REPORTS of fierce and whole-sale fighting between Rus-sians and Japanese along the Outer Mongolian frontier of Manchoukuo were confirmed this week by an AP man at the front. Showing him a thin bomb casing, Japanese declared it had contained dysentery germs and had been hurled at them by a Soviet warhurled at them by a Soviet warplane. Moscow denied this and suggested that the Japanese generals
simply were "sick" of losing battles.

True or false, neither this bacteriological-bombing tale nor the
other details of battling at the front
are half so historically significant
as what has been happening behind
the lines. There, for several years
now, both Russia and Japan have
been sowing the germs of their been sowing the germs of their clashing political philosophies.

The Two Puppets Manchoukue, recognized as a na-tion by only a few powers, is nearly thrice as big as California and conthrice as big as California and contains some of the world's finest soil and richest oil fields. Since Japan adopted this big, backward baby, Esinking has become the world's fastest growing capital. Fast, luxurious trains, on double-tracked lines, serve Hsinking and other cities. Japanese industries are moving in swiftly. Two of the world's largest water-power projects are largest water-power projects are being built. Autos and airplanes are to be manufactured in Man-

choukuo.

Outer Mongolia, nominally still
part of China although shaken
loose during the World war, is
nearly thrice as big as Manchoukuo, but less fertile and more of a


