

He assumed charge of the protectorate's fereign affairs, "especially the protection of its subjects in foreign countries," and accorded it one ruprementative accredited to the German government with the title of minister.

The protectorate was assured military protection, although allowed its own "formations" for "safeguarding domestic security and order." Germany took direction over communications — including postal indegraph and telephone service—and transportation.

The decree linked the protectorate to the contents territory of the German Reich" and put it under German "sustons covereignty."

It made the German Reichsunsfir and the German Caschoslevak crosse legal lander, at least temporarily.






