Tiger Bites British Lion

A DANGEROUSLY electrified fence was strung around the British and French concessions in Tianjin this week by the Japanese. British women and children were removed, and the British garrison was restricted. Higher than the electric tension was the diplomatic tension between Tokyo and London.


The British business men in Tianjin were virtually in a concentration camp because their government would not cooperate with Nippon. Americans there with their hands tied comparatively gently, left the U. S. cooperate with Britain, but even so they feared the blockade would "practically destroy American trade" in Tianjin.

Japanese thought it was Frank Minister Chamberlain's turn to leave in the Chinese checker game. He promised to see that ample food reached the blockaded Britons. But he would not permit any Japanese intentions before hitting back. Japan's military spokesman demanded a "new order" in Asia, but Chamberlain persisted in hoping the Tianjin trouble could be settled peacefully from outside.

At Amoy, another international settlement, a blockade, too, and the U. S. took this matter up with Tokyo.

White Man's Burden
On all sides of the globe King George VI's empire was having trouble as he returned from America. In addition to the Chinese and Central European areas, his ministers were watching.

Palestine, where 18 persons were killed by a bomb in the Haifa market, and nine non-crooked terrorists were killed by British troops and airplanes in a fight near Jericho. India, where a new subcommittee of the viceroy's council is investigating rioting caused police to fire on a mob at Calcutta; three persons died in April this year and 52,315 more there in May, 1938.

Upbeats

Agriculture—The "dust bowl" reports many of us farmers' wheat crops this year are the best since pre-drought years.

Belgium—The 1939 Yearbook of American Churches reveals a total membership of \$2,750,000, an increase of nearly a million.

Life—The 1938 U. S. death rate of 10.6 per 1,000 population, the U. S. census bureau reports, was the lowest ever recorded.

Work—Through the U. S. Employment Service, private employers hired 16,675 more persons in May than in April this year and 52,315 more there in May, 1938.

Langer Of North Dakota
To North Dakota's secretary of state, William Langer recently delivered petitions bearing 30,000 names. As a result, North Dakota will vote July 11 on a gross income tax, municipal liquor stores, and a highway construction moratorium—steps urged to make possible higher old-age pension payments.

Of the 42 states carried by Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1932, North Dakota was the only one to elect a Republican governor, Mr. Langer. He later was sentenced to prison for violating federal statutes, but was re-elected and acquitted. Last fall he lost in the U. S. Senate race. But he is in the political game.

Labor

Talk & Counter Talk
In the endless labor debate Charles F. N. NLRB counsel recently revealed that the board had decided to grant employers the right to petition for collective bargaining elections in certain cases.

John C. Gail, manufacturers' spokesman, charged NLRB has "perverted" the Wagner law and made it impossible for employers to discipline unionized employees.

Elmer F. Andrews, wage-hour chief, broadcast that "the median, least organized and the economically weakest of all wage earners are threatened by pending or proposed amendments to the wage-hour, labor-relations and social-security laws."

(1) Monetary Medicine
The Senate, however, discussed the bill to extend the New Deal's monetary power—passed previously in 1937—only after a long delay. Sen. Clyde L. Herring asserted this sort of "business democracy" is the "best democracy" in the world.

Uncle Sam's New Year

NEXT Saturday, the federal government will enter a new fiscal year. That means relief agencies need a new appropriation by then. On that same day, the old law imposing "nuisance taxes" that yield nearly \$2,000,000 a day expires. So does the act permitting the New Deal to devote the dollar, maintain a \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund and pay more than world prices for silver.

Consequently, Congress has worked faster lately on these three issues: (1) Relief, (2) taxes, (3) monetary powers.

Idea Tossing

Three tornadoes struck along the Texas-New Mexico line later, killing freshmen eight gales: a two-length twister over the Yale varsity, a half-hour later the Harvard junior varsity, and a quarter-mile twister over the Yale varsity.
