## ASSERTS PRIMARY PURPOSE IGNORED

### Wolverton Accuses TVA Of Overlooking Congressional Edict On Building Dam.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Representative Wolverton (R., N.Y.) accused the Tennessee Valley Authority today of "overlooking" what he called a congressional edict that forbids dam construction primarily for production of power.

Sherman M. Woodward, chief of TVA's water control section, had just told the TVA investigating committee the dam had been built for flood control and navigation.

Reading a section of the TVA act requiring that a dam be constructed to develop maximum primary power, Wolverton asked, "Why didn't you follow the edict of the law?"

"I don't understand that it means include power," Woodward replied. "The law says it should include power."

"It seems to me," Wolverton commented, "TVA is anxious to develop maximum primary power. You have overlooked the fact that the original act required the dam be built for power."

The congressman submitted estimates that reservoirs to be created by the dam would result in an annual crop production worth \$1,200,000.

Not familiar With Estimate.

Woodward said he was not familiar with the estimate. He contended that TVA was trying to construct the Tennessee Valley from flood and to prevent damage to the Mississippi valley as well. The latter, he said, was more fertile and had a "tremendously greater" crop yield.

"That's a brand new use," Wolverton snapped. "I never understood that before. You are justifying the destruction of Tennessee valley lands to save more valuable lands in the Mississippi valley."

## SUGGESTS DUAL PATENT POLICY AS POSSIBILITY

### Arnold Believes Government Might Work Out Plan For Different Treatment Of Large And Small Business

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Assistant Attorney General Thurman Arnold suggested today that the government might work out a dual patent policy to provide different treatment for large and small business.

He advanced the possibility in questioning William E. Knudsen, president of General Motors Corporation, who told the Federal Monopoly Committee that the proposed patent law given invention is more valuable to small than to large business units.

Knudsen said that even if the patent laws were abolished General Motors would continue its research program but, under questioning, observed that small manufacturers would be greatly handicapped if they could not protect their monopolies.

Exercises No Monopoly

He asserted General Motors exercises no monopoly on its patented inventions. Other witnesses before the Committee have brought out one of the chief reasons for the small manufacturer for continued economic existence, on the other hand, is the right of monopoly over his patented inventions.

Senator O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.), committee chairman, asked Knudsen what would happen to General Motors if some one made a revolutionary invention which would take out one point.

## WOMAN NAMED FEDERAL GRAND JURY FOREMAN

Hartford, Dec. 6.—(AP)—For the first time in the history of the United States District Court in Connecticut, a woman was appointed foreman of a Federal Grand Jury here today, marking the opening of the December term of United States Court.

Paris, Dec. 6.—(AP)—France and Germany today signed an accord, widely termed a "war renunciation pact," which pledged amicable discussion of difficulties instead of resorting to force.

The agreement declared the two governments recognized as definite the present boundaries between them and that no French-German territorial question exists.

It said the governments were convinced "pacific relations and good neighborliness" between them constitute an essential element of "consolidation of the European situation" and the maintenance of general peace.

## 14 MINERS DIE, MANY INJURED IN NOVA SCOTIA

### String Of 26 Cars Carrying 250 Workers Breaks Loose And Plunges Out Of Control Into Wall.

Sydney, Nova Scotia, Dec. 6.—(Canadian Press)—Fourteen men were known to have been killed and many others seriously injured today in Nova Scotia's worst coal mine disaster in 20 years.

Fourteen bodies had been brought to the surface two hours after a string of 26 mine cars carrying 250 workers broke loose and plunged out of control down a mile-long incline into the wall of the main shaft. It was feared, however, that other bodies remained in the wreckage at the bottom of the shaft.

The tragedy occurred in the Prince Colliery of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company as a shift was riding down the shaft.

Rescue Cable Snaps

A haulage cable snapped as the string of cars, known as a string, was going down a 10 per cent grade. The cars gathered momentum rapidly, but some men were able to jump in the first few seconds. Most of those escaped serious injury.

Rescue workers brought up 14 bodies and returned to the pit. They said it was impossible yet to follow the cars who leaped at the end of the wreckage of the mine shafts took the lead in rescue work.

Survivors said that some men in the wildly plunging race, seeking to follow the cars who leaped at the start, stood up and were decapitated.

## JAPANESE OCCUPY IMPORTANT PORT

### Strengthen Hold On Canton By Action In Taking Possession Of Kongmoon

Hongkong, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Japanese troops today occupied an important treaty port 35 miles northwest of the Portuguese colony of Macao, further strengthening their hold on Canton.

They previously had occupied Kowloon, to the north of Kongmoon, and were reported moving southward toward Sunwei, Kwangtung province, where a town of many thousands of Chinese.

Kongmoon, which was proclaimed a treaty port in 1842, was said to be the 21st treaty port to be occupied by the Japanese during the 18 months of hostilities.

Marital Law In Effect

Marital law now is in effect in the entire Chungshan district with thousands of refugees pouring into Macao. It was believed the Japanese, having captured their military occupation to the very borders of the British colony of Hongkong, intended to do the same for the Portuguese colony across the broad Canton river.
