AMERICANS, BRITISH MAY UNITE TO HALT MONOPOLY BY JAPS

Business Men In Shanghai Discuss United Front Against Move By Jap- nese To Capture Trade

Shanghai, Oct. 29.—(AP)—American and British Chambers of Commerce in Shanghai met jointly today to discuss a united front against Japanese efforts to monopolize Chinese trade.

The move came as the Chinese press reported Japanese firms were rapidly establishing sales offices in all conquered cities and towns to handle goods while foreign trade is blocked by the Japanese military.

Representatives of American commercial and cultural interests in China expressed hope yesterday that the United States would get a "satisfactory" reply to the Oct. 6 protest to Japan.

The United States protest to Tokyo warned against closing the "open door" and charged "unwarranted" interference with American rights in the Far East.

The Japanese government, it is charged, is "encouraging the Japanese to further monopolistic encroachments and eventually bring about a complete control of the United States."

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NOMINEES TURN TO BIG VERBAL BLASTS ON AIR

Baldwin and McLevy Tote Burden For Parties While Democrats Have Farley As Well As State Figures

(By Associated Press)

With only ten more campaigning days left before the election, most of Connecticut's office seekers welded big verbal cudgels over the radio last night.

While Raymond E. Baldwin and Jasper McLevy, gubernatorial candidates for the Republicans and Democrats respectively, addressed the radio campaign addresses, the Democrats produced virtually their every major candidate and a national figure as well in a unique "organization meeting" of the air.

Included on the Democratic speech roll were Postmaster General James A. Farley, Gov. Wilbur L. Cross, U. S. Senator Augustus Hand, and Gov. Thomas H. Howe, candidate for lieutenant governor.

Baldwin's voice relayed from New York by telephone and thence disseminated by radio from three Connecticut stations—told Connecticut voters that the election of a Republican would "arm with political power and political influence the omnipotent forces of reaction."

While the Republicans are terming the national administration a failure, the national chairman said, they are praising its objectives.

"I know," Farley said, "that they are endorsing, or at least failing to oppose, practically all of the major policies of the administration. I know also that they are offering no concrete and definite suggestions as to how they would do the things that are being courageously faced and successfully handled by President Roosevelt."

Baldwin, criticizing the Democratic state party as a "machine," asserted to his fellow-candidates that he would not be a candidate in any city anywhere.

Democratic State Chairman J. Francis Smith, the Republican standard bearer, said, urged Lt. Gov. Frank Hayes' election as mayor of Waterbury shortly before the latter was mentioned in the municipal ward caucus.

AS MUCH SPENT AS JOBS TO PAY

Cost To Candidates Matter Of Conjecture But Will Near \$11,500,000 Wages

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Eleven and a half million dollars worth of top state and Federal jobs will be handed out by the voters next Tuesday.

How much it will cost the candidates and their supporters to win, or how these jobs will largely a matter of conjecture; but if the spending runs true to past performances, it will cost at least eleven and a half million dollars.

How jobs figure out like this: Thirty-two governors are being elected. Their terms range from two to four years. They are worth \$20,000 a year in South Dakota to \$50,000 a year in letters. The jobs are being sought by 112 candidates. Salaries for terms run up to a total of \$975,800.

Thirty-five Senators are being elected from among 127 contestants. The pay is \$10,000 a year. Figures for the three short terms vacancies in the "ad terms" and the 10 full six-year terms, the 117 candidates are tussling for a share of \$2,040,000 in salary.

All house seats save the three already filled by the early Maine election are to be handed out. There are 423 of these, with 972 trying to get them. The pay is \$10,000 a year and they last for two years. That runs up to a total of \$8,400,000.

Postage Makes Up Difference. These all add up to \$11,500,000 a year. But there is almost enough free postage involved to make up the difference, without considering traveling expenses and incidental allowances.

The figures on election costs are always hard to get. A House Committee last year made up a report on the 1936 election. It aired experts' estimates.

BOARD REPORT ON RAIL ROW TO FDR TODAY

White House Aids Assert Conclusions Will Be Made Public As Soon As Feasible After F.D.R.'s Study.

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's fact-finding board put into final form for delivery to the White House today its report on the deadlock between railroad labor and management.

"We are attempting to give a personal touch to the campaign with speeches rallies," said the C. O. P. "In the place of old-fashioned oratory we have substituted handshaking festivals."

The board was appointed a year ago to investigate the causes of the strike and to recommend a 15 per cent wage reduction.

Mr. Roosevelt arranged to receive the report at 12:30 p. m. today. The public as soon as feasible after the President had studied it, probably during the afternoon.

None of the board members would give any hint as to what conclusions they had reached in their effort to avert the strike voted by nearly 1,000,000 rail workers in protest against the wage cut.

FORGED PAPERS USED TO SHIP WAR AIRCRAFT

Sending Of 40 American Planes To Spain Is Made Subject Of Probe By U. S. And Canada Governments

Washington, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Federal agents and the Canadian government are investigating the illegal shipping of about 40 American airplanes to Loyalist Spain.

The State Department disclosed last night that the airplanes had been made despite the neutrality law which forbids sending war materials to Spain. It said they were accompanied by use of what it now appeared were forged documents.

The aircraft were among fifty German planes which were ordered from a Canadian company by a Paris agent of the Spanish government. That the agent presented with the order documents to show that Turkey was the destination of the shipments.

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Oct. 29.—(AP)—With its new president pledging himself to work in co-operation with the SEC for reopening of the capital markets, and a promise to make predictions of an increasing demand for capital to finance higher standards of living, the investment bankers association of America concluded its 46-year-old convention in an address prepared for his induction into the association's presidency.

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UNION OF 2 GREAT CHURCHES LIKELY

Prospects Of Episcopal- Presbyterian Merger Adv- vanced By Conferee Body

New York, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Prospects for the eventual union of Protestant Episcopal and Presbyterian churches in the United States assumed a brighter hue today as the result of the adoption of a platform for the merger by commissions representing the two denominations.

As another step in the first official efforts in a half century at organic unity, the commission adopted a platform which with a few minor changes is the same as approved by the Church of Scotland (Episcopalian) and the church of England (Presbyterian) in a joint conference from 1922 to 1924.

The commissions, which concluded a two day session yesterday, also approved a concordat, a statement of the primary difficulty lies in the differing views of the two churches on the subject of the sacraments.

The platform and concordat will be considered by the Presbyterian General Assembly in Cleveland in May and by the Episcopal Convention in Kansas City in 1940. A church with 3,100,000 members and 5,800,000 adherents will be created by the merger, members of the commission said.

In subsequent years they did much to make use of the great property of radium and to place it at the disposal of a waiting humanity.

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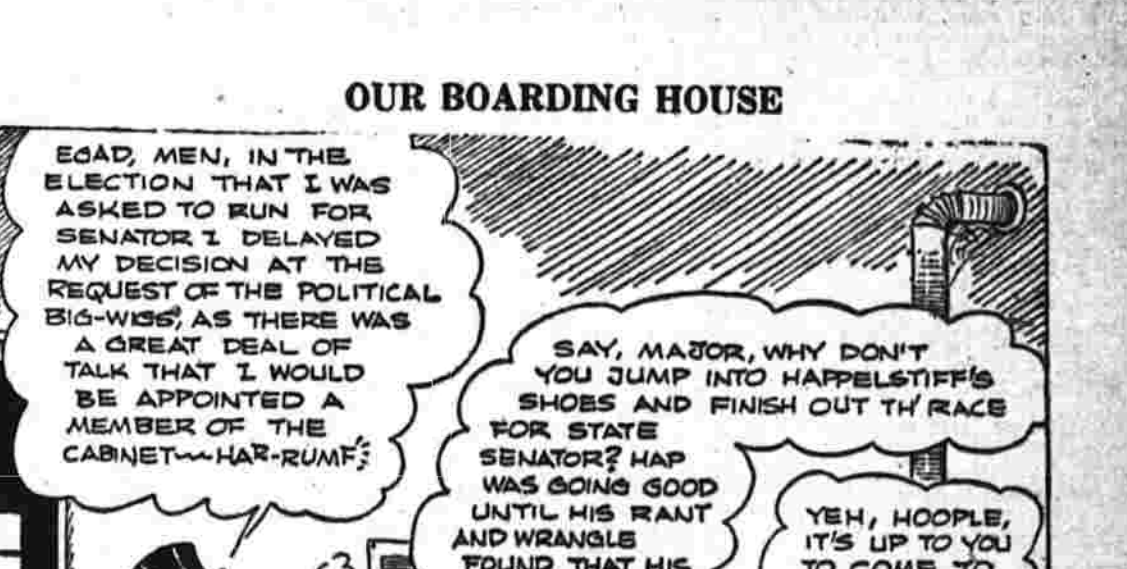
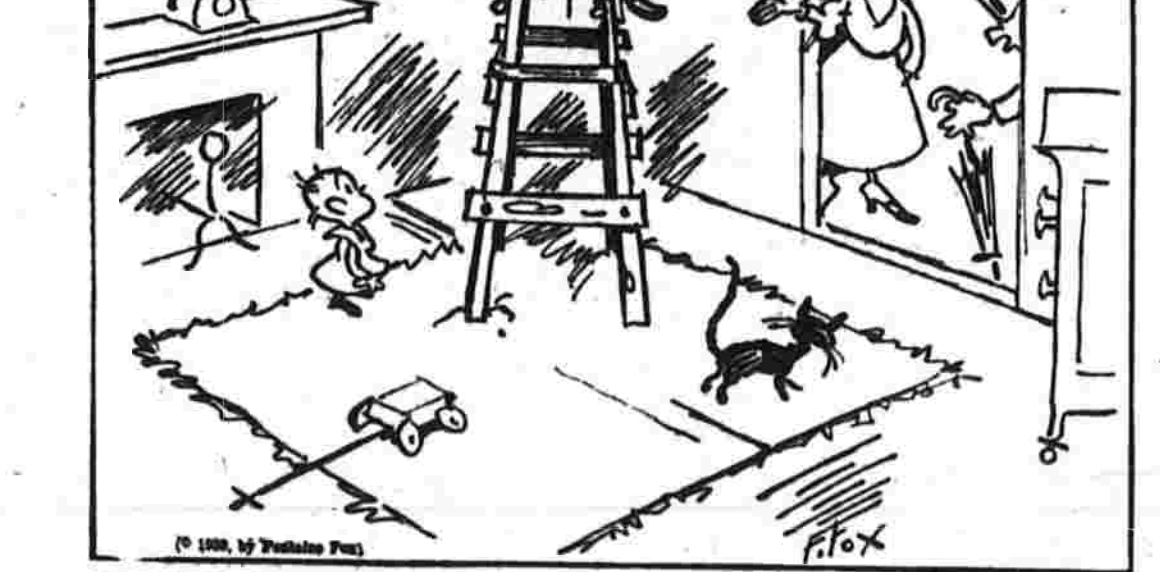

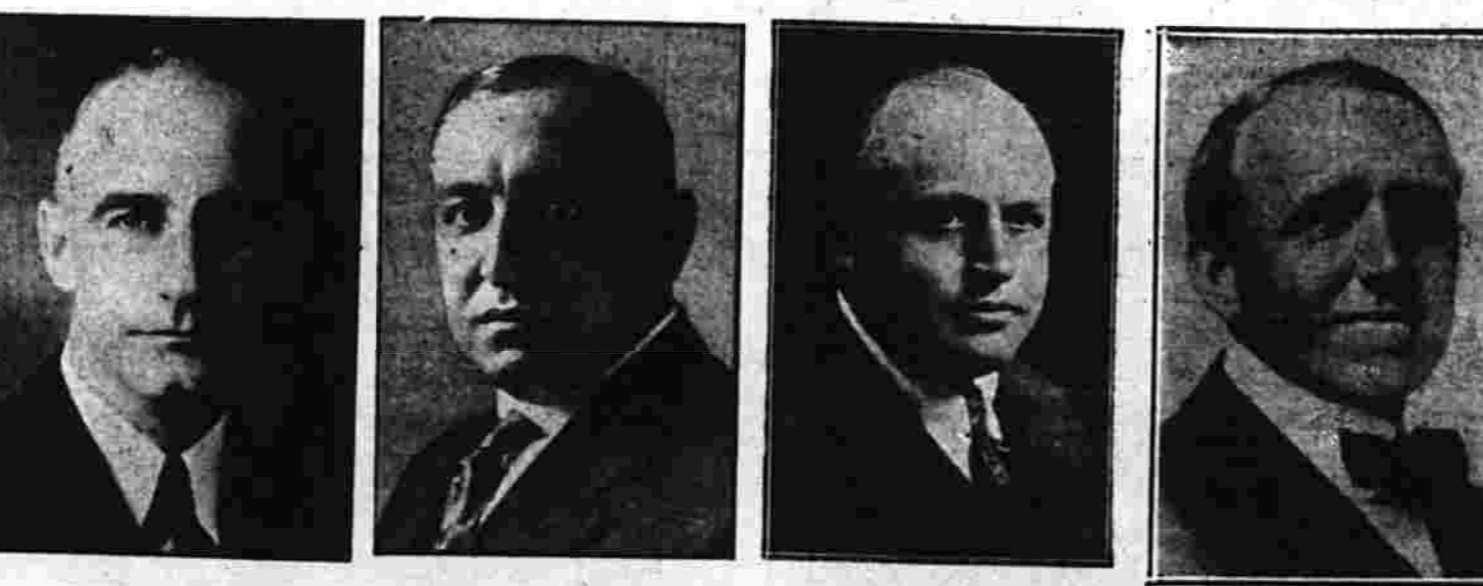
