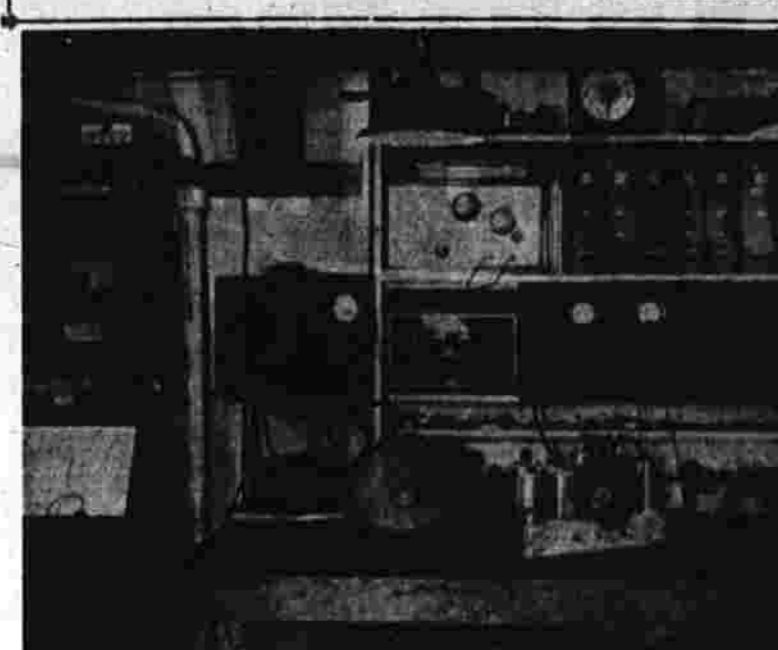

### SUGGESTS LEAVING EYES TO SCIENCE

**Declares Surgeons Frequently Can Restore Sight In Corneal Injuries.**

Washington, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Persons throughout the United States were urged today to will their eyes to science in order to restore the eyesight of other individuals.

Dr. Ramon Castroviejo of New York city, author of the proposal, said eye surgeons frequently can bring back the sight of persons who have suffered injuries to the cornea, or front covering of the eye.

In many cases, however, the tiny pieces of cornea necessary for grafting a new window into the eye are not available for replacement.

These tissues can be obtained from the eyes of stillborn infants or from corpses if the operation is performed soon after death, Dr. Castroviejo said.

Can He Preserve Several Days? It is possible to preserve the eyes in liquid solution for several days, he explained. Thus it would be possible to keep a supply on hand in the hospital refrigerator and to coordinate the number of operations with that supply.

Dr. Castroviejo also reported to the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology that he had successfully grafted the cornea of a blind eye with gold to restore its normal appearance.

### Lost Trade Advantages Restored By Agreement

Washington, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Domestic manufacturers and exporters to the United States lost to the British dominions six years ago are to be restored by the Anglo-American trade agreement soon to be signed here.

Under the Ottawa agreements of 1923 the United Kingdom gave the Dominion preferential tariff treatment for their agricultural and other natural products in return for preferential treatment of her manufactured goods.

From that time, officials here say, dates the practical loss of Britain as a market for United States goods.

The Anglo-American trade agreement will eliminate empire preference as to some American goods and lessen it as to some others.

What the Ottawa agreement did to the trade of the United States is told in a few figures.

Before Britain began a policy of self-protectionism in 1931, only 29.5 per cent of imports from the United States were dutiable. In 1932, before the Ottawa agreement, this percentage had risen to 70.5.

The trade of this country suffered more acutely than that of others because it was struck by the higher rates of duties. Before the Ottawa agreement British duties of more than 20 per cent caught only one per cent of American goods.

**AUTO-INTOXICATION.**

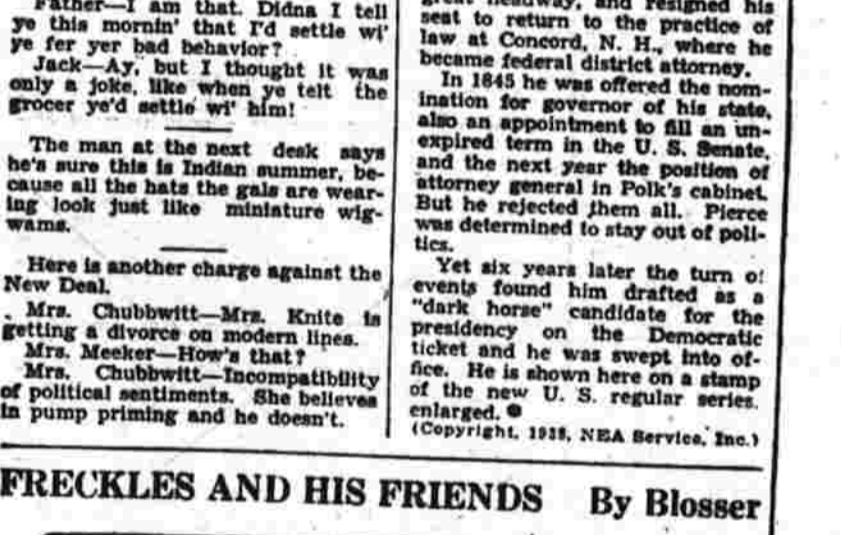
