





Memel, Lithuania, Dec. 14.—(AP)

—Preliminary tabulation of Sunday's Parliament election indicated today that Germans had gained but one seat from Lithuanians begite a strong "Back to the Reich" campaign which gave voting the flavor of a piebiscite on the question of rejoining Germany.

Fleas are carriers of the disease. A carrier flea may infect the person or animal it bites.

TONE ASKS EMPLOYERS TO SUBMIT RECORDS

State Labor Head Claims This Results In Slowing Down Idle Insurance Payments. Hartford, Dec. 14.—Commissio Joseph M. Tone of the State Depart-ment of Labor today asked Con-

necticut employers subject to ti unemployment compensation law to submit immediately certain neces-sary records when they lay off or discharge workers, or when workers earn less than their benefit rate eccording to law. A number of employers, the com-itasioner explained, are failing to give employes who are being sever-ed from payrolls, "unemployment notices" which show among other data, the reason for separation, and which applicants must present when which applicants must present when they make claims for job insurance

Duplicate "unemployment notices" must be sent to the unemployment compensation division of the Labor Department, he emphasized. This, numerous employers are also neglecting to do.

Furthermore, he said, not all employers are submitting to local offices of the employment service, the "low earnings reports" which must be sent in upon request when workers earn less than their benefit rates. In such event, duplicates must be given to workers before they can make claims for partial benefits. Duplicate "unemployment notices" benefits.
