

HEAVY SEAS DELAY ARRIVAL OF PLANE SINKING SURVIVORS

Eso Baytown Not Expected At New York Until After 4 O'Clock This Afternoon; Drop Search For Missing.

New York, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Buffeted by heavy seas, the tanker Esso Baytown moved slowly up the coast toward New York today with the 10 survivors of Saturday's 10-hour siege of horror occasioned when the Bermuda-bound Imperial flying boat Cavalier sank with the loss of three lives, after completing about half of its trip.

The high seas and strong winds delayed the arrival of the rescue vessel more than 12 hours.

Originally scheduled to dock early this morning, the Esso Baytown reduced the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, its owner, that it would probably not arrive until after 4 o'clock this afternoon.

To Abandon Search
Meanwhile, Commander John S. Boyton of the Coast Guard cutter, which was to take relative and official down the bay to meet the rescue ship and escort it to its North river pier.

Police officers, two police emergency squads and two ambulances were ordered to stand by when the survivors arrived.

To Be Sent to Hospital.
All the survivors, it was said, were in good health.

HEALTH PLAN SENT SOLONS BY ROOSEVELT

Report Prepared By Committee Named In 1935, Includes Proposal For Compulsory Insurance.

Washington, Jan. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt submitted to Congress for "careful study" today a comprehensive report recommending a long-range \$200,000,000 Federal-state program to improve the nation's health.

The objective of a national health program, Mr. Roosevelt said, "is to make available in all parts of our country and for all groups of our people the scientific knowledge and skill at our command to prevent and cure for sickness and disability; to safeguard mothers, infants and children; and to offset through social insurance the loss of earnings among workers who are temporarily or permanently disabled."

The report, prepared by an Inter-Departmental Committee named in 1935, included a proposal for compulsory health insurance. The committee also recommended a program which, besides health insurance, would include a program of medical care for the aged, blind, and other groups of people who are unable to support themselves.

To Offset Earnings' Loss
Mr. Roosevelt said one of the objectives of a national health program was to "offset through social insurance the loss of earnings among workers who are temporarily or permanently disabled."

The inter-Departmental Committee report called for a program which, besides health insurance, would include a program of medical care for the aged, blind, and other groups of people who are unable to support themselves.

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CIVILIAN EVACUATION OF BARCELONA RULED; AMERICANS TO LEAVE

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8 VESSELS IN DISTRESS DURING ATLANTIC GALES

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CHARGE GUESSES ON RELIEF FIGURE

Administration Supporters Assert Precipitate In WPA If Cut Approved.

Washington, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Administration supporters charged today that Congressional opponents of the relief bill were "precipitate" in their proposals to cut the WPA.

The statements were contained in a report by Senator McKellar, D-Tenn., a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

McKellar was a member of the committee's minority which held out for the \$775,000,000 which President Roosevelt recommended to Congress as necessary to carry the WPA from February 7 to June 30.

Commenting on a committee proposal that WPA rolls could not be cut more than 5 per cent in February and March, he asserted that the smaller sum was certain to result in a sharp cut April 1, so that they would average only 1,000,000 persons in June.

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Loyalists Proclaim 'State Of War' Throughout Government Spain In Last Stand Defense Of Capital; Rebel Armies Within 15 Miles Of City On Coast.

Madrid, France (At the Spanish Front), Jan. 23.—(AP)—The Spanish government today ordered evacuation of the civilian population of Barcelona and proclaimed a "state of war"—or martial law—throughout government Spain in its last stand defense of the capital.

Insurgent armies drove to within about 15 miles of Barcelona on the coast, and inland outposts reported advances.

The cabinet of Government Premier Juan Negrin declared that the ministers themselves would remain in the capital.

The nearest insurgent army had pushed past Sitges, about 15 miles southwest of Barcelona, and was about to enter the city.

Generalissimo Franco's armies pressed on persistently in the campaign to take the great coastal city, which became the capital after the government moved from Madrid and then from Valencia to escape the insurgent menace.
