





Two German scientists, Mathias Schleiden and Theodore Schwann, have been credited by many writers with discovering, in 1839, that cells are life's basic units. So a centennial celebration has been held this summer at Stanford University in Cali-

But the parentage and time of birth of a scientific discovery is hard to prove. One of the foremost celebrants at Stanford's symposium, Princeton's Dr. Edwin G. Conklin, traced the cell discovery to severa scientists several score years ahead of Schleiden and Schwann. And Yale's Dr. Ross G. Harrison went him far better by citing a reference to the cell theory in the Bible's 139th Psalm:

I will praise Thee; for I am fear-fully and wonderfully made; mar-velous are Thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well.

My substance was not hid from Thee, when I was made in secret, and curiously wrought in the lowest parts of the earth.




