22 DEAD, 300 HURT AS WILD TORNADO HITS CHARLESTON

Storm of Not More Than Minute's Duration Paced By Torrential Downpour As City Filled With Ruins.

Charleston, S. C., Sept. 28.—(AP)—A tornado hit historic Charleston with sudden and vicious fury at about 8 a. m. today, killed at least 22 persons and injured probably 300 more in a matter of minutes that was spotted throughout the city.

Not immediately identified of the 22 reported killed, 18 were Negroes. The dead were not immediately identified except the four white persons.

Buildings In Ruins Many of the city's historic-styled buildings were in ruins. St. Michael's Episcopal church, erected long before the Revolutionary war, was considerably damaged as well as the old market place.

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UGAKI QUILTS JAP CABINET; NO SUCCESSOR

Retired General Long At Odds With Dominant Faction In Army Over Policy Followed in China.

Tokyo, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The resignation of Foreign Minister General Kazuhide Ugaki, who had differed with the army over China policy, was announced officially tonight.

General Ugaki, on the army retired list, long has been at odds with the dominant faction in the army over the general lines of imperial policy.

His appointment as foreign minister in the cabinet shaken last May 29 was considered an indication that Japan might follow more moderate course with respect to the China war and relations with other powers.

His resignation was announced tonight. The board, an extra-governmental organ, was designed to act as liaison means between the government and the army.

General Ugaki retired to his villa today, explaining he was ill. He refused to receive any visitor.

Viscount Halifax Sees Envoys of United States, Russia and Italy; Defense Preparations Continue.

London, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The tense European situation was relaxed, at least momentarily, today while the heads of four governments met at Munich to try to avert war.

During the deliberations, the envoys of the United States, Soviet Russia and Italy saw Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary.

All Seek Information All, including United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, were believed to have sought information on the possible agenda of the Munich meeting and on conditions generally.

Their approximate route will be East Hartford, Glastonbury, Manchester, Rockville, Putnam, Killingly, Norwich, New London and as much of the shore as can be covered.

Colonel Hewes said today that although work is being done in the various flood hit areas, the state agencies could give information and carry on a part of the work.

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CZECHS AGREE TO PLAN TO CEDE SUDETENLAND

Some Reservations Made; Minister Flies To Munich; New Border Clash With Sudeten Germans Heard.

Prague, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The Czechoslovak government announced today it had agreed in principle and subject to ratification by the parliament to cede the Sudetenland to Germany.

Volker Mastny, Czechoslovak minister to Berlin, was seen at the airport today to announce the plan to Munich to tell the four-power conference here of the Czechoslovak position.

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SEABISCUIT TAKES MARYLAND FEATURE
Equals Record in Winning Havre de Grace Handicap; Boosts Earnings.

Col. E. R. Bradley figures on coming back to the derby with a bang and Seabiscuit, victor in the Havre de Grace handicap, provided the one of the greatest performances of his brilliant turf career, closed in another notch today on Sun Beach's all-time money-winning record.

Seabiscuit survived a jolting bump by T. D. Taggart's Marica on the first turn of the event yesterday and under strong urging by jockey Johnny Luce, Smokey Joe Wood's old friend and driver, won the Havre de Grace Handicap, a 1 1/2 mile race, in 1:58.7.

The champion's time equalled the record for the stake shared by Cuckoo and Crusader, and was one-fifth of a second off the track record set by Occident in 1935.

W. L. Bran's Savage Beauty, a colt, slipped to the rear of the pack inside the second place, while Hal Price Headley's Marow went lame and wound up third as Seabiscuit won around him.

The victory was worth \$4,175 and boosted Seabiscuit's total earnings to \$22,950, only \$2,754 short of Sun Beach's \$25,704.

The Havre de Grace handicap, run before 12,000 fans, closed the fall season here. The handicaps moved on to Laurel, where a 25-day meeting opens Saturday, with the \$7,500 Capital handicap the initial attraction.

GANSETT DAMAGES FROM STORM LIGHT
Loss At Rhody Race Track Placed At \$100,000; Fall Meeting Assured.

Pawtucket, R. I., Sept. 29.—(Special)—Narragansett Park rode the bursters of last week without sustaining any serious structural damage, reported Mark Linnenthal, construction engineer who built the plant after an exhaustive inspection. Superficial damage to existing parts of the plant and equipment will amount to approximately \$100,000, he estimated.

Gansett's steel and cement grandstand, clubhouse and admission building, however, sustained damage to the 80 ft. P. H. gale, with only the loss of the tarred felt and gravel roof coverings, breakage of glass and complete destruction of all awnings.

Harry L. Day's camera, perched on steeple of steel legs, fifty feet above the grandstand roof, and one hundred and forty feet above ground level, in some instances, fashion, came through unscathed.

Six barns were unroofed and four barns were leveled, as flat as a deck of cards, but stable accommodations for 1100 horses remain unscathed. The 1500 horses now stabled at the track, not one received a single scratch. The sheet metal hangar, used as a garage for track equipment, was wrecked, while windows and window frames from the radio booth, press box and judges stand were blown to the other side of the Park.

Judge Dooley was at the track throughout the hurricane and as soon as news of the disaster filtered in from outlying towns, he directed the track rolling stock to get going and help Narragansett's two huge watering trucks supplied the small town of Wickford with drinking water during the breakdown of the town's own regular supply. Every available carpenter, mechanic and laborer was put to work at Narragansett. Immediately, the storm damage and the park will be back in perfect shape for the opening of the fall meeting October 15.

Meanwhile, track officials held themselves in readiness to throw the facilities of the park open to horse men and others who might be in difficulties through the damage at Rockingham Park. Co-operation, not only with racing people but with the Rhode Island Administration, is the first desire of the officials, who feel their plant has received a heavy blow in the greatest disaster that ever befall Rhode Island.

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STORIES IN STAMPS

Vowed to Conquer Golden Peru
 RUGGED adventurer, Francisco Pizarro sailed for America in 1526. Four years later he had settled on a small island-borough in the new city of Panama, and from there he began a series of expeditions to the south of the isthmus. In 1531 he was Pizarro, with a small band of Spanish soldiers, able to invade Peru. He found the Incas in a virtual state of civil war. Atahualpa had completely defeated the forces of his brother, Huascar, and had taken him prisoner. Atahualpa was encamped at Caxamarca, and Pizarro set out for him with a force of only 150 foot soldiers, 62 horses and two small canoes.

Pizarro captured Atahualpa in the Caxamarca public square, but instead of releasing him after payment of a huge ransom in gold, he executed the great leader for refusal to embrace the Christian faith. Then, with re-enforcement, he entered the Peruvian capital, Cuzco, Nov. 15, 1532, stripped it of the hoards of gold set up a puppet ruler, and proceeded to arrange conquests of other Peruvian cities. Meanwhile, his protection he built Ciudad de los Reyes, the present Lima. But by now the Incas were thoroughly revolted in his old country.

In an ensuing civil war he fell beneath their swords. He was put to death finally in 1542. He is shown here on a Peruvian stamp of 1934.

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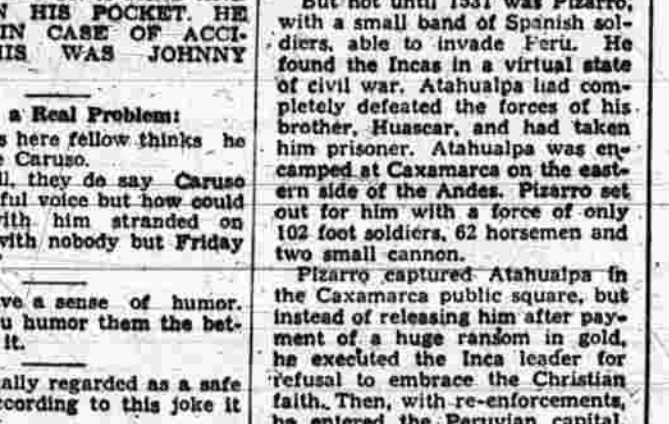

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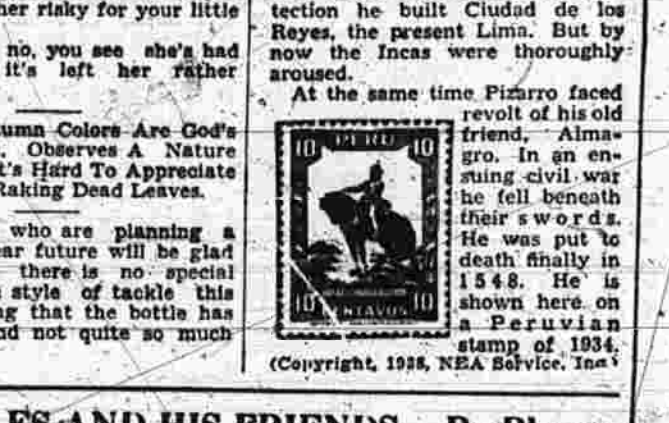
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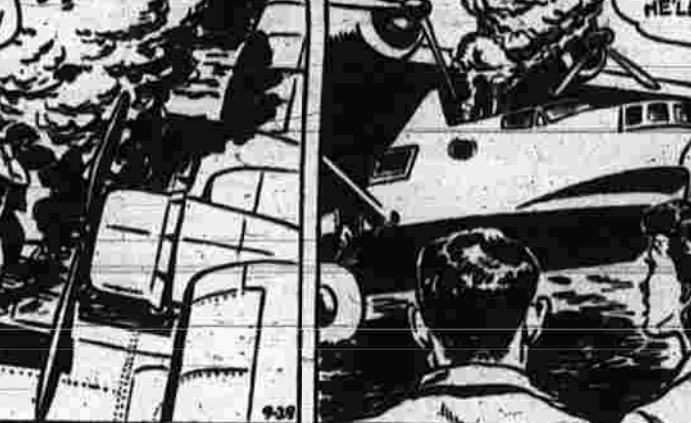
