FRANCE HOPES TO RECONCILE ALLIES' VIEWS

Foreign Ministry Said To Have Proposal In Mind To Break Deadlock In British-Soviet Negotiations.

Paris, May 16.—(AP)—France strove today to bridge the conflicting views of her two allies, Great Britain and Soviet Russia, into a strong alliance to be acceptable to all three.

Differences of Opinion On Wagner Act Heard By Medical Association.

St. Louis, May 16.—(AP)—Differences of opinion on how to give the sick the best care with state money were heard today by the American Medical Association's Committee on the Wagner Act.

The committee was appointed yesterday with the expectation of a report from it today before the House of Delegates, the legislative body of organized medicine.

Opposition to the present form of the Wagner act is being made to initiate state aid for the low-income sick was in the majority. But it was not unanimous.
