about Henry Clay, they will not be able to "charge" him with consistency. For the great Amer-ican statesman was anything but a standpatter. He was an change-shle as the growing nation itself and he took pride in his ability to fit his thinking to the times. He used to say, "I would rather be right than be President," and he chung-tenaciously to that principle. Clay viewed the Unit-ed States as a sort of unfolding cocook; the conditions of today would not be those of tomorrow and the logic that would be applied to one problem would not necessarily fit the next. Thus Clay justified himself on his shifting attitude toward many of the crit-He was charged with inconsist-ency in his slavery views, for in-stance. Early in his life he began to advocate the gradual emanci-pation of the slaves. Later, how-ever, he supported the fugitive alave act. This stand he justified

slave act. This stand he justified on the ground that since slaves were considered property by law, the law must be upheld.

So "Harry of the West" emerged a key figure in an age of giants, Adams, Webster, Monroe, Jackson, Calhoun, Benton. His "inconsistency" shaped him eventually as the "Great Compromiser" and thus he is remembered best in American history.
