

STATE LEGAL HEAD TO FIGHT ATTEMPT TO PASS BOND TAX

Attorney General Will Enter Courts to Oppose Taxation If Federal Government Secures Legislation.

New Haven, Oct. 11.—(A) — Attorney General Charles J. McLaughlin today informed the New Haven Register that he will fight to the last ditch any attempt of the Federal government to tax in any manner the obligations of the state and its subdivisions.

The attorney general, replying to an inquiry directed to him by the newspaper, said he would "enter the courts on behalf of the state and its investors and oppose such taxation as both unfair and unconstitutional" if the Federal government should legislate in Congress subjecting the state's proposed \$25,000,000 bond issue to taxation.

Further, he declared that if an attempt was made to subject outstanding securities to taxation by means of a constitutional amendment, he would "oppose the submission of such an amendment by Congress" and if unsuccessful, would "oppose ratification of such amendment by Connecticut" and would work toward similar action in "every other state."

The attorney general replied officially to a formal letter of inquiry sent to him by The Register as a result of widespread interest in the bond issue.

In his reply, the attorney general said his objective so long as he was attorney general of the state, was the removal of the proposed bond issue from the State Defense Conference on State Defense, which group has met and organized since the Federal taxation of state securities and now continues membership in 39 states.

ARTILLERY DUEL OVER KEY POINT

Chinese And Japanese Engage In Bitter Battle For Hills Near Yangsin.

Shanghai, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Artillery duels engaged in the Yangsin valley today as Chinese and Japanese fought a bitter battle for hills around Yangsin, key point southeast of Hankow.

The Japanese reported their forces closing in on the war-torn capital of Hankow from other directions. The offensive was intensified against Yangsin, which foreign military sources called the most important point in the present fighting, since occupation would be a prelude to sever the railroad south of Hankow thus cutting off vital communication lines to Canton.

It Days Attempting Capture.

The invaders have spent 77 days since capturing Kichiang, Yangtze river base 125 miles southeast of Hankow, in attempts to pierce strong Yangsin defense lines. Battles have been continued along a 30-mile front while the Japanese have tried to effect an encircling movement.

Chinese military attaches estimated the Chinese have had 1,100,000 casualties and the Japanese 250,000 in more than 15 months of fighting.

The Chinese reported they had surrounded two Japanese divisions near Yangsin, and killed 10,000 Japanese, and said, however, that their forces were advancing "on all fronts" toward Hankow.

HUNGARIAN SOLDIERS OCCUPY FIRST TOWN OVER CZECH BORDER

More Than 4,000 Residents Sing, Dance And Kiss Incoming Troops As Military Bands Play Fiery Music; Holiday Acclaimed As Ending 20 Years Of Mourning For People.

Polysag, on the Czechoslovak-Hungarian border, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Hungarian troops occupied this Czechoslovak border town at 1:30 p. m. (7:30 a. m., e.s.t.) today in the first actual transfer of territory in Hungary's drive to regain part of the land she lost to Czechoslovakia after the World War.

More than 4,000 residents of Polysag, 50 miles north of Bratislava, sang, danced and kissed the incoming Hungarian soldiers, whom they welcomed in the name of the dismembered Czechoslovakia.

Military bands played fiery Hungarian music. The day was celebrated as a Hungarian national holiday and acclaimed as ending 20 years of mourning for Hungarians in Czechoslovakia.

FRESH TROOPS MOVED IN.

Feston, Czechoslovak-Hungarian frontier, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The Czechoslovak government moved fresh troops into areas near the Hungarian border today while the forward movement of soldiers in other sections of the country followed highways and railroad routes.

New units of soldiers with heavy small arms cases took up positions at Konarov and other frontier towns ready to meet any possible military action by Hungary to take territory she wants from Slovakia.

Each officer commanding border soldiers stationed at a border town near Konarov ordered his officers to prevent any further desecration of the territory by Hungarians, and his officers were given an extremely difficult task to prevent any further desecration.

"Our men are desperate and broken hearted," the officer declared. "The world should have permitted us to fight."

The Czechoslovak government apparently was taking no chances of serious trouble developing with Hungary to defend what territory is left.

Great mass military movements were under way, particularly from frontier sections now occupied by German and Polish troops.

Equipment Being Moved.

Thousands of soldiers crowded into railway box cars, passenger trains, motor transports and old covered wagons. Some rode bicycles. Ambulances, army supply trucks, tents and other military equipment and cargoes of livestock were being moved along with the soldiers.

Every railway train in Czechoslovakia was thronged with soldiers. Thousands of men, women and children fled regions occupied by German troops. Railway schedules have been disrupted completely. There has been no dining car or sleeping car service on Czechoslovak trains.

Trains require four to five hundred miles to make a journey of a few hundred miles.

The penetration of German troops into the Ebro area severed the main railway line communications between Prague and Bratislava and forced a change to a substitute route.

Army field kitchens were established at railway fat cars and mobile messes served soldiers while trains waited for clear tracks.

FACES DESPERATE STRUGGLE.

Prague, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The Czechoslovak republic apparently is in a new and desperate struggle to preserve the independence of what is left of its territory.

As territorial negotiations with Hungary went on, Germany and Poland having already won their share, Prague was beset by increasing indications that German will reduce the republic to a satellite.

Informed circles here declared Germany had hinted it would force a further military advance only on condition Prague end its alliance with Soviet Russia and Finland.
