BALDWIN ELECTED GOVERNOR

JASPER WINS VICTORY HERE AS LOCAL GOP SMASHES DEMOS 2-1

Showing Surprising Strength
McLevy Wrests Lead Of
173 Over Baldwin, Cross
Trails, Cheney, Thornton
Winners While Other Re-
publicans Gain Easily
Over Democratic Ticket.

Manchester will not soon forget its 1938 state election, packed with surprises, highly gratifying to the large Republican majority in the town, debated technically by Democrats, who see in the record vote an indication of new strength, even though they lost badly, not most of all, Manchester who lost to the victor given to Jasper McLevy who led both of his opponents in the gubernatorial race by 173 net votes. From the start, Cross and his ticket held a chance in town, but no one suspected that McLevy would run away from Baldwin, the Republican nominee.

Walter McLevy supporters had given him a chance to take from 500 to 1,000 votes here. As it turned out, Jasper got 5,338, Baldwin 3,169, and Cross 2,430.

Manchester elected two Republicans to the General Assembly, William C. Cheney getting 4,830 to Edward J. Murphy's 2,743, and William J. Thornton leading Jay E. Rubinow 4,550 to 2,700. Running for the state senate, William J. Shaw drew 4,717 in his home town, against Thresher, his Democratic rival, who netted 2,447.

William S. Hyde, endorsed by Democrats, as well as by his own party of which he is town chairman, drew 2,663 Democratic votes and 4,300 Republican votes, giving him a total of 7,191 for Judge of Probate in this district.

Outside the local candidates, in the state ticket at large, the challenger gave the Republican ticket about 2 to 1 support.

All time of year high voter turnout was recorded at yesterday's election, this being one of the important points in itself. Of the approximately 11,000 registered voters in Manchester, 8,421 voted yesterday, only 259 less than started the local Democratic landslide in 1935.

RESULT RAISES G. O. P. HOPES OF 1940 VICTORY

Gains in "Enemy Country"
Seen As Win Over New
Deal; But Election May
Force Third Term Fight.

Washington, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The Republicans counted their winnings today with a wistful eye toward 1940.

For the first time since 1928 they found pay dirt in the election booths of the nation. It was not enough to give them control of national affairs, still, it was more than the Democrats had figured they would gain.

They piled the new winnings against the thin electoral baggage of Maine and Vermont and kindled them into a new glow of hope. This came more from the governorships they had captured and the spirited voting their candidates had inspired than from their Congressional gains.

News of their winnings in House and Senate were not strong enough to give them more than a stage whisper of optimism to the Roosevelt program, except when coupled with disquiet Democrats.

Yet, whatever the election may betoken for the Republicans in 1940, it may easily be set down as the date for the opening of a new era in the annals of the Roosevelt administration.

Heretofore, the Democrats have moved steadily ahead with the Roosevelt program. Top-heavy majorities in House and Senate have justified in House and Senate; have enacted statute after statute, and each new election has given the party added strength and vigor.

Not until the Congress did President Roosevelt meet any forceful opposition on Capitol Hill, and even then he was beaten only by revolt in his own party. Nor did his defeats on the Court Bill and the Government Reorganization Bill stop the development of other phases of his economic and social program.

The new election and the scope of the Republican showing makes it clear, however, that every new step the President takes toward expanding and bolstering his program will be well served for pitfalls.

Threat to Party Lead

On some of the proposals likely to come before Congress, the color of the Democrats elected in the 1938 election is so spotted as to make it uncertain just what party lineup might obtain. For instance, a new demand for the Social Security Act is certain to be raised. A bill already has been drafted. It is a measure which will find supporters and opponents among the parties.

Mr. Roosevelt would not be expected to abandon the Social Security Act, which he so laboriously worked out. Yet the trend in yesterday's voting certainly will be to curtail it.

WOMEN SOLONS MAY BE FEWER

Despite Fact There Will Be
Two Female Senators
Losses Expected In House

Washington, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The nation's women lawmakers probably will be less numerous in the next Congress as a result of yesterday's elections—despite the fact that for the next two months there will be not one, but two, women senators.

The only woman senator last session, Mrs. Hattie Caraway, Arkansas Democrat, was re-elected easily. Her real battle was fought weeks ago in the primaries.

Successful in another Senate race was Miss Gladys Pyle of South Dakota, a former secretary of state, who ran as a Republican nominee against J. McChesney, Sr., for.

SOCIALISTS HOLD SENATE CONTROL

Republicans Elect 16 Mem-
bers As Democrats Gain
17 Seats In Assembly.

Hartford, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The Socialists, as in the 1935 session when they dramatically delayed the legislation of Gov. Wilbur Cross while bargaining with the balance of the Senate, today in the General Assembly, on the basis of unofficial election returns today.

Of the 35 members of that body, the Democrats elected 17, the Republicans 16 and the Socialists two. No party having a clear majority, a coalition must be formed before the senate can be organized.

One of the two Socialists elected from Bridgeport, Ansonia, J. Secor, is a veteran of the 1935 session and was a member of the Socialist bloc of the three which joined forces with the Democrats to control the Senate after blocking the governor's suspension until the second legislative day.

Gain Seven Senate Seats

The Republicans, although failing to win control, picked up seven seats in the Senate and needed twenty to fill the term that will expire June 30. The Socialists also gained seven seats.

G O P VICTORIES HIT NEW DEAL IN 12 STATES

Democrats Suffer First Major
Election Reverse Since
Roosevelt Chosen Presi-
dent Six Years Ago.

The Republican party hit the comeback trail of political power today by upsetting Democratic regimens in a dozen strategic states, among them Pennsylvania.

It delivered to the New Deal the first major election reverse since Franklin Roosevelt was chosen president six years ago. The Democrats, nevertheless, retained control of Congress and more than half the governorships.

About a dozen Republicans contested successfully for governorships now held by Democrats. Eight Republican aspirants won Democratic seats in the senate.

A return continued to come in, more than 50 house seats switched from the Democratic to the Republican side.

In the two biggest state elections—New York and Pennsylvania—the major parties split even.

Gov. Herbert H. Lehman, New York Democrat, won re-election over Thomas E. Dewey after exciting hours of vote-counting in which first one and then the other pulled ahead.

Senator Robert F. Wagner (D, N. Y.), a staunch Roosevelt supporter, also outdistanced his Republican rival and Rep. James M. Moad (D.), was chosen to fill the seat made vacant by the death of Senator Royal S. Copeland.

In nearby Pennsylvania, just about the reverse occurred. George H. Earle, who gave the state a "Little New Deal," failed in his effort to unseat Republican Senator Arthur H. James, who campaigned a promise to undo most of what Earle has done, was elected Democratic opponent was Charles Alvin Jones.

South Bend, Ind., did not elect a Democrat. The Democratic line remains intact across the middle and northern sections of the country as the Republicans counted governorships in these states which, at least for the last two years, the Democrats had ruled.

Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Kansas, Massachusetts, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Michigan, Ohio and Wyoming.

They also captured the Wisconsin administration from Gov. Philip La Follette, head of the Progressive party, and appeared to give the party a win in Minnesota, where the Farmer-Laborites have been in power since 1935.

Senate upturns were not as large, but they far exceeded Democratic predictions of what the Republicans would win. In addition to Pennsylvania, Republicans captured Democratic Senate seats in Connecticut, Kansas, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

"Return to Economic Sanity"

Glenn Frazier, chairman of the Republican national program committee, hailed these results as evidence of a "return to political and economic sanity."

The drift toward a virtually one-party nation, with the vindictive intolerance that goes with it, has been stopped," he said.

The Republicans on the other hand, lost the Maryland governorship. In California there was a prospect of a Democratic governor for the first time in 40 years. Earl Warren, a Republican, was elected.

WORLD PROBLEMS FACE MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

Newly Elected Body Must
Decide Question Of Huge
Armament, Changes Or
Repeal Of Neutrality Laws

Washington, Nov. 9.—(AP)—International problems of prime importance will confront the 1939 Congress. Soon after the newly-elected lawmakers take their seats, President Roosevelt will probably ask them to vote for unprecedented peacetime armament appropriations designed to modernize America's defenses in the light of troubled world conditions. Reliable estimates fix the probable 1939 defense bill at \$1,300,000,000. A navy and air force surplused by none and the most efficient army in the world are the objectives.

The 1939 congress also will be called on to decide what to do with the "cash and carry" provision of the neutrality act which expires May 1 of next year.

The provision says the President may require supplies purchased in this country for a belligerent to be paid for before they leave these shores, and he cannot have the Republican party must direct its efforts towards bringing a permanent recovery.

Congratulating Baldwin upon his victory, which unofficial figures showed was a plurality of 2,603 Governor Cross said:

"Soon I will become a private citizen and as such shall always maintain my interest in public affairs.

"My best wishes now go to Mr. Baldwin as he assumes the great office I have held for eight years.

"There await his opportunities for large services which I am certain he will perform to the very best of his abilities and with honor to the state of Connecticut."

Baldwin said that the "gains made by Republicans in the federal Congress assure a return to a government based upon sound constitutional principles. The Republican party again met a great crisis and found the support of the people.

"In Connecticut we stand pledged to a fulfillment of our entire party platform."

He said his state party is "inwardly congratulating Mayor McLevy upon his vigorous campaign," said Baldwin in concluding his message and friendly message and his personal wishes.
