STATE'S DEATH TOLL MOUNTS AS REPORTS

New Haven, Sept. 22.—(AP)—A mounting death toll coupled with reports of huge property damage from widely separated communities gave Connecticut a darker picture today of the worst storm in the state's history.

The hurricane-like gale that swept in from the Atlantic Wednesday afternoon, coupled with the floods that followed five days of rain, left 31 known dead and these did not include eight persons whose bodies were reported to have been washed

Five of the dead were in New London where a fire, raging out of control nearly 10 hours last night, added its destruction to that wrought by the gale.



Yesterday's storm caused one death, virtually ruined the state's tomato and apple crops, darkened scores of cities, flooded rivers and rocked Atlantic City's famed board-walk and amusement pier.

At Newark airport the nation's major airlines resumed operations, cancelled yesterday when the wind reached a 70-mile an hour velocity. Tidal waves 30 feet high left in their wake 30 miles of ocean front littered with the wreckage of small boats and beach resort buildings.






