In Chicago former President Hoover told the Council on Foreign Relations last night that Mr. Roosevelt has been advancing on an unprecedented expansion of foreign policy which might lead to war. He appealed to Congress to "have this adventure clarified before we go blindly into great increases in armament."

The Republicans proposed three stipulations to foreign sales: That the United States have priority use to all new devices and new developments, that it have the right to cancel any contract if it became apparent the sales would injure the United States, and that all sales be for cash.

The President told the committee

The President told the committee frankly, members said later, that this country intended to help the democracies of Europe build up their defenses against threats of totalitarian aggression by selling them war planes and supplies.

New York, Feb. 2—(AP)—Twenty persons were held today for trial as Treasury agents questioned scores in their attempts to smash the "most vicious gang of narcotics peddlers in America."

The suspects were rounded up by 40 "T-men" yesterday in a spectacular raid on San Juan Hill, an area adjoining west 62nd street described by agents as a tunnel-infested refuge for criminals rivaling 19th century Chinatown.

With drawn pistols, the Treasury agents flushed their prisoners from black underground catacombs linking a dozen abandoned tenements.

Maj. Gariand Williams, district supervisor of the Treasury agents, said 12 men—all Negroes—had been arrested on charges of selling narcotics illegally. He disclosed eight other suspects had been picked up during the week.
