In addition, it was voted to rescind a previous Board vote which guarantees to each highway department employee a minimum of 45 hours per week, with minimum remuneration of \$22.50 weekly.

This is real money, and to effect the saving, a real slash would have to be made. But it can be made, and it is likely that the majority of the taxpayers, appraised of the facts, will demand the slash, no matter who it hits.

Twenty Extras

But these 20 extras, it seems, cannot be fired. Selectmen Richard Martin, on one occasion, sought to have them laid off. It was no go. Then an effort was made to do away with the 45 hour week guarantee. This, likewise failed. It appears that the highway department was being operated on a pure sympathy basis, and the Selectmen figured that if the highway extras were turned out of their jobs, they would have to seek direct relief from the town and the public cost would equal pay savings. This stand is open to question, as WPA has taken in a lot of unemployed, and moreover, even if direct relief were to be afforded, it would not be a net saving, as the town would be paying out in salaries to the extra 20 employees.

Half Action

The unnecessary expense growth of the highway department is the fault of the Board of Selectmen, who, even now, faced with a serious taxing question, and diminishing appropriations, cannot bring themselves to really attack the question at stake, but are content to play off side with half way measures. Why temporize with a \$3,200 economy when the taxpayers can be given an expenditure reduction of \$19,000?

General Grant: Soldier Who Fought for Peace

RUGGED Ulysses S. Grant spent most of his life as a soldier. Yet Grant fought consistently for peace. As a matter of fact, he revealed in his memoirs that he never liked service in the army, that he did not want to go to West Point, that it was only under his father's orders that he enrolled.

Grant hated the Mexican War, said frankly afterward that he felt it was an unjust cause. The Civil War found him in retirement, working in a Galena, Ill., leather store. But his belief in the Union cause this time was well fixed. So the man whom the army had educated returned to the colors.

But he continued to fight for peace. Every action, every move he made as Union commander was calculated to bring an early end to the titanic struggle. Finally, on April 5, 1865, Grant began the peace negotiations with General Lee which were to climax at Appomattox.

The final truce found Grant triumphant in his pacific views. Despite all manner of criticism, he permitted the Confederate soldiers to retain their horses, gave Lee rations for his famished troops, paved the way for other leniencies in the last hour. Hardly had the war ended, when he undertook a general program to make peace effective in the torn south.
