General Grant: Soldier Who Fought for Peace

RUGGED Ulysses S. Grant spent Yet Grant fought consistently for peace. As a matter of fact, he revealed in his memoirs that he never liked service in the army. that he did not want to go to West Point, that it was only under his father's orders that he enrolled. Grant hated the Mexican War.

said frankly afterward that he felt it was an unjust cause. The Civil War found him in retirement, working in a Galens, Ill., leather store. But his belief in the Union cause this time was well fixed. So the man whom the army had ed-ucated returned to the colors.

But he continued to fight for peace. Every action, every move he made as Union commander was calculated to bring an early end to the titanic struggle. Finally, on April 5, 1865, Grant began the peace negotiations with General Lee which were to climax at Ap-

The final truce found Grant tri-umphant in his pacific views. De-spite all manner of criticism, he permitted the Confederate soldiers to retain their horses, gave Lee rations for his famished troops, paved the way for other lenien-cies in the last hour. Hardly hed

the war ended, when he undertook a general program to make peace effective in the torm south.
