, expressed belief the conversation would deal with British proposals for a solution of the conflict between the Czech government and Henlein's party, which most of Europe fears contains the seeds of war.

ADD TO ANXIETY

London, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Britain and France received with anxiety today news that Konrad Henlein, the Sudeten German leader, had left Czechoslovakia to see Chancellor Hitler of Germany, his self-styled protector.

A section of the British press greeted the United States' interest in the issue between Czechoslovakia and the autonomy-demanded Sudeten German minority. One newspaper predicted President Roosevelt might send Hitler a warning.

The fact that Henlein had gone to Berchtesgaden, Hitler's mountain retreat in Bavaria, was interpreted as meaning that Hitler, not the Sudeten German leaders themselves—would give the final answer on the Czechoslovak autonomy proposals, originally demanded by the Czech government, no later than tomorrow morning.

War Clouds Overhang Financing Conference

Washington, Sept. 1.—(AP)—European war clouds overhang a multi-million dollar financing conference today between Treasury and Federal Reserve officials. The meeting is being held in the Treasury building, in accordance with custom, invited Federal Reserve officials to help in deciding how much money and on what type of security the Treasury should borrow Sept. 15.

Will Wait Until Last Minute

DAVIS, COOL, REBUTS STRYKER'S ATTEMPTS FOR PLAIN ANSWERS

Davis swore that he did "everything in my power" to protect Hines before finally—reluctantly, he said—agreeing to turn state's evidence and testify against the Tammany district leader.

He said that when George Walsh, former business manager of the Dutch Schultz policy racket syndicate, tried to get him to testify for the state, he told Walsh: "I won't do it. I would have to involve everybody. I'm going to protect Hines. I know I was a witness for the state, but I won't do it."
