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BADWIN PROPOSES FUNDAMENTAL LAW CHANGES ON JOBS

In Dramatic Address Before Joint Convention of Assembly Governor Urges Settlement For Problem.

State Capitol, Hartford, March 25.—Gov. Raymond E. Baldwin proposed today an amendment to the constitution to write into "our fundamental law" the general proposal to bar legislators from patronage posts.

The governor asserted that both chambers recognized "the principle" of the measure were adopted and that the measure would be a "great step" toward the solution of the problem.

TOLL BRIDGE PROJECT

It is just about impossible to see any reason why the Connecticut General Assembly, as well as the people of the towns and cities most immediately affected, should not favorably respond to the latest proposed plan for financing the greatly needed and desired new bridge over the Connecticut cut at Hartford.

Such public works, we have all experienced, should be paid for by those who use them. And since numerous bridges, costing a total sum far beyond the present capacity of other state or its community to meet, must be built within a comparatively few years, the time to adopt the toll bridge plan is now.

There are tremendous amounts of private capital in this country seeking safe investment and, as the nation's rapidly increasing activity in the movement of automobiles, it is not surprising that such capital has turned its thoughts to investment in primary traffic facilities—toll highways and bridges.

As we understand it, the investment people with whom the Bridge Commission has been conferring propose to build the bridge—of concrete in precise conformity to state-approved plans—maintain it, charge toll rates and approved by the state over an agreed term of years, and at the expiration of the period transfer the ownership of the property to the state.

Income would, naturally, be figured on a bank calculated to liquidate the debt within the period of private ownership and provide the best opportunity with a reasonable rate of interest on their invested balances.

Such an arrangement would leave the state, the county and the nearby municipalities of any responsibility for the financing of the project, and instead of the bridge being an added burden to the taxpayers the capital outlay would come from private sources and would be paid off over the years by the users of the structure—paying much more proportionately for the service than the nearby residents. And in the end the state would have made any investment at all.

That, in a general way, is how we understand the proposition that the Bridge Commission is soon to ask the Legislature to approve. It is possible that there may be objection from some of those who expect to make daily use of the new structure when—and if—it is built.

It is a serious question now, in view of what has happened in the past. And though Britain's experience is full, there is much to be learned from the more recent experience of the United States.

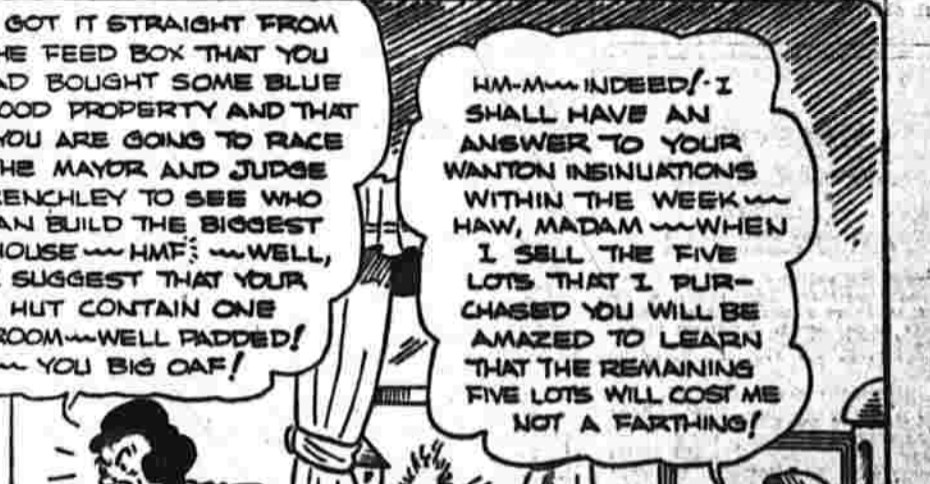

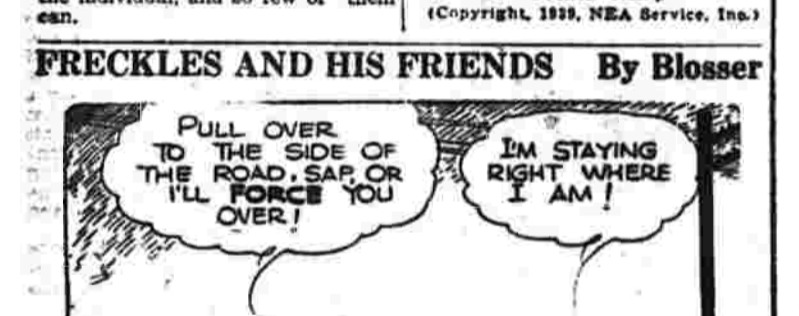
