

### CROSS CRITICIZES USING CONSPIRACY LAW IN DISPUTES

#### Governor Also Tells Federation Convention He Favors Limitations On Injunctions And Direct Primary Law.

Bridgeport, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Gov. Wilbur L. Cross, expressing sympathy with labor's objectives, criticized today before the Connecticut Federation of Labor convention here the invoking of the state's conspiracy law in labor disputes.

Referring to criticism voiced during the convention against that law, the governor said:

"I don't think the conspiracy law was ever intended in the beginning to have any connection with labor disputes. By the construction of the courts we have a conspiracy where none was intended."

The chief executive told the delegates "I am with you there."

He also told the convention he favored placing limitations on the use of injunctions in labor disputes and expressed himself as for the direct primary system.

"You are right there. There should be some limitation on injunctions. The governor asserted that as a general rule he believed injunctions have no place in labor disputes."

He told the delegates there was "very little difference between your objectives and those of myself."

Advocating Direct Primary

In advocating adoption of the direct primary, the governor said that "there is no better way than the direct primary to get the sentiment of the people in regard to candidates for office."

The direct primary might lead to abuses, he conceded, but the direct primary is what we ought to try."

The governor listed labor legislation enacted during the eight years he has been in office, mentioning old age pensions, unemployment insurance and the creation of the state board of mediation and arbitration. He urged members of the Federation to suggest changes which might be made for better operations of the unemployment compensation and old age pension laws.

Referring to the work of the Board of Mediation and Arbitration, the governor said:

"There is in the state a growing feeling that they (employers and employees) must get together and quietly settle anything that is likely to lead to a strike."

Leads Organized Labor

Governor Cross lauded organized labor for the attitude it had displayed in efforts to obtain amicable settlement of industrial disputes.

The governor told the convention about the recent appointment of a committee to study a state-wide hospitalization plan, asserting that the plan in essence was an attempt to divert medical costs. He said he didn't know what the outcome would be.

Major Brooke is charged with murdering his wife last June 8.

Lt. Col. Martin R. Reiter, Fourth Central Laboratory director and assistant surgeon at Fort Benning, government witness, told of the discovery.

### YANGTZE ADVANCE COSTLY TO BOTH

#### Japanese Headquarters Sets Total Casualties Above 27,000 Within Month.

Shanghai, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Japanese army headquarters said today fighting on the south bank of the Yangtze river between Aug. 19 and Sept. 4 cost 2300 Japanese and 20,000 Chinese casualties.

Severe fighting continued in that sector today. About 300 miles to the north, Japanese troops advanced steadily toward the vital Peiping-Hankow railroad after having occupied Kashi, 85 miles east of the Japanese drive toward Hankow, a Japanese army announcement said.

"Dispersed from Peiping quoted a Japanese army announcement that 'fresh, excellent troops—reinforced, fresh, not replacements' arrived Wednesday from Japan at Tangshan, northern China."

The reports also said there were indications two or more divisions might be en route to various fronts in northern China and that this might preclude an intensification of the Japanese drive toward Hankow, the provisional capital.

Trying To Block Drive

Chinese central government troops were reported moving into the front on the Kiangsi-Nanchang railroad in an effort to block a Japanese drive on Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi province.

The Japanese estimated a communication anti-aircraft gun had shot down three Chinese planes that attempted to bomb Japanese territory near Kiangsi. The ships continued to pursue on both banks of the Yangtze.

### FRENCH ARMIES WATCH TROOPS ACROSS BORDER

#### Maginot Zone Forces Scan Awaiting Developments In Czechoslovakian Crisis.

Sarreguemines, on the French-German frontier, Sept. 8.—(AP)—The French air and land armies in the Maginot zone watched movements of German troops across the frontier today and awaited developments in Czechoslovakia.

Citizens of Metz avowed today to see a large army observation balloon floating from a cable high above the city. Two observers in the basket scanned the northern horizon with field glasses and kept in constant touch by telephone with a ground station.

There was uneasiness on Maginot line officers' faces when they heard the report that the balloon had caused a rupture of the French frontier.

Troops Strengthened

During the night watch was strengthened by thousands of infantry. Constant watch was kept in the garrisons and at entrances to the underground fortifications.

By the time the night watch was over all morning in the land and head told the land force that the air force had taken their positions in Little parish churches of the frontier zone were sighted this morning by hundreds of candles placed before the altars by devout Lorraine women.

Pray For Peace

Throughout Alsace and Lorraine—areas that felt the full brunt of the World War—for the last few days thousands of women of the frontier zone have flocked into Metz and Strasbourg cathedrals and hundreds of parish churches. They said many a prayer for peace and burn- ing candles.

The dream of the French continental forces and reserve formations, an estimated 350,000 men in all, waited ready for orders today in the fortified Maginot zone.

### TREASURY SEEKS LOAN OF BILLION

Washington, Sept. 8.—(AP)—The Treasury asked the nation's banks today to lend it \$700,000,000 in "new money" to help pay for the administration's spending program and to build up a huge temporary cash reserve.

At the same time, Secretary Morgenthau offered new securities to replenish the Treasury's cash reserve.

Treasury officials said they anticipated little difficulty in borrowing the money because the banks alone have \$3,000,000,000 of idle funds available for investments and loans.

Proposals Still Will Touch

The studies will touch on these additional proposals, a spokesman for the board said:

1. Extension of payment of old-age benefits before Jan. 1, 1942, the date now fixed by law.

2. Payment of larger benefits than now provided for persons retiring during the earlier years of the program.

3. Distribution of benefits to aged widows and young children of insured persons who die before reaching retirement age.

4. A change in the present method of investing the accumulating fund in a reserve fund of old-age annuities.

5. Downward revision of the individual and employer tax rates until the program reaches the peak of its operation in four or five years.

Advisory Council Make-up

The Advisory Council, selected at the request of the Senate Finance committee, consists of five representatives of labor, six from employers and 11 from the public generally. It approved the present handling of the reserve account.

The Council has recommended that about \$70,000,000 be set aside for the act.

The board will give the Council by Sept. 15 re-estimated of the number of domestics, self-employed and farm workers not covered by the act and recommendations for legislation to include them. It will submit similar information on such other groups as maritime workers and bank clerks.
