

SPYESS LOSES OUT FOR TOWN OFFICE, GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Defeated By Converse For Selectman Post, Drubbed By Thornton And Cheney As A Representative.

Putting to rest the hopes of many of his contemporaries on the Board of Selectmen, and registering a low man in the race for some time, Mathias Spiess last night was overwhelmingly defeated for a place on the Republican ticket in the fall town election. Elected to the Board in place of Spiess was Lawrence A. Converse, and another-upset was narrowly averted when Selectman Clarence N. Lupien, by a mere handful of votes, bested a more aspirant, Harold R. Byington. For representatives, William C. Cheney and William J. Thornton were leaders over Spiess with margins of more than 100 votes each.

On the Democratic side, twelve write-ins of the name of Mr. E. May Holden for the Board of Education secured for nomination as a running mate of E. J. Murphy. Reportedly, the party organization had tried to keep Mr. Holden from a place on the ticket.

Writing was very light, the Democrats, with no major contest looming, turning out less than one fifth as many voters as worked the machines in the Republican column. Of the total voting, 2,638 Republicans picked their choice of candidates, while only 507 Democrats appeared.

The contest on the Democratic side was for the office of constable, and the nominations went to James Duffy, Edmund F. Dwyer, John Roban and Joseph V. Shea. In the school board section, which on the machine contained a space marked "no nomination" headed the list name of E. J. Murphy, over 100 voters threw away a vote on a blank space. Besides Mrs. Holden's name, which was written in, the name of George C. Leaser appeared three times, while one voter marked "Charlie McCarthy" would.

CRASH CAUSED BY WET LEAVES UPON HIGHWAY

Motor Vehicle Inspectors Piece Together Stories Of Injured Passengers In Bus Hitting Truck.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 14.—(AP)—A skid on a wet, leaf-strewn highway was tentatively assigned today as the cause of a crash between an interstate passenger bus and a 22-wheel trailer-type truck which took the lives of seven and brought injuries to twelve yesterday on the state highway at nearby Chatham.

Motor vehicle registry inspectors said stories they pieced together from injured passengers and the driver indicated that the bus and truck collided at the rear of the bus. The driver of the bus, who was not injured, pulled far to the right to avoid the crash.

Drivers' conditions critical

All the dead were passengers in the bus. The bus driver, Theron D. L. Haskins, and the truck driver, Henry Brown of Weymouth are both in critical condition.

Bremen said his preliminary report will be laid before Registrar Frank H. Goodwin later today. The Interstate Commerce Commission sent D. L. Haskins to the scene. He will report to Washington. A copy of state police also questioned survivors and nearby residents.

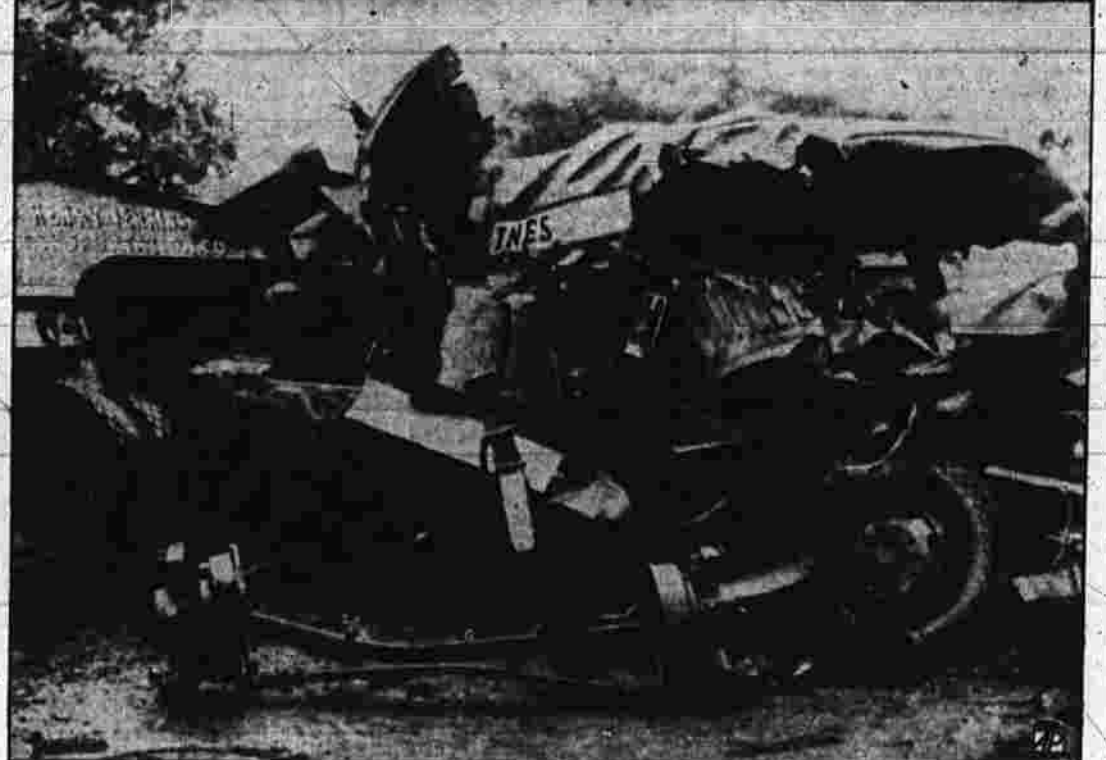

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HENLEIN DISSOLVES SUDETEN COMMITTEE

BRITISH AIDE TOLD Result Is Complete Breakdown In Efforts To Solve Bitter, Bloody Dispute Over Demands For Self-Rule; Ultimatum Ignored By Czech Government.

Prague, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Karel Henlein, leader of the Sudeten Germans, today announced the dissolution of the Sudeten committee for negotiations with the Czechoslovak government, a result of a complete breakdown in efforts to solve the bitter bloody dispute over the Sudeten demands for self-rule, three days after the ultimatum issued by the Czech government.

Henlein's decision to dissolve his committee to solve the dispute was reported by a British official in Prague. The ultimatum issued by the Czech government on Sept. 11, demanding the withdrawal of Henlein's committee, was ignored by the Sudeten leader.

Henlein's committee had been formed in July to negotiate with the Czech government. It had been dissolved on Sept. 11, after the Czech government issued an ultimatum demanding its withdrawal.

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FRENCH PLAN TO MOBILIZE LARGER ARMY

Eight Classes Of Reserves, Amounting To 2,000,000 More Men, May Be Called In Case Of A Grave Turn.

Paris, Sept. 14.—(AP)—The French government was reported in informed quarters today to have completed plans for speedy mobilization of 2,000,000 more men, or eight classes of army reserves, in the event of a grave turn in the European situation.

The classes from 1931 back to 1924 would be included, meaning that men from 17 to 34 years old, inclusive, would be called.

It is estimated there already are about 2,000,000 men under arms in the French empire, hence such mobilization would swell the total to 4,000,000.

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HITLER CALLS FOREIGN HEADS TO CONFERENCE

Germans Expect Fuehrer To Make Some Move, If Only Public Statement, In View Of His Defiant Warnings.

Berlin, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler today called Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop to meet him at Munich to discuss what Germany might do in the face of what Nazis called the "new situation" in Czechoslovakia.

Germans generally expected Hitler to make some move, if only a public statement, in view of his defiant warnings to Czechoslovakia in his Monday night speech at Nuremberg. The ultimatum expired early today, without immediate results.

Multitude Of Rumors

While the Fuehrer and the foreign minister conferred in the brownstone, a multitude of rumors circulated.

Premier Eduard Daladier spent the day at the ministry of war. He conferred with Leon Blum, Socialist leader, this afternoon, and what was reported to be a plan for possible formation of a national union government, representing all political parties.

Diplomatic sources believed today that Ribbentrop had prepared to go to London to the extent of presenting the German position to the British government. The ultimatum expired early today, without immediate results.

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JAPAN PREPARED TO JOIN ALLIES
Tokyo, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Japan's readiness to join the Allies against Germany was reported today by a statement by the Foreign Office spokesman.

The announcement held Communist activities responsible for the Czechoslovakian-German crisis and said Japan was prepared to join the Allies against Germany.

Japan expressed intense interest in world affairs.

White House authorities obligingly were asked about the international situation, and gave newspaper only a few minutes of their scheduled departure.

The President's secretary, James H. Doolittle, said that the President was ready to fight in every way, with arms, if necessary.
