3 JUSTICES ORDER VOTES AT WINSTED BROUGHT TO COURT

Ballots Improperly Rejected, Erroneously Counted And Utmost Confusion Existed Supreme Judges Told.

Hartford, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Three supreme court justices and four lawyers started a recount this afternoon of the contested election ballots of Winsted in the Fifth Congressional district.

Upon reconvening the hearing on charges of irregularities in last week's election, Justice Newell E. Jennings stated that he and the other two justices were unanimous in the opinion that under the statute, the ballots should be recounted.

He proposed that the three justices would count the more than 400 disputed ballots from Winsted and that two lawyers from each side of the hearing would count the undisputed ballots, totaling more than 3,900.

This suggestion met with the approval of both sides and the seven men went to work. Ballots were "improperly rejected," "erroneously counted" and "utmost confusion existed," the justices were told today at a hearing.

Leut. Col. Roy E. Rice, Republican candidate for U. S. representative who was defeated at the election last week by Congressman Joseph Smith, present incumbent by a majority of 284 votes, brought about the hearing by filing a complaint of irregularities in the voting in the Fifth Congressional district.

Typical of Other Towns With the opening of the hearing Attorney Benjamin Bronson of Waterbury, counsel for Rice, offered to confine the hearing to Winsted as typical of the nine other towns in which there are alleged to be similar irregularities in the voting.

Attorney Bronson said that 411 ballots in Winsted were "improperly rejected, counted in utmost confusion" and that there was error in the counting of ballots as cast.

He said, "If the court finds no error in Winsted, we won't proceed with the other towns. Offers Denounced To Complicate State's Attorney William Fitzgerald of Waterbury, counsel for Congressman Smith, immediately offered amendments to the complaint covering all of the ten towns named in the complaint, arguing that these should be present in any case.

The argument this morning centered around Winsted, Waterbury and Derby. The latter two towns voted by machine and others by paper ballot.

The remaining seven towns in which it is charged there was irregularities are New Hartford, Cornwall, Colchester, Waterbury, Prospect, Bridgewater, Oxford. In denying the complaint, Attorney Fitzgerald frequently cited sections.

SILVER SHIRTS LED BY NAVAL RESERVE MAN Dies Committee Investigator Asserts Intelligence Service Officer Organizer Of Group In Pittsburgh Area

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—House investigators received testimony today that Charles Bruce Swift, described as in charge of Naval Intelligence Service in Washington, was an organizer and leader of the Silver Shirts in that region.

John C. Metcalf, investigator for the House Committee on American activities, said Swift, a reserve officer, had been given his naval assignment by a Captain Paul, formerly chief of the Naval Intelligence Service in Washington.

(Capt. William D. Pullerton retired from active service early in 1937 after completing his term as naval intelligence chief. Rear Admiral Robert H. Holmes is now head of that naval branch.)

Communists in Rubber Strike The next committee witness, C. Nelson Sparks, former mayor of Akron, O., testified that Communists had taken a prominent part in a strike in the Goodyear Rubber plant in Akron. The strike began Feb. 17, 1935.

Sparks declared that approximately 200 men started the strike although "the bulk of the workers were not in favor" of it. In order to obtain pickets, he added "508 calls were sent out all over northern Ohio for reinforcements."

A slightly built elderly man with a large brief case beside him, Sparks said he had been chairman of the Law and Order League during the strike. After it had ended, he asserted, a Communist leader, John Williamson, spoke at a meeting in an Akron hotel in which he called the strike a "glorious vicious railroad paralleling the former mayor said Williamson.

MILK AND ICE CREAM PROBE RESULTS IN 97 CONSPIRACY CHARGES

Dissemt Signs Arise in Path of Pact Plans Chamberlain's Own Conservative Party Members Lay Down Strong Declarations On Colonies, Rearmament

Paris, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A French government spokesman announced today that a heads had been reached in an accord between France and Germany renouncing war against each other and hinted that it would not be long before it came into force.

This was the first official confirmation that the pact would be signed. The spokesman said that the pact would be signed in the near future and that it would be a step toward an anti-Chamberlain party union.

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Chicago, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Twenty-seven organizations and individuals in the fluid milk and ice cream industries and allied groups were accused of anti-trust law violations today in two Federal indictments.

U. S. District Attorney Michael L. Lee announced the number of organizations and 43 individuals in the milk indictment and 50 individuals and 20 organizations in the ice cream indictment.

Among the defendants were Dr. Herman N. Bunneman, president of the Chicago Board of Health, and Daniel Gilbert, chief of the Cook county (Chicago) state's attorney's office.

The indictments, returned Nov. 5 by a grand jury that climaxed a year-long inquiry by the Department of Justice with 16 weeks of its own investigation, had been suppressed until the government's request was granted today. They alleged that the defendants had conspired to fix the price of milk and ice cream.

That an illegal combination and conspiracy of nationwide proportions existed in the ice cream industry, the government charged, was proved by the fact that the defendants had conspired to fix the price of milk and ice cream.

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WILSON CANCELS VISIT TO HASTEN TRIP HOME

Summons From Washington Results in Change Of Plans By Ambassador To Journey To England.

Berlin, Nov. 15.—(AP)—United States Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson said today he had cancelled a planned visit to England and would leave tomorrow for the United States as a result of an urgent summons from Washington.

He did not disclose the purpose of the summons, but informed correspondents that it was called to go over the entire German situation with special emphasis on the anti-Jewish waves of the past week.

Wilson prepared to sail from London Thursday on the United States liner Manhattan. Two weeks ago he announced privately to correspondents he contemplated a routine trip to the United States by way of London.

Officials said the instructions for Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson to come to Washington were no secret. They added, however, that the step was taken only in view of the German situation.

Shortly after the announcement of his return was made last night, Senator King (D., Utah), proposed that the United States sever diplomatic relations with Germany, if Germany continued its abuse of Jews.

Protest Anti-Semitic Measures Geney spoke on a nation-wide radio symposium in which Secretary J. Edgar Hoover, Alfred M. Landon and religious leaders protested against anti-Semitic measures in the Reich.

"No nation can live upon itself alone," said J. Edgar Hoover. "The time comes when neither man nor nation can live without the decent respect of the other."

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FRANCO RETAKES RIGHT EBRO BANK

Insurgents Capture Many Prisoners, Seize Valuable Store Of Equipment.

With Spanish Insurgent Forces on the Ebro Front, Nov. 15.—(AP) Franco virtually completed his reconquest of the right bank of the lower Ebro river today by sweeping maneuvers of two Army corps.

The insurgents captured many prisoners and seized valuable stores of equipment, including tanks, trucks, and other military supplies.

General Franco's forces consolidated their lines along the river bank in northeastern Spain between the junction of the Matarranya river and the Ebro below Fayon and a point nearly a mile and a half west of Ribarroja. They occupied the area, including the Matarranya railroad paralleling the river.

WORLD GIVEN HINT AMERICA MAY PROTEST

Officials Say Instructions For Envoy's Return Not Interruption Of Diplomatic Relations With Nazis.

Washington, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A sudden order calling the American envoy to Berlin home for "report and consultation" gave the world today a clear hint that the United States government was displeased with Germany's treatment of Jews.

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CHANGSHA DOOMED HERE JAPS ARRIVE

Chinese Troops Burn Buildings As Populace Panic Stricken By Invasion.

Shanghai, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Changsha, capital of Hunan province and next major objective of the Japanese, appeared today to be doomed to virtually complete destruction by fire before the Japanese arrive.

Fragmentary advice reaching Shanghai indicated the populace of the city was panic-stricken at the prospect of a Japanese invasion.

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TORRINGTON MAN KILLED IN FALL

Rope Suspended Scaffold Swings Outward To Let Worker Drop At Hartford

Hartford, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Theodore E. Blount, about 45, of Torrington, was killed almost instantly this morning when he fell some 50 feet to the sidewalk from a scaffold at the Professional Building, 179 Albany street.

Mr. Blount and R. J. Palmer of East Hartford, were inspecting the fourth floor windows of the building with cork when the accident happened.

Somehow the scaffold, suspended by ropes, swung outward and Mr. Blount fell between the platform and the building according to Policeman Moore Storr.

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King Carol Draws Acclaim For Remoulding Rumania

Bucharest, Rumania, Nov. 15.—King Carol, having squared the account of his own set himself up virtually as dictator last May, is remoulding his country so energetically and so much to the liking of the public as to win the acclaim not only of his own people but of neutral observers.

Good as his last responsible days of 1925—he was 33 then—which led him to renounce accession to the throne. Today he is the strong man of Rumania. The Hohenzollerns always have developed responsibility late in life, and Carol seems to have been no exception.

So far as I can find, about the only folk who do not approve of the king's activities are the political radicals against whom he declared a martial law.

Sounda Clean Constitution

A fresh scandal which has uncovered has caused general consternation. It is charged that because of graft the Army is not properly equipped, and that much of the equipment that has been bought is of inferior quality.

This blow fell just at the time of the East-European crisis, when most countries had their soldiers under arms. Rumania already was terribly worried as to how Herr Hitler's intentions might be toward this rich area which amongst other treasures possesses the oil he needs so badly. She is still terribly worried, for that matter.

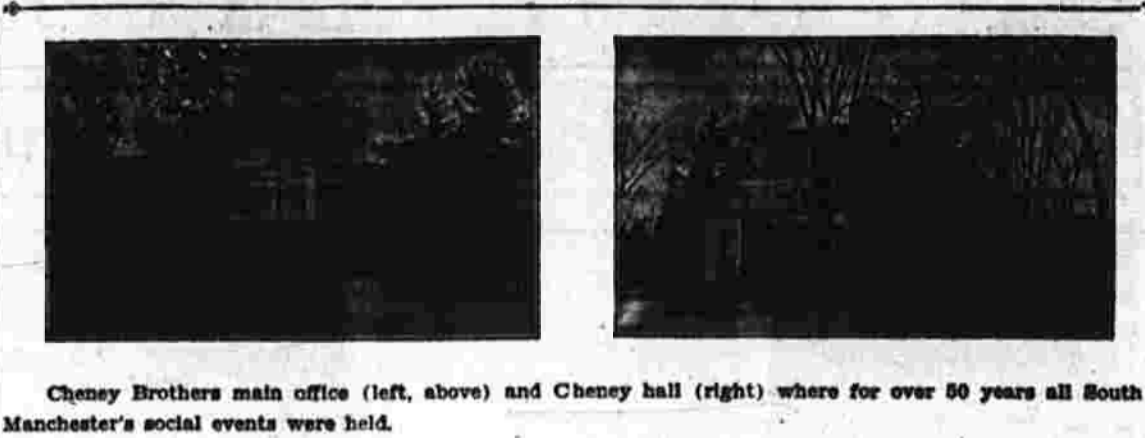
The king, having embarked on a far reaching social program, both for peasants and urban workers, has not done any vacillating over his leadership. Presumably on the theory that too many cooks don't spoil the soup any good, he has whoopingly refused to share his government for the people but not for the people.

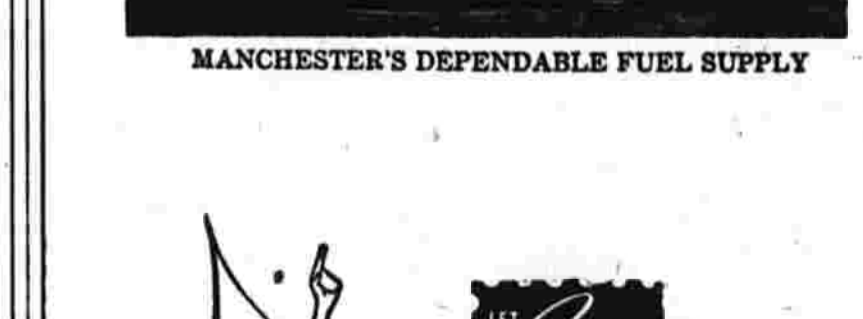

WISECRACKS OLD LIBRARIANS FIND

Many 'Snappy Combacks' In 20 Century Usage Coined By Authors Of Long Ago.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 15.—(AP)—"Out to Jonathan," snapped a power character created by Author John Byron 165 years ago and thereby was born that "modern" wisecrack "route to you."

University of Buffalo librarians have found that Sir Walter Raleigh advised telling "it to the Marines" 168 years ago.

The origins of these and 148 other "snappy combacks" in 20th century usage will go on exhibition Thursday at the University in the form of marked first editions in which they first appeared in print.

Called by Shakespeare as "to tell the world," William Shakespeare declared 213 years ago in measure for measure.

"The game is up," Shakespeare wrote in Cymbeline. He coined "Laugh yourselves into stitches" in Twelfth Night and complained that things were "Not so hot" in Winter's Tale more than three centuries ago.

The little French lawyer by Beaumont and Fletcher has one foot in the grave 211 years ago.

A woman mentioned in Fanny by Philip James Bailey in 1861 had "beauty but skin deep" and 152 years ago a wife was first called "my better half" by Sir Philip Sidney in Arcadia.

"I'm an angel" wrote William Thackeray in Vanity Fair about 1848. Little dreaming he was writing a movie title for use almost a century later.

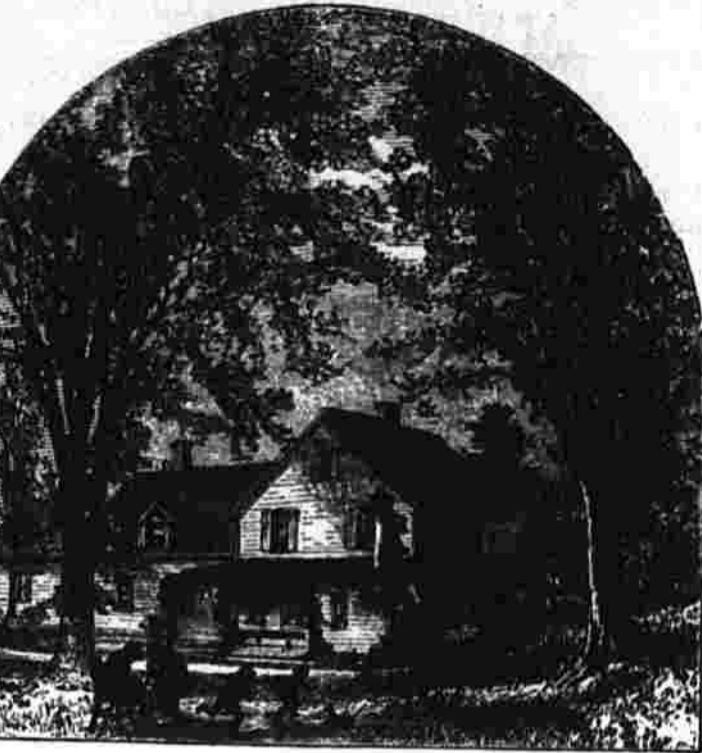

PARENTS PUNISHED ON NEGLECT CHARGE

Children Taken From Home After Investigation By Social Agencies

Town officials today were taking steps for the commitment to some state institution of the three Meronovitch children, ordered taken from their parents, temporarily at least, by town and state welfare workers who had yesterday completed an investigation of the living conditions of the Meronovitch family, which had resided in a small dwelling at 38 Hillside street.

In Town Court last night, both parents, Nicholas Meronovitch, 25, and Emma Meronovitch, 28, were presented on charges of neglecting their children. The pair was found guilty of the charges by Judge Harold W. Garrity, who sentenced Meronovitch to 30 days in jail. His wife was fined \$25 and costs and was given a suspended 30 day jail sentence. The two appealed, and bonds were fixed at \$500.

State and local welfare agents who had yesterday completed an investigation of the living conditions of the Meronovitch family, which had resided in a small dwelling at 38 Hillside street, found that, in the four room dwelling, the two bedrooms, in addition to the father, mother, and two children, was also accommodation for two boarders.

One of the children, one year old, has been removed to the hospital suffering from a bad rupture. It was said. In the house there is no electricity, water, or other conveniences, and Mrs. Meronovitch said that she carried water, and used her sister's electric equipment. She affirmed that her children had not been permitted to take a pet chicken to bed with him on several occasions.

It was stated by investigators that the parents could afford much better care for their children, as they now own two dwellings and hold a \$1,500 mortgage on a third. In the course of investigation, it was brought out that Meronovitch had
