ASKS SENATE FOR INCREASE IN WPA FUND

Pepper Attempts To Raise Appropriation To Sum Sought By FDR; Complains Of Committee Action.

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—Senator Pepper (D., Fla.) asked the Senate today to increase the \$100,000,000 relief appropriation to \$150,000,000.

The latter sum was asked by President Roosevelt, but the House approved \$100,000,000.

Pepper complained that a unanimous Senate Appropriations Committee report recommending \$100,000,000 was based on an "agreement" designed to "avoid controversy on the floor."

All session, WPA discussions have aroused controversy and Senator Adams (D., Colo.) withdrew today as believing that WPA increased its relief rolls in recent months "almost deliberately to force Congress to accede to an increased appropriation."

Agreed on Hundred Million
Administration supporters, anti-administration Democrats and Republicans generally agreed to support the \$100,000,000 allotment.

"Some might put it on ground of expediency," Senator Pepper shouted, "on the ground that we want to have no schism in our ranks."

Senator McKellar (D., Tenn.), an Appropriations Committee member, replied there was "nothing devils" about the understanding.

McKellar, who favored a \$100,000,000 appropriation, said that if the agreement had not been effected the Appropriations Committee probably would have recommended not more than \$75,000,000.

Adams, flood manager for the relief bill and a leader of Senate economy forces, made the remark about WPA "deliberately" increasing its rolls during committee hearings on the supplemental relief bill.

In the House today, there also was criticism of WPA methods.

Representative Ditter (R-Pa.), a member of the Appropriations subcommittee assigned to investigate the relief agency, prepared to offer legislation to abolish WPA and in its stead create a bi-partisan Federal board to allocate relief funds to the states.

DRIVERS' OFFICIAL CALLS SUIT 'GAG'

Says Expenses Of Current Strike Has Eaten Up Money And Assets Small.

New Haven, April 6.—(AP)—Carl Ferrin of Meriden, one of the officials of three truck drivers' union locals against which three Federal Court suits for \$800,000, said today he thought the legal action was "just a gag."

The Adley Express Company, Consolidated Motor Lines and the McCarthy freight system, affected by a drivers' strike called nearly three weeks ago, filed the suit against the locals and certain of their officers charging that the strike interfered unlawfully with interstate commerce.

"As far as we are concerned we regard it as a joke," Ferrin, a Meriden resident, said. "Our assets are very small, probably well under \$1,000, and expenses of the current strike have eaten up our money."

"Gag To Scare Drivers"

"We think the suit is just a gag to scare drivers into calling off the strike. Everyone whom I have spoken to regards it as a big joke and laugh about it."

Ferrin is president of Local 443 whose members are New Haven and Bridgeport drivers. The other locals were 671 of Hartford and 677 of Waterbury.

SYRIAN LEADER FORMS CABINET

Independent Succeeds After 24 Days Of Government Crisis, Internal Disorders

Damascus, Syria, April 6.—(AP)—The independent political leader, Nassouhi Alhoukhar, announced today he had succeeded in forming a Cabinet after 24 days of government crisis and internal disorders.

Nationalist disorders in Syria, a French mandate under the League of Nations, had disturbed French diplomatic efforts to form the southern half of a "Halt Hitler" bloc in Europe.

Turkey wants to take over the Sanjak (district) of Alexandretta, a part of the mandate, but French officials said the disorders and Cabinet crisis might lead to real trouble if they gave the northern zone to Turkey.

It was reported in Paris the French had promised Turkey eventual annexation of the district once order was re-established in return

TO URGE ARBITRATION

Boston, April 6.—(AP)—Prospects for the settlement of southern New England's truck strike appeared brighter today as owners' representatives prepared to recommend to employers arbitration of the wage dispute which carried the strike into its 19th day.

Meanwhile Joseph N. Adams, Rhode Island member of the owners' sub-negotiating committee, asserted the Massachusetts Board of Conciliation and Arbitration, with whom opposing forces conferred yesterday, was "doing more harm than good," because it would "divorce" dissenting chapters from the other two states involved in the strike.

The suggestion of arbitration, which an owners' committee agreed to recommend to employers, was an outgrowth of an all-day session yesterday at the state house.

HOUSE TABLES PLAN FOR BAN ON DUAL JOBS

Roll Call Vote On Democratic Proposal Follows Brief But Acrimonious Debate On Joint Resolution.

State Capitol, Hartford, April 6.—(AP)—The House Republican majority wrote another chapter in the history of the long-venomous dual job-holding issue today by tabling indefinitely a Democratic proposal for a joint rule imposing an "all-inclusive" ban against the acceptance of appointive offices by legislators.

The vote, taken by roll call after a brief but acrimonious debate, was 178 to 64, with 24 absent or not voting.

The proposal came before the House in the form of a joint resolution by which the Democratic Senate bloc in effect challenged the Republican majority in the lower chamber to join them in renouncing virtually all patronage jobs in the state government.

Calling Debate Futile

Acting Republican Leader E. Lea Marsh, Jr., making the first move in the battle, moved that the resolution be tabled indefinitely and asserted it was futile to debate the issue anew in view of the month-long discussions which have occupied both chambers.

WITNESS PUT LOBBY MONEY IN LAW FIRM

Williamson Says Fairfield County State's Attorney Had No Knowledge Of Source Of His Payments.

Waterbury, April 6.—(AP)—Counsel for Mayor Frank Hayes, one of 23 accused in the alleged million-dollar conspiracy against Waterbury, in the most dramatic session to date of their long trial gained an admission today from Charles E. Williamson that he put money in the city paid him for lobbying into a law firm of which Fairfield county State's Attorney Lorin W. Willis was a partner.

Williamson said Willis had no knowledge of where the money came from.

Williamson, once a potent power in Republican ranks, also admitted under cross-examination that his close political associate, Harry E. Mackenna could be described as the "Man Friday" and the "right voice" of the late J. Henry Roraback.

James D. C. Murray, Hayes' lawyer, further probing Williamson's political influence and lobbying activities, asked him why clients went to him, a Republican, instead of to Democrats for work at the 1935 and 1937 session of the General Assembly at which Democrats were powerful and demanded:

"You had something in Hartford that Dave Fitzgerald (Democratic National Committeeman David E. Fitzgerald, New Haven lawyer) didn't have?"

Williamson's only reply was "perhaps."

Put Money Into Firm

Williamson testified that in 1935 he put between \$18,000 and \$20,000 he was paid for lobbying into the law firm of Williamson, Willis, Lester and Foster of which he had been a partner for 20 years before resigning last year. Of this money \$8,000 came from the city of Waterbury, he said.

Murray asked if Williamson had told his partner, Willis that he had been paid by Waterbury and Williamson, answering negatively, said Willis did not know where "those fees and many others" came from.

SEIGN PACI ON ISLANDS

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—The United States and Great Britain have signed a 50-year agreement for the joint occupation and administration of the islands of Canton and Enderbury in the Pacific, for use as transoceanic air stations.

The agreement consisted of an exchange of notes signed by Secretary of State Hull and British Ambassador Sir Ronald Lindsay. It provides that an American company or companies may construct an airport on Canton island which will provide facilities for both British and American aircraft in return for fees to be agreed upon.

Burgos, April 6.—(AP)—Spanish Nationalist officers said today that 33 American prisoners of war interned at San Pedro de Cardenas likely would be released "very soon," but only after a formal request by the American government and delivery of the prisoners, taken in the Aragon, Jarawa, Belchite and Ebro battles while fighting with Republican international brigades, was expedited after the arrival here of H. Freeman Matthews as United States charge d'affaires.

YOUTH KILLS MOTHER IN ADJUSTING SIGHTS

Yakima, Wash., April 6.—(AP)—Fifteen-year-old Clyde Kitt wanted to be sure his rifle sights were properly adjusted in preparation for a hunting trip.

He put his 22 caliber rifle in a vice in the family garage and aimed it through an open window at a target.

The youth fired just as his mother, Mrs. Clyde Kitt, Sr., walked by. The bullet pierced her heart, killing her. Coroner R. W. H. Banks said.

DUCE REVIEWS PLANES, TROOPS NEAR ADRIATIC

Rumors Of Impending Occupation Of Albania Run Through Europe; Italy "Ready For Anything."

Rome, April 6.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini flew early this morning to the military airport of Jost, near the Adriatic seaport of Ancona, where he reviewed planes and new recruits.

The premier piloted a tri-motored bomber to the airport near a point that overlooks the sea toward Albania as rumors of an impending Italian military occupation of the little Balkan country ran through Europe.

The Fascist press proclaimed that Italy was "ready for anything at any moment" though the newspapers were silent concerning Albania.

Feature Military Talks

The newspapers, however, displayed prominently a communique saying Italian-German military talks were proceeding at Innsbruck in Germany.

It Duce appeared on a balcony at Jost after inspecting the airport and saluted the crowd but did not make a speech.

The communique announcing his visit laid no emphasis on the military phase of his trip, which struck foreign observers as important in view of the uncertain situation between Italy and Albania.

ARMY DAY PARADES ATTEST NATIONAL DEFENSE INTEREST

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—Marching men and roaring planes in Army day parades throughout the United States attested today to what President Roosevelt termed a "revival of the spirit of national defense."

The 22nd anniversary of America's entrance into the World War found the Army in its first major expansion since the post-World War I demobilization. The \$358,000,000 development program recently approved by Congress will triple the air force in the next two years and will add about 40,000 men to the regular Army's 188,000 enrollment.

Secretary Woodring, Gen. Malin Craig, Army chief of staff, and other high officials had places in a reviewing stand for the capital's parade of 20,000 troops and members of patriotic organizations. For the first time many government employees had a half holiday for the occasion.

Air Corps Demonstrates

The expanding Air Corps arranged a demonstration of new war planes at Los Angeles. Guns, tanks and other weapons and equipment were on display at scores of Army posts.

Among the capital marchers, an infantry company from nearby Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, was ordered to appear in state blue uniforms, providing an advance showing of what the American soldier of the future may look like.

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MEAN LESSON FOR PREMIER

Cautious German Diplomatic Comment Centers Of General Staff Conferences And Crisis Facing Albania

Berlin, April 6.—(AP)—Nazi officials today expressed the conviction that British Prime Minister Chamberlain's attempt to build a bloc of nations "encircling" Germany had failed as far as Poland was concerned.

They declared the British-Polish mutual assistance pact reached in London was far from what Chamberlain had desired.

Berlin, April 6.—(AP)—Cautious German diplomatic comment centered today in the implication that general staff conferences now in progress between German Col. Gen. Wilhelm Keitel and Italian Gen. Alberto Pariani, as well as the crisis in Albania, are intended "to teach Chamberlain a lesson."

One Wilhelmstrasse commentator observed:

"To threaten a leadership state is always a boomerang if he who does so is not prepared to meet a country which does not have the leadership principle."

German officialdom is well aware, official circles pointed out, that the British and French general staffs recently have been in constant touch with each other.

Reach "Important Decisions"

They said the German intelligence service had been able to ascertain that not only had general staff officers of the British and French met but also that they had "arrived at important decisions."

Germany said the meeting between Keitel and Pariani, each of whom is accompanied by technical personnel, is therefore, a counter-demonstration.

Informed quarters expressed belief that the Keitel-Pariani talks touched on the Albanian situation and said Germany would stand by Italy in any action concerning Albania. In official quarters it was

FUSS OLD TALE TO REBELLIOUS ALBANIA TRIBES

As Far Back As 1912 Big Powers Decided Independence Essential To Keep Peace In Adriatic.

The present international furor over the independence of Albania is an old story to the mountainous little land of fierce, frequently rebellious tribesmen.

As far back as 1912 the big powers decided that the independence of Albania was essential to their common interests and to keep peace in the Adriatic.

Now, however, there are fears that P. emler Musollini of Italy, either to complete his domination of the Adriatic, to ensure collection of debts over Italy or to make a gesture of defiance to the big "anti-aggression" powers and warning to small nations that might join them, may tighten the bonds already forged in 1927.

Commands Entrance To Port

The 10,629 square mile kingdom is just across the Adriatic from Italy and nestles like a violin without the finger board, between Yugoslavia and Greece.
