

HAYES LOSES, KEMP IS GRANTED, RIGHT TO INSPECT RECORD

Supreme Court Rules Against Appeals in Waterbury and Merritt Parkway Cases As Not From Final Judgments

Hartford, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The Supreme Court of Errors in a decision handed down late yesterday dismissed the appeals of State Attorney Lorin Willis of Fairfield county from an order of Superior Court Judge Ernest A. Inglis denying them the right to inspect and examine the minutes of the Waterbury extraordinary Grand Jury.

It is not true—and the higher authority than exists for the statement that Chamberlain has merely availed himself of a sitting opportunity to serve notice upon Great Britain that, in compensation for the British-German agreement by which Britain is to maintain a navy superior to Germany's, the British are to have no right to a strength much less than Germany's. Hitler will insist that the superiority of the Reich's air arm should be as two to one, perhaps three to one.

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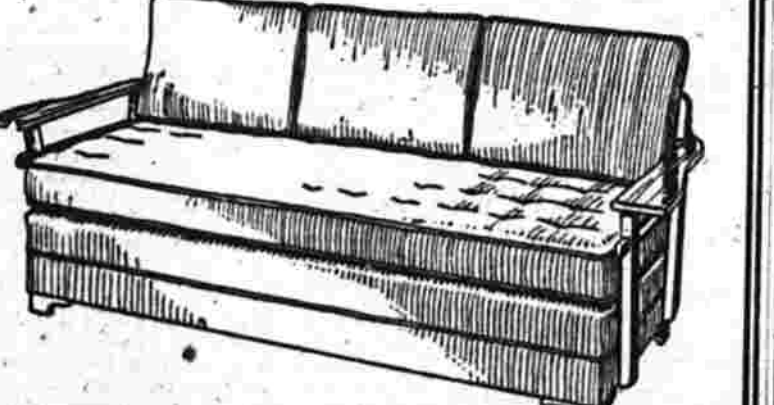
