\$2,451,388 SEEN LOCAL TAX LOAD

Figures Show Manchester Pay 63 Per Cent Of Sum In Hidden Tariffs.

Manchester's tax burden, based on the Connecticut per capita load of \$131.43, is \$2,451,388, according to a survey by the National Consumers Tax Commission.

Connecticut residents, the commission reported from its headquarters in Chicago, contribute an estimated \$121,127.75 in taxes each year to local, state and national governments. More than 65 per cent of that amount, the report stated, is paid in hidden taxes in increased prices on food, clothing, fuel, and other necessities, as well as on luxuries.
