Oct. 16, 1935—AFL, at its annual convention, turned down John L. Lewis's proposal that all workers in each mass-produc-tion industry be organized into one big union. Nov. 9, 1935—Lewis, and some other labor leaders who liked his idea, formed the Commit-tee for Industrial Organization to carry it out. Sept. 5, 1936—AFL, after an unsuc-

cessful attempt to force CIO to disband, suspended the AFL unions that had joined CIO. . 11, 1937—AFL's convention in Denver gave its executive council authority to expel the "rebel" unions, and the council did so shortly afterward. . 14, 1938-CIO met in a constitutional convention at Pittsburgh, where it adopted its new name and formed a "permanent" organization.

Both groups have grown since the split. AFL claims 3,623,087 memers. Chairman Lewis told the 500 delegates at Pittsburgh that CIO has 4,037,877. His figure included 250,000 members of the International Ladies Garment Workers, which decided on the eve of the convention not to join the other members of the Committee for Industrial Organization in forming the Congress of Industrial Organi-zations. 
