In making this decision it was noted that the company is aware that fear of unemployment has been part of the cause of the union opposition to a proposed increase to four looms per worker of the individual work load. Workers now operate but two looms.

By decision announced yesterday, the American Arbitration Board, to which the dispute over the work increase was referred, found that an increase to four looms is not unreasonable.

Today Ward Cheney asserted that the company will take immediate steps to find markets for the increased production of the work increase will entail. Thus it is possible that there will be no layoffs in the velvet department.

There is every reason to believe that this will last until November 1, as usual before the customary slackening period.
