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Letter Shows Auditor Fired When Indicted

O'Donnell was asked how she knew whether Bergman received the letter and she explained that it contained a return address and that it was never returned to her company.
Before Miss O'Donnell took the stand, another Kingsley company employe, Miss Kathleen Harlow, Rockwood, testified that she recalled the last salary check was paid Bergman May 1, 1938, and that it was for half-pay only because he had been on sick leave.
Miss Harlow, on the stand since Thursday, testified that Bergman was on sick leave for three weeks made out to the fugitive accountant, one dated April 14, 1938, on April 20, the same year and the remaining one May 1, 1938. Miss O'Donnell was on the stand less than an hour and was followed by Harlow, who testified that she was the Waterbury tax collector since Jan. 1, 1938 and prior to that Kingsley company employe.
The grand jury in describing the part played by Bergman said in its bulky report that he had become "an invaluable" administration of Mayor Hayes and that he had "personally" requested George H. Bergman to release Bergman from the city.
It was believed the grand jury would try to show through Clark, one of the Kingsley company accountants who worked on the installation here of a new tax collection system before leaving the city, that Bergman had the city's revenues from that time increased following his operation.
Bookkeeper Introducing Data
The data consisting of about 150 sheets showing the work of Kingsley employes, introduced through Miss Kathleen Harlow, 25-year-old woman, who testified that she was the Kingsley company bookkeeper for the last four years and that she had been in charge of the trial of Mayor Frank Hayes and of other charges with respect to the fraud this municipality of over \$200,000.
More than 200 other sheets were introduced yesterday showing the material, which brought the total of Kingsley office records introduced so far to the thousands, many relating largely to the work done by Clark.

Attorney General Murphy said that the marshals would attempt to determine whether violations of federal criminal statutes were being committed. All WPA administrators were called to Harlan, where it was reported that the chief of the strike, started last week in many sections of the country as a protest against the 100-hour requirement. Harrington said no quarrels with the strikers.
Leaders of the Workers Alliance, an organization of strike employees and the jobs, called on 1,000 WPA workers on Thursday, July 12, in a nationwide protest demonstration and work stoppage.

Right of Married Women To Work in Real Jeopardy

Kansas City, July 12.—The day's most interesting question of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Club convention is the right of married women to work in real jeopardy in the United States.
The answers:
Miss Frances Marshall, Mt. Vernon, Mo., attorney, "Definitely. Prof. fees in the fact 20 state legislatures considered this year that in some form or other restricted the right of married women to employment in the state service. Therefore, public service in some instances has attempted to set a bad example to private business."
Dr. Anna E. Capps, Charlottesville, Va.—"Locally we find married women are being pushed out of employment because of public sentiment that wives should be taken care of by their husbands. Public officials realize that many men are employed at such small salaries that they cannot support their wives."
Miss Grace Ward, Minneapolis, secretary-treasurer of a shoe-making company—"The drive against the right of married women who work has begun to be felt in Minneapolis. We find married women are being pushed out of employment although a bill aimed at married women never got out of the legislative committee in our state capital. Nevertheless, married women are being attacked and the right to work in real jeopardy."

New Spirit of Friendship Seen in Latin America

Washington, July 12.—The news of official visits to Washington by Latin American leaders has convinced Federal officials that an new spirit of friendship exists not only between the United States and Latin American republics but also between the United States and Latin American citizens themselves.

Harford, July 12.—Official responsible for the state's fiscal year 1939-40, comfort July 12 in the knowledge that reductions in expenditures by the 167 budgeted agencies of the state government have provided a \$500,000 cushion against unforeseen emergencies.
The state's fiscal year 1939-40 budget, as a precautionary measure, to cut the same appropriations for recurring expenses by five per cent so as to build up a reserve. Less than half of the amount to make increases in the full five per cent asset but a total reduction of 2 1/2 per cent in the \$10,164,677 appropriated for recurring costs was achieved.

It was understood that state department heads were well satisfied with the reductions accomplished. It was expected that many of the agencies failing to make a full five per cent cut were responsible for the shortage.

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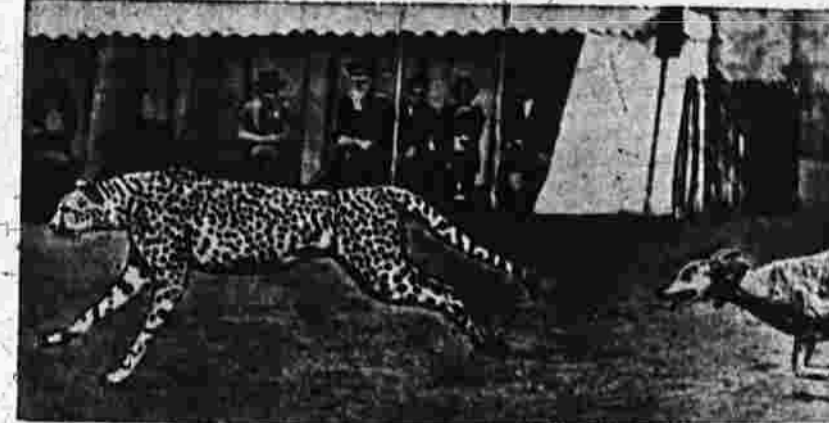

Keith Vacation To Be Resumed

Local Furniture Co. to Revive Custom; Plan Explained in Detail.

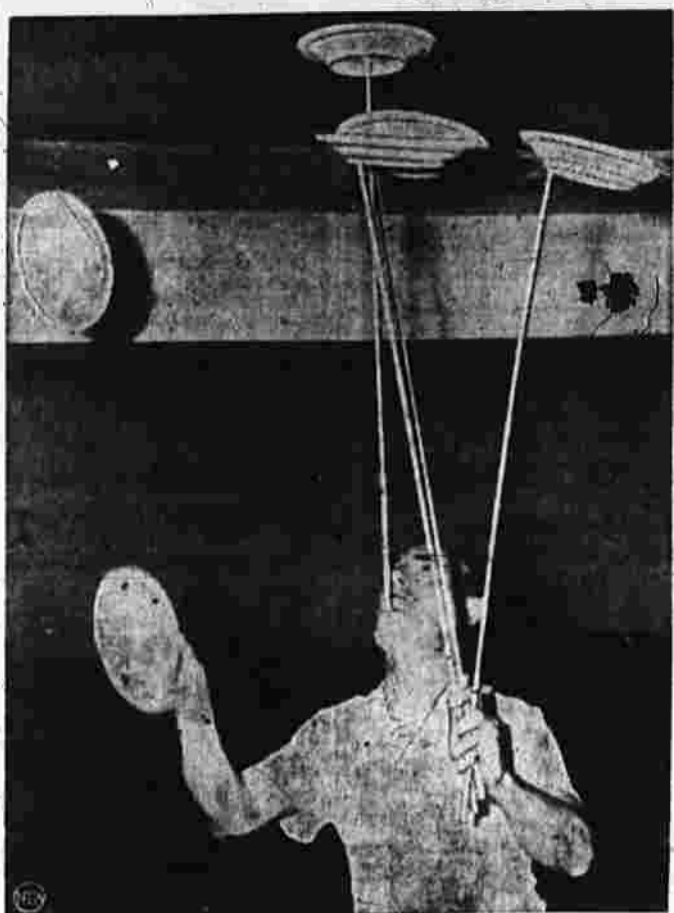

Miamians Revel In Prosperity

Miami, Fla. (AP)—Some 90,000 Miamians are reveling in this winter resort's rare periods of summer prosperity—engendered by \$5,000,000 tossed into their laps in the form of refunds by the Florida Power & Light Company on five and a half years' payments which courts recently held excessive.

Business, usually at its low ebb this time of the year after the exodus of sun-seeking winter tourists, flourished as merchants advertised "refund sales" and citizens began to spend the suddenly released money.

The average check was for \$40 although the amounts varied from one cent to several thousand dollars and rare was the person who didn't receive anything at all. The money was ordered returned when the courts ruled it was illegally collected in excessive electric rates from March, 1933, to November, 1938.

Turn Over Five to Ten Times the money will turn over five or ten times within the next month," said E. C. Bonifant, president of the First National Bank, upon which the checks were drawn. "I believe it will come as close to a 'real' period of prosperity as Miami ever has had in the middle of winter."

Finds Time Embryo Takes To Organized Structures

Paul A. Hill, Calif.—A noted embryologist, taking his test from the embryo, has recently been able to determine the stage at which an embryo changes from a mere mass of living protoplasm into an organized structure.

The speaker was Dr. Ross G. Harrison of Yale University, an authority on embryology and a leader in the study of the development of the embryo. The address was a part of the "Symposium on the Development of the Embryo" which was held at the University of Connecticut in Storrs, Conn., last week.

Dr. Harrison reported he had found the time of this critical stage in the embryo of a salamander by transplanting parts from one embryo to another at various periods of development.

During an early stage of development he cut from an embryo a part in which the eye normally develops. He grafted it to another embryo at the same stage of development, but he put it into the area of the body.

Grafted Part Keeps Growing

The grafted part kept on growing and as an eye but as a normal part of the host's body.

This established, Dr. Harrison said, that the embryo which carries certain cells to take on particular qualities and then form the various organs of the body had not yet gone to work.

But the same experiment made at a later stage of development, when the occurrence of a "blastula" and "gastrula" stage, Dr. Harrison reported, the transplanted tissue from the eye region grew right on developing as an eye on the body of the host embryo.

Alaska Timber A World Factor

Supply Chief Predicts Forest Will Be Perpetual One Now.

Seattle, Wash.—The forest chief, returning from a five-week survey of Alaskan forests, said here the territory's timber resources would be conserved perpetually and might rise to world economic importance.

F. A. Riley, chief of the U. S. Forest Service, said he told Alaskans "very plainly" that there was little chance of cutting timber in the huge Tongass forest for many years.

"When heavy cutting does begin, he predicted, it will continue perpetually because we can grow new forests in time to keep up the supply."

Of Alaska's role in the general timber picture of the future, Riley observed:

"For one thing, there still is a margin of pulp timber in the Pacific Northwest of Alaska, the Pacific Northwest including British Columbia and Alaska—and an area in the south of the United States, there are no pulp resources in the world."

"Therefore, with the complicated present situation, Alaska's timber may turn out to be an important factor in the economics of the world."

Dr. Harrison expressed satisfaction at this being able to quote that he considered a reference to the cell theory many centuries older than any cited by his colleagues in the symposium. In modern times scientists first enunciated the cell theory about 200 years ago. The Stanford symposium commemorated 100 years of development of the theory.

Tableau Presented at Convention Based on Godey's Famed Book.

Kansas City, Mo.—"There are certain evils of this day to which 17th century education would direct itself," Mrs. Norma Harrison Throver told 1,800 delegates to the convention of the National Association of Business and Professional Women's club.

"How can intelligent people at all night at cards? Some say the only danger is in excess. I tremble for those who do not tremble for themselves."

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New Bridge Cutting Cost Of Eliminating Crossings

Urbana, Ill.—A bridge which has a span of 1,000 feet is cutting the cost of eliminating grade crossings this summer.

In principle this bridge is the brother of the mythical bridge which held the world on its shoulders. The modern Atlas is squatting, knees wide apart, to make a one-piece bridge with his reinforced concrete legs. The knees are rigid; the ankles flexible.

Many of the principles of this new bridge were worked out in the testing laboratory of the University of Illinois Engineering Department.

In charge is grey-haired Frank E. Richart, research professor of engineering materials. He is one of the first figures in Big Ten education, being chairman of the Western Conference - Committee of Faculty Representatives. Assisting are Dr. V. P. Jensen, Dr. Nathan M. Newkirk and Wilbur M. Wilson.

The squatting Atlas looks like a perfectly flat concrete bridge set on vertical walls. But it is not quite what it seems. The bridge is set on the steel reinforcing rods inside the concrete floor of the bridge bents. The steel reinforcing rods inside the concrete floor of the bridge bents are extended down, through the walls on which the bridge seats.

The walls are thicker at the tops so that if the abutments were removed they would resemble knees slightly outward bowed. A few hundred tons of air which the weight of the floor presses on the bridge floor. The floor sinks a fraction of an inch.

Near the bottom of the walls are the ankles concealed from casual view by slots filled with 600-grit asphalt. The slots are cut diagonally downward, so that the walls taper near their bases, almost to a point. This narrow zone is the ankle. Bending strains coming down the wall twist these concrete ankles slightly. Crossed steel rods inside the concrete prevent breaking. The technical name for these ankles is hinges.

Without them the whole bottom of the wall would tuck slightly with the action of the knees and this would cause the bridge foundations, being chairman of the Western Conference - Committee of Faculty Representatives. Assisting are Dr. V. P. Jensen, Dr. Nathan M. Newkirk and Wilbur M. Wilson.
