Investigators Push Inquiries Into Reports Coster Help-

ed Finance South American War And Assisted In Smuggling Arms To Spain Violating Neutrality Act. New York, Dec. 17 .- (AP)-Still more sensational disclosures of the incredible web of international finan-

cial intrigue spun by F. Donald Coster, the wizard whose magic falled him, were forecast today with ten him, were forecast today with ten investigations seeking to unravel the tangled skein.

The breath-taking developments yesterday, climaxed when Coster ended his two-lives-in-one by firing a builet into his brain, indicated that the suspected milking of the \$87,000,000 McKesson & Robbins Drug Company of \$18,000,000 in assets was only one of his many far-flung extra-legal activities.

Investigators pushed inquiries into reports that Coster, really Philip Musica, an Italian-born immigrant and ex-convict, had, as head of the world's third largest wholesale drug concern, helped finance one South American war and assisted in smuggling arms to Spain in violation of the Neutrality Act.
