WORKERS IN STATE START HUGE TASK LEFT BY DISASTER

Job Of Securing Thousands Made Homeless After Worst Catastrophe In Connecticut History Goes On.

Hartford, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Very relief workers tackled today a herculean task of "mopping-up" in Hartford and other flood and hurricane ravaged Connecticut communities.

The toll of dead taken by wind and water remained near 70 and unofficial estimates of property destruction soared upward of \$50,000,000.

The Connecticut river at Hartford slowly retreated from the streets it won in the rampaging assault that carried it to a crest of 33.1 feet last Friday.

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# OCEAN BEACH HARD HIT BY FORCE OF HURRICANE

Early Reports Of Flood And Fire Damage To New London Itself Were Overdrawn; Present Conditions

New London, Sept. 26.—(Special)—Early reports of hurricane, flood and fire damage in this city, apparently based on reports of unimpaired observers, painted a more picture than actually happened.

Although the Ocean Beach and entire water front section was swayed by both tide and wind, a considerable section of the main street business area was gutted by fire, the major portion of the city escaped serious damage. Except for the central business section of the city, residents today were without telephones and many streets were almost completely blocked by huge fallen signs.

The higher sections of the city escaped almost unscathed, little damage being done even to houses. The largest amount of damage to any single house from falling trees was that done to the old LeBaron mansion on Church street, built in 1801, which was blown from its foundation by a huge elm which fell on the southeast corner.

**Denmark Marks 150 Years of Farm Relief**

The farmers of tiny Denmark had their Longfellow and Concord exactly 150 years ago when the smoke had cleared they had completely reformed the life of the country.

Up to the latter part of the 18th century, the peasants of Denmark were nearly all slaves. The landowner had the right to sell his serfs as he pleased. But in 1788 a law forbidding all men of the peasant class to leave the estate to which they belonged, thus stopping emigration. But the very reforms, a system was to be reformed. A vast movement got under way to abolish these conditions, and in 1788, finally, an edict was issued by the government ending vassalage.

Landlords and peasants alike profited by the reform. A historian wrote, "Before the reform in farming, landlords as well as peasants, were living in poverty, but now riches sprang from the soil. It was a reformation, therefore, that was to be begun—new progress for Denmark. The country marks this 150 years anniversary with a special stamp, with a special commemorative stamp. It illustrates a monument erected at Copenhagen to commemorate the reform."
