SHIFTS WATERBURY CONSPIRACY CASES; NEW HAVEN SCENE

Judge Simpson Decides On Proposal Vigorously Opposed By Prosecutor; Courthouse Not Suitable.

Waterbury, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Judge Ernest C. Simpson ordered the Waterbury fraud cases shifted to New Haven, a proposal which was vigorously opposed recently by Special Prosecutor Hugh M. Alcorn.

The special prosecutor had asked the court that Mayor Frank Hayes and 30 others accused of conspiring to defraud Waterbury for more than a million dollars be tried outside of New Haven county.

In a six-page memorandum of decision, however, the Superior court judge held that, while the courthouse here was not suitable for the trial, Alcorn had not "premeditated" that trial "could not be held within the county."

In directing that the trials be shifted to New Haven, the county under a state statute which empowered the court to transfer cases pending before the Waterbury court to the New Haven court or vice versa.

Courthouse Lacks Facilities

Judge Simpson, who recently spent two days listening to arguments on Alcorn's motion for a change of venue, said that if the trial were held here "much confusion and inconvenience would necessarily result" because of the lack of courtroom facilities. That situation, the decision said, "would militate against proper presentation and consideration of these cases."

"But such inconveniences," the court ruled, "while they may occasion expense and result in the trial being more or less protracted and tedious, does not in my opinion constitute an objection to the venue being set in New Haven as proposed."

Alcorn, during the recent arguments, told the court he was as much opposed to the trial in New Haven as he was to keeping the cases here.

Hayes, who was accused of having the accused tried in Waterbury, but contended they had no objection to shifting them to New Haven.

Alcorn's motion did not specify.

COYNE SENTENCED FOR LIFE TERM

New Haven WPA Worker Changes Plea To 2nd Degree Murder Of Cop.

New Haven, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Thomas J. Coyne, 23-year-old former WPA worker, pleaded guilty in Superior court today to second degree murder in the fatal shooting of Policeman Edward H. Wendland. Coyne's plea halted his trial, beginning its third week today, on a first degree murder charge.

Judge Edwin C. Dickenson immediately sentenced Coyne to life imprisonment, mandatory under Connecticut law.

The state, seeking a first degree verdict and the death penalty, was about to take the jury to an alleyway beside the courthouse to view the squad car in which Wendland was killed on May 21 when Coyne's plea to the lesser charge was accepted.

Ready to Claim Acquittal

The defense, it is reported, had appeared through the questioning of prospective jurors when the panel to hear the trial was chosen and was ready to contend that Coyne's shooting of Wendland was an accident and not a premeditated act.

Wendland was killed after he had arrested Coyne in an alleyway as he came near the scene of the attempted hold-up of a cemetery caretaker.

Coyne was placed in the rear seat of Wendland's squad car and the officer started to drive to a precinct station. The car had proceeded only a few feet when Coyne sprang from the door onto the ground, Wendland, suffering from five bullet wounds, falling after him.

Coyne was arrested the next day, hiding in a barn in Hamden.

Eye witnesses testified in court that what had been a terrific struggle took place between Wendland and Coyne in the squad car.

Coyne contended he had no intention of shooting Wendland but that the officer saw him attempt to use a pistol under the seat cushion.

Officers Say Units Of Both Army And Navy Participated In Capture Of City On Yangtze, Goal Since Fall Of Nanking; Large Fires Reported As Water Supply Destroyed.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 25.—(AP)—The Japanese Army and Navy commands tonight announced that their forces had entered Hankow, China's provincial capital, abandoned by its defenders. Although details were lacking, Japanese officers said units of both services had participated in the capture of the great city on the middle Yangtze river, major goal of the Japanese conquest since Nanking fell nearly 11 months ago. Neutral services reaching Shanghai said retreating Chinese troops demolished several buildings. Large fires were reported in Hankow and adjoining cities of Wuhsung and HanYang. The city was without water, and a foreign-owned power company which was permitted to take over the waterworks was attempting to resume service. British AM Chinese Police. Patrols of British khaki-clad men operated with Chinese police in keeping order before entry of the Japanese. The first detachment to enter Hankow was an infantry column which previously had captured the city of Wuhsung and then moved on to Hankow. The British AM Chinese Police, Kail-shan, military and civil leader of the Chinese nation, was reported to have left Hankow by plane during the night, accompanied by his retreating staff, his American-attached wife, and his American-attached children. Announcement of the Japanese entry into Hankow was made in a joint communiqué from China headquarters of the Japanese army and navy. Warships Bound For Naval officers said they believed Japanese warships had reached the great inland port, 633 miles up the Yangtze, although exact positions of the vessels was not disclosed. Sixteen Japanese warships, including the battleship Yamato, were reported to be on a path way up the river. Withdrawal of the Chinese defenders "for strategic reasons" was reported to have been the result of the Japanese capture of the city. The greater part of the Chinese army managed to retreat to the westward, their commanders estimating it was in accordance with a decision to prolong resistance and not risk annihilation of their best units in defense of the Wuhan area. According to the latest estimates approximately 400,000 persons, including some 1,000 foreigners, remained in the three Wuhan cities when the Japanese arrived, less than a quarter of the normal population. CITY BURNING Hankow, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Great fires were burning tonight in this former Chinese provincial capital, abandoned by the Chinese army. Japanese were said to have been far distant from the heart of the city. Thirty hundred sets from the United States Navy Yangtze patrol tugboat Landon landed early this afternoon to protect American lives and interests. FIRE UNDER CONTROL Canton, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Canton's great fire appeared to be under control today but soldiers and sailors in the foreign settlement on Shamshan island continued wetting roofs as a precaution against sparks. Explosions still were heard as flames set off charges of dynamite buried beneath the hands, face and head, and his hair was burned from his scalp.
