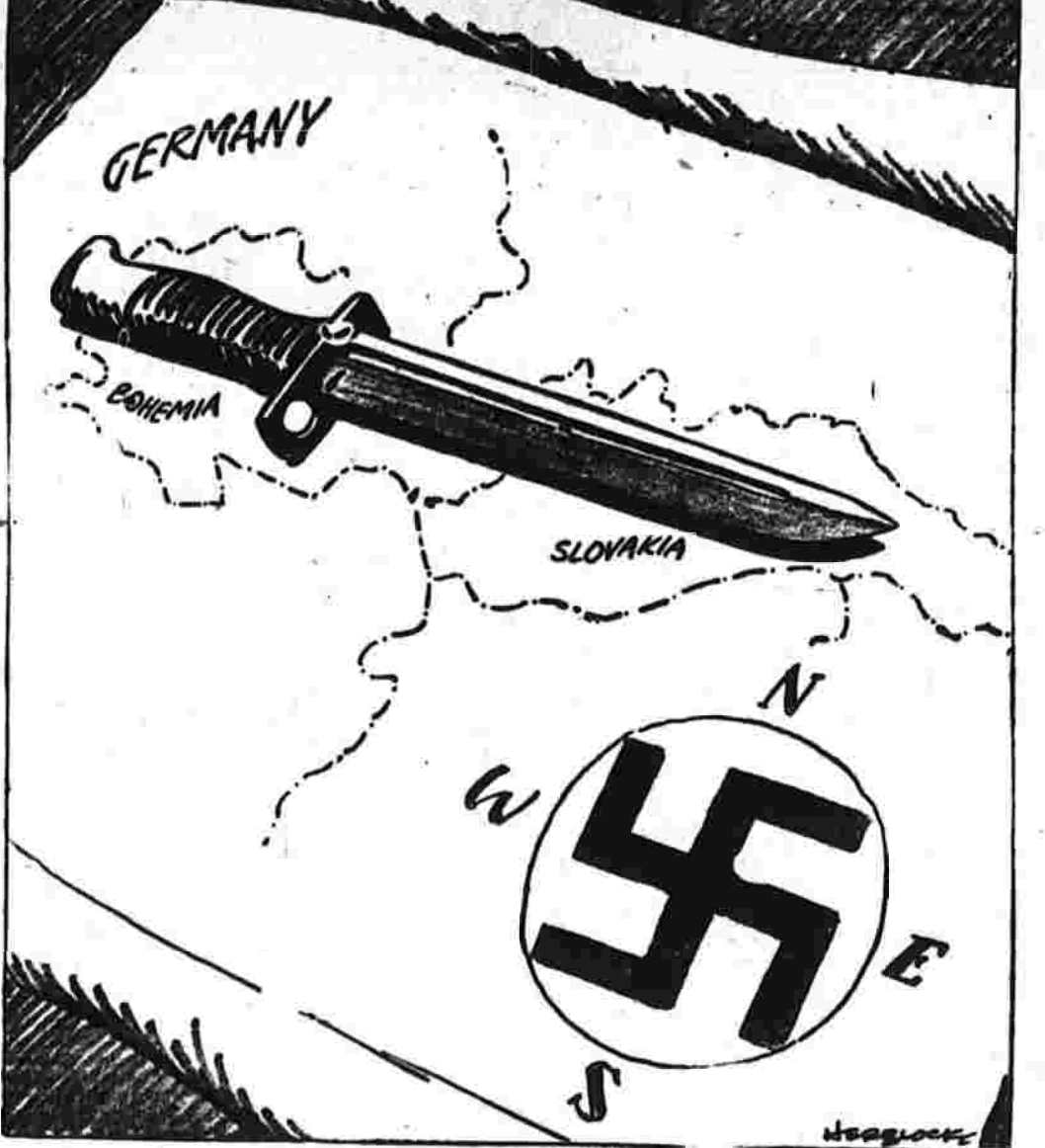

When Given The Slovaks, Hitler Takes The Czechs

CZECHOSLOVAKIA'S founders tried to unite thirty, sober Czechs with gay, dreamy Slovaks. Their languages differ only slightly. But in Austria-Hungary, Czechs had been under Austrian rule and Slovaks under Hungarian rule, and they were far apart politically. Their American kinsmen helped create the new country and agreed, in the famous Pittsburgh pact signed in 1918, that the Czechs should take the Slovaks speak their own language, have their own schools and run their own local government.

The world war peace-makers then drew the new nation's frontiers in such a way, inevitably, as to include many German, Ukrainian and other peoples as well as Czechs and Slovaks. In that form, despite internal friction, the country lasted 20 years. Then Reichsfuehrer Hitler started to redraw the map. Germany, Poland and Hungary took about a third of Czechoslovakia's territory. And in the shape Hitler left the little country last fall, it lived less than six months.

## DAVID HONDLOR DIES; ROCKVILLE PUBLISHER

### Succumbs to Heart Ailment at Age of 74; At Head of Rockville Journal For Past Thirty Years.

David L. Hondlor, 74, publisher of the Rockville Journal for 30 years, died at his home at 30 Elm Street on Friday afternoon, March 15, 1939. He was afflicted with a heart ailment which had been in poor health for the past two years, but had lately improved in his home only three months. Mr. Hondlor was born in Brookwood, N. Y., January 1, 1865, and as a young man worked in printing offices in New York and Brooklyn. For a time he was employed on the staff of the Journal. He came to Rockville in 1907 to become publisher of the Rockville Journal, and in 1908 he was elected to the position of publisher and a short time thereafter became proprietor of the paper. He was editor for a number of years, and was known and respected in his profession. He was having a rare sense of humor. He was a member of the American Legion, the Exeter Lodge No. 42, I.O.O.F., and the Modern Woodmen of America, of which he was secretary at the time of his death. He was a member of the Union Congregational Church and was a former president of the Men's Union of the church. He was a Republican and for many years a member of the Board of Education. He was greatly interested in dramatics and had coached many players for church groups and other organizations, including the Hospital Players. He was married twice, his first wife being Mrs. Maude L. Hondlor, widow of Arthur A. Hondlor, who died in 1910. His second wife, Mrs. Anna Marie Hondlor, died in 1915.
