WPA OUTLOOK

A story came to us a day or two ago from what we believe to be an entirely credible source, about a WPA worker. It is not a funny story or an almost funny story, like so many about the WPA.

This WPA worker, it appears, lives in the western part of Manchester. His job is in the Campmeeting Woods. He had over-slept and had to be late. So he called a taxi, by phone. He had to stop on the way at a garage store to buy a quart. So the taxi man charged him 75 cents for the trip. The quart may have cost anywhere from \$1.50 to \$2.00, probably more.

We warned you this wasn't a funny story. It might be a bit diverting, with its unspoken implications, if it were altogether unique. But there are any number of WPA stories—and some of them are unfortunately true—that make about as much sense as this one.

There are so many of them and the effect has been to so seriously discredit the WPA idea that there are more people prepared to see the WPA through overhead altogether, some than there are prepared to see it continue until 1940.

It is a matter of wide notoriety that on any number of WPA projects the workers do not work with any proper spirit; on any number of WPA jobs the men who do something like a fair day's work would like to be regarded as a "bummer" on any number of the money paid for labor in what is called a "bummer" industry.

Unfortunately we hear nothing about the WPA projects where the employees turn in a fair equivalent in honest work for every dollar they receive. We know, of course, that there are such projects. But scarcely anyone knows whether there are ten times as many who make-believe, spy snoopers who are ten times as numerous as the worthy ones.

However, it is something to think very seriously about, this probability that the WPA is on its way out. Because if that agency does disappear and nothing better arises to take its place we are going to be up against tragedy.

Something will have to be done about both the classes affected by the not improbable passing of the WPA—the tax-and-bottle type of beneficiary and the worker who wants to deliver a fair day's work for his stipend home and support his family on it, or do the best he can to ward supporting it.

There is a considerable element which believes, or affects to believe, that the WPA problem could be solved if the federal government would just turn over to the state the money it now expends through the WPA and put the responsibility for the care of all present WPA beneficiaries on those units.

We wish we could believe the answer were as simple as that; we should be but in advocacy of it. But when one reflects that even now local authorities are very largely responsible for the setting up of WPA projects, and for the management and intelligence—or lack of it—there would seem to be some cause for doubt as to the sure worth of such a solution. Much of the reluctance of many WPA beneficiaries is directly traceable to the reluctance of communities to provide their shares in materials, or the cost of more personnel. This state control proposal doesn't appear to provide for any change in that direction.

Nor will many thinking people have too much confidence that

WATER SOURCES AMONG BEST OF STATE'S ASSETS

Connecticut Got Early Xmas Present In Abundant, Soft Supply Free From Troublesome Minerals.

Among the many natural assets of Connecticut which are a source of pride to the people of the State, the State Publicity Commission and the Chambers of Commerce to make Connecticut their home are the State's water resources.

When Nature's Christmas presents are being doled out many long people who are fortunate to have a pure source of water supply, it is not necessary to send water through extensive treatment processes before it can be made fit for industrial use.

With only two or three exceptions, which are in small villages where water is secured in a limestone region or from deep wells in rock, the State's water is soft. The water supply is abundant and pure, and is unpolluted by sewage or industrial wastes. It is free from iron and manganese, and is free from troubles of the public health.

The work of the public water supply system in keeping the water clean and free from disease-carrying bacteria also helps the water from the industrial standpoint, since pure water serves to lessen the corrosive quality of the water.

Use of water in manufacturing processes in Connecticut is large and it is estimated that only about one out of each 100 gallons sent out through the public supply mains is actually consumed by human beings. The balance is utilized industrially.

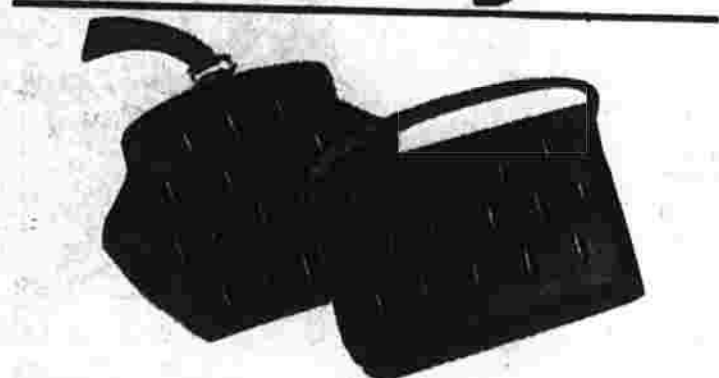
