JAPANESE ADVANCE OCCUPIES HANKOW WITHOUT DISORDER

Father Jacinot, Organizer of Refugee Safety Zone, Grets Invaders; Is Told Area Will Be Respected.

Hankow, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Orderly occupation of this former center of Chinese resistance by Japanese troops covering the city was shadowed today in the arrival of the first Japanese advance unit to reach the Hankow international area.

Among the first to greet the advance unit, which came by motor launch and later returned down the Yangtze river, was Father Jacinot, organizer of a refugee safety zone, who explained to Japanese the boundaries of the zone. The Japanese were said to have assured him the zone would be respected.

Up to 11 a. m., none of the large Japanese forces approaching Hankow had been seen in the international section, the district along the Yangtze river waterfront. (Subsequent Japanese dispatches to Shanghai said 26 Japanese naval vessels had reached a point off Hankow in the Yangtze river.)

Overland Column First
First Japanese troops to reach the Hankow area as it was abandoned by Chinese yesterday were part of an overland column which entered the southern outskirts. Other Japanese forces approaching the city were the Yangtze river gunboat contingent and the Hankow column on either side of the river.

Chinese dispatches to Shanghai reported Wuchang, one of the Hankow islands a mile across the Yangtze river from Shanghai, had been occupied after scattered fighting. Several thousand Chinese irregulars were reported retreating across the Yangtze river to Hankow, which is the Japanese base.

Several hundred Chinese army stragglers who refused to surrender their arms to Italian guards still were wandering through the streets of the Japanese concession.

American, British and Italian sailors were on duty in the former foreign concession which was made into the safety zone. French marines guarded the French concession.

Foreign commanders said there was no legal basis on which to demand Japanese request to take over the safety area, except in the French concession, which is under French rule.

COMPLETE OCCUPATION
Shanghai, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Japanese and foreign dispatches tonight reported that the Japanese Army had completed occupation of Hankow and its suburbs, Wuchang and Yangtze river islands. Japanese warships steamed up the Yangtze river to a position off Hankow's Japanese concession, the dispatches said, and Army units totalling several thousand men were on their way.

DUKE IS NAMED TO AUSTRALIAN GOVERNOR POST

Chamberlain Summons Cabinet For Heavy Session, Including Dominion Ties And Anglo-Italian Pact.

London, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain summoned his Cabinet for a heavy session today as Britons learned of the Duke of Kent's appointment as governor general of Australia to further strengthen ties of the Dominion with the crown.

Britain frequently in the past few years has been buffeted by European crisis, and political quarters saw in the Duke's assignment obvious British determination to link the far-flung empire into a cohesive group before next storm strikes.

Germany on the colonial question is being observed with interest. The Duke's appointment is a part of a series of moves designed to strengthen ties of the Dominion with the crown.

King George's last night announced the appointment of the 30-year-old Duke of Kent to succeed the Duke of Devonshire in 1939, and it appeared clearly to the pattern of strengthening ties of empire by emphasis on the crown as a symbol of unity.

Prague, Oct. 26.—(AP)—A Czech government official replied today to Hungary's demands for territory in Slovakia and Ruthenia through a note sent to the Hungarian minister.

The response, decided on yesterday at a meeting of the three governments, the National, autonomous Slovak and autonomous Ruthenian, was understood in sources close to the Foreign Ministry to have refused the newest Hungarian demands but to have left a way open for further negotiations.

The President's proclamation, issued in conformity with various congressional resolutions, said: "It is especially fitting at this time of world unrest that the 11th day of the month should be observed with suitable ceremonies manifesting our belief that peace can be attained only by non-aggression, and can be made enduring only by respect for the rights of other nations." EXPECT INCREASED TAX PUT ON LITTLE FELLOW

Federal Experts in Search For More Revenue to Pay For Armaments, Relief and Other Costs.

Little's rate: Higher taxes for the child are being discussed in the following analysis of individual income tax problems, the second of four articles.

Washington, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Little man, the federal tax expert is looking you over in his search for more revenue to pay for armaments, relief and other governmental cost.

He has tapped the high income brackets about all they can stand, and he is wondering if it is possible and economically feasible to tax the little fellow.

Last year \$4,459 persons had income tax returns. Of these, 2,067,836 were non-taxable, 2,337,717 had income of less than \$1,000 and only 61 had incomes of more than \$1,000,000.

Senator La Follette (Prog.-Wis.), an opponent of broadening the tax base, has suggested both a reduction of personal exemptions and an increase in rates for income below \$100,000. Thus proposals for the little fellow would mean a 20 per cent increase in his tax.

Both affected by percentage. Both the little and big fellows also would be affected by proposals to increase income taxes 10 per cent.

The present individual exemption is \$1,000 for a single person and \$2,000 for the head of a family. A proposal to increase this to \$2,000 for a single person and \$4,000 for a family head, thousands of whom had to file returns last year, would draw into the collector's net.

The so-called normal income tax rate on individuals is a flat 4 per cent, but the average rate on the additional 4 per cent on net incomes between \$4,000 and \$5,000 is 7 1/2 per cent on incomes of more than \$5,000,000.

La Follette has asked that rates be levied 2 to 10 per cent for income class up to \$100,000. He has estimated that the additional revenue would be \$255,000,000. Total individual income tax levied in the last fiscal year was \$1,252,118,211. A strategy of 10 per cent additional armaments tax would add \$100,000,000 to individual income taxes.

Worthy Also Face Problems. Most worthy persons also face income tax problems next year. The Child Tax Credit, which allows a credit of \$100 from their income for each child under 14, will expire on June 30, 1939.

Before the 1938 act, capital gains realized within a year were taxed in full the same as other income. If the gain was realized in from one to two years only 50 per cent of the gain was taxed. Between 3 and 5 years 40 per cent, and over 10 years 30 per cent. Capital losses were valued at the same as realized gains but could be deducted only from capital gains.

Fluctuating Contended These rates discouraged wealthy persons from investing their surplus funds in industry, and the loss Congress liberalized deductions for the depreciation of property. It changed the rates so that gains held 18 to 24 months and those held more than 24 months and those held more than 18 months are taxed the same as other income.

FDR Asks For Repeal. The maximum on the long-time gains drew Mr. Roosevelt's criticism and he has asked for their repeal. Both little and big taxpayers also may be affected by the proposal to request for abolition of exemptions on future government security issues and salaries of federal, state and local government.

The Treasury estimates the new yield \$10,000,000 a year, and the new revenue from government bonds would be insignificant for many years, until existing issues are refunded.

If all the federal and local bonds outstanding were fully taxable, the additional revenue would be about \$70,000,000 on each variety, making possible eventually an additional revenue of \$140,000,000 from the redemption repeal proposal.
