CONNECTICUT ACTS TO REBUILD AREAS HIT BY HURRICANE

Toll Of Known Dead Edges Above 80; Hewes, Relief Coordinator, Plans Pro- gram Of Expediting Aid.

Hartford, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Rapidly organizing the rehabilitation program of the state following the disastrous hurricane and flood, Col. Thomas Hewes, coordinator of rehabilitation, conferred today in the hall of the House of Representatives with representatives of all state departments conducting relief work. Alarmed by the blockade of commodities and food intended for Connecticut sufferers, due to the truckmen's strike in the New York City area, Governor Howe appeared to Governor Moore of New Jersey to get the AFL to let shipments through.

Hartford, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Connecticut tackled a staggering task of reconstruction in storm devastated areas today, as official estimates of property destruction flooded and hurricane soared to \$100,000,000 and the toll of known dead edged along.

Col. Thomas Hewes, appointed state relief coordinator by Gov. Wilbur L. Cross, summoned officials of federal and state agencies to a conference this morning to map a unified program of expediting aid to the stricken regions.

Hewes, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, was assigned the job of co-ordinating relief and reconstruction work after an emergency conference of municipal and relief officials in state capitols yesterday at which Governor Moore asserted:

"Connecticut has suffered to the tune of about \$100,000,000."

"The further we look into the disaster, the worse it appears," he added.

Session Not Necessary
State Senator James R. Habbett of Windsor Locks urged Governor Cross to convene the General Assembly in emergency session but the chief executive asserted he did not believe that step was necessary.

Col. Hewes immediately set up headquarters in an office in the old Senate chamber, in the state capitol, and announced it would be kept open around the clock if need be.

"The purpose of this office," the relief co-ordinator said, "is to facilitate the placement of relief supplies and to coordinate the relief efforts of individuals throughout the state of Connecticut."

TO BEGIN EFFORT TO AVERT STRIKE

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A three-man board, selected by President Roosevelt will begin an effort, probably Friday, to avert the threatened nationwide railroad strike.

Negotiation and mediation having failed, the board will attempt to formulate a compromise which President Roosevelt can ask both sides to accept.

Railroads announced several weeks ago they would cut wages 15 per cent next Saturday. The employees then voted to strike.

So, just four days before the walkout was scheduled, President Roosevelt appointed yesterday a three-man board to mediate the emergency fact-finding board.

Force 60-Day Delay
Under the Railway Labor Act, this force is 60-day delay in both the imposition of the wage reduction and the calling of a strike.

The Emergency Board has 30 days to make a report on the controversy. The law also calls for a second thirty-day period of mediation for settlement of the controversy which labor and management officials study the board's findings.

On ten other occasions, presidents have created similar emergency boards but they have been concerned with mere local disputes. In all but one case, recommendations for settlement of the controversy have been accepted by both sides. The law does not require either side to accept the board's findings.
