BLOW BRINGS PEOPLE OF THE TOWN TOGETHER

W. C. Cheney Says Public Realizes This Is the Time To Forget Differences Of All Kinds.

William C. Cheney, former selectman of the town of Manchester and today one of the candidates on the Republican ticket for the office of representative, when asked this morning for a statement as to his

opinion as to the attention to the town of Manchester said: "There is nobody in Manchester but has suffered a loss. There is nobody but realizes that this is the time to forget political connections, religious or any other connections. We are all one. Most of the residents of Manchester today were born here, or have been so closely connected with the town that they all realize that they have something in common.

"There is no class distinction, no differences in any way. We are today much the same as the town of Manchester was when I was a boy, when The Herald was established in 1881. There is a big job for all. The Herald has been doing a good work in keeping the people informed what has happened. It has been a misfortune but it has done one thing—bringing them closer together than ever before.

"The loss is so general that everybody is acquainted. It is not anything that we, each individual, working with his neighbor and friends, cannot overcome. It is a hard blow, but it has done more to reunite Manchester than anything that has happened since the World War, when all met on the same level and footing—friends, neighbors and good citizens."

TOWN FORTUNATE BY COMPARISON

Governor's Parley Brings Out Real Story Of Devastation In Other Sections.

When the elements ganged up on Southern New England this week Manchester escaped with much less destruction than was wrought in many of the other eastern Connecticut cities and towns. Yesterday officials from many of the stricken communities of the state met with officers of many state government departments in the State House of 6 of Governor Cross to report on conditions, state their needs for emergency supplies and start plans for reconstruction.

As representatives from Stafford Springs, Norwich, New London and the above towns from Hartford east to the Rhode Island state line told their stories of death and destruction it was soon apparent that Manchester was fortunate in comparison. Shore town selectmen reported that most of the summer and fall debris in their communities had been wiped out. With increased expenditures for rehabilitation facing them, most of those towns will have to wipe out large portions of their grand list, resulting in greatly increased tax rates.

In Stafford Springs and Norwich, high water racing through business districts did damage, not expected.

SELECTMEN BACK EMERGENCY ACTS

Approve Moves Made By Chairman Chambers And Clerk During Hurricane.

Meeting last night by candle light in the Municipal building, the Board of Selectmen approved the acts of Chairman David Chambers and Clerk George H. Waddell during the emergency period this week and gave them blanket authorization to continue with plans for clearing up debris and restoring the town to pre-foot and hurricane status.

Mr. Waddell reported that with but two exceptions all streets have been cleared of fallen trees and are passable. In both cases, he said, the blocked roads are also impassable because of damaged bridges, but in neither case is any family without access to the main highway.
