Building America's First Railroads

LTHOUGH steam - powered A railroads were suggested in America as early as 1272, by Olier Evans, a wagon worker's apprentice, it was not until 1825, after the success of Stephenson's FLAPPER FANNY experiment in England, that in vast possibilities of steam, transortation.
The first major railroad built in the United States was the Bal-timore and Ohio, chartered in lorsepower and sails were used

at first, until Peter Cooper built and operated his famous engine, Probably the most famous race U. S. history was that of the Tom Thumb and an unidentified down and the horse won, bu Cooper had demonstrated the suand Mohawk railroad, the De Witt Clinton engine decisively defeated ts horse-drawn competitor, making the test run in almost half the required by horses.

Pennsylvania led in the construction of railroads in the first decade; by 1835 there were about 200 miles of railroad in the state. In 1840, railroad mileage in the U.S. had reached 2828 miles. From this time, railroads ex-panded rapidly. Transcontinental lines were built and by 1900 there were 192,556 miles of line in the country. An all-time peak of 254,037 miles was reached in 1916.
