250 Women Seek Election To Public Offices Tuesday

Washington, Nov. 7 -- (AP) -3 S7 Seek Seats In House Women candidates from kitchens, Thirty-seven women from 15 law offices, school rooms, farms and states, including five incumbents, labor unions are asking the voters aim at seats in the House of Repreonce more to let them help run national, state and local governments.
