POPE TAKES PART IN MASS OPENING DEVOTIONAL WEEK

Pontiff Carried Into Chapel In Chair And Sits Alone In Sacristy To Hear Ser- mons Of Meditation.

Vatican City, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The ailing Pope Pius took part in special prayers in the chapel of his official apartment this morning, opening a week of spiritual devotions at the Vatican.

The pontiff, who yesterday addressed an audience of pilgrims after walking to the throne from his sedan chair, was carried into the chapel in a chair.

He prayed with cardinals and other prelates for a half hour before the service was suspended for 30 minutes to resume at 11:30.

The Pope, as he did yesterday, sat alone in the sacristy of the chapel where he could hear the Jesuit Father De Giovanni deliver two brief sermons of meditation.

Not visible to cardinals.

The pontiff, however, was not visible to the cardinals and prelates of his ecclesiastical court who attended the service.

These annual spiritual exercises were instituted by the Pope in an encyclical in the early years of his reign as an example to the clergy to be assiduous in prayer, Vatican authorities said.

Although audiences ordinarily are suspended during the week of spiritual exercises, they added, the Pope again showed his unwillingness to rest.

He decided, Vatican officials said, to receive a group of newly-weds in audience Wednesday.

The Pope got out of bed after his physician, Dr. Annini Milani, paid a morning visit and found his condition satisfactory.

Passed Quiet Night

Monday the Pope passed the night fairly quietly.

About 4 a. m. he was propped up in bed with pillows so that he could breathe more easily.

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At 8 a. m. he was helped to an arm chair where, after prayers, he devoted attention for a time to the spiritual exercises begun.

The Pope's physicians indicated that the injections which were administered after Friday's attack had been suspended, although Dr. Milani continues to visit his patient several times a day.

On Liquid Diet

The pontiff still is on a liquid diet and drinks small amounts of coffee.

Members of his household said he received few persons besides officials.

TWO MICHIGAN MEN KIDNAPED BY FUGITIVES

Abducted By Gunmen Fight- ing Way Across State In Attempt To Elude Cordon Of State Police, Sheriffs.

Few Paw, Mich., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Two gunmen who dived from a State police car and kidnaped three men early this morning, eluded a highway blockade by state police and apparently are back-tracking their way into Litchfield.

The men abducted by the fugitives, Henry Matty, 45, a Vicksburg, Mich., farmer, Claude Menzies, 24, a gas station attendant near Vicksburg, and Louis H. Kerr, of South Bend, were released at Griffith, Ind., shortly before noon today.

Few Paw, Mich., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Two Michigan men were abducted today by gunmen fighting their way across the southern part of the state in an attempt to elude a cordon of state police and sheriff's officers.

The chase began shortly after 10 p. m. when a state police car near Vicksburg, Mich., was stopped by the gunmen.

The fugitives, who were armed with pistols and shotguns, were reported to have been seen near Vicksburg.

Plan To Train Civilian Pilots For Air Defense

New York, Nov. 28.—(AP)—A plan for training 100,000 civilian pilots and 125,000 mechanics at government expense during the next five years to buttress the national defense is being considered by the Army Air Corps.

The more promising graduates would be offered the opportunity of continuing their training—learning to fly, instrument flying and engine mechanics—on the Army Air Corps' flight schools.

Among 35,000 persons hold "student" flying licenses now. About 5,000 mechanics are enrolled in Army Air Corps schools. The two groups would be trained under the plan.

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VISIT TO ROME MAY START BIG EUROPEAN PACT

Chamberlain Hopes By Personal Contact With Duce To Set In Motion Negotia- tion For Broad Accord.

London, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The government announced tonight that Prime Minister Chamberlain will visit Rome during the first half of January to confer with Premier Mussolini in furtherance of Chamberlain's European appeasement policy.

Informing the press, Chamberlain said he would be accompanied by the prime minister as decided by the cabinet.
