Marriage licenses, hirth and death certificates before that date have lain about in dusty heaps in the cellars of town halls. Some were packaged and put away. Few were easily available.

In the towns where such projects exist, WPA workers first cleaned out the storage places where the certificates lay in piles, separated and classified them, pasted them on a page, and had the finished pages bound into volumes and marked. Index systems were evolved that make it possible to find out in a few minutes the exact volume and page for the required information.

Retain Permanent File mail towns, the file has been kept as well in large, lined volumes. Records of whole families can be found on a few pages, the members being recorded for birth, marriage and death. The work cards made on this project are sent to the State Genelogical Library.

The indexing of records of Common Council meetings, and in smaller towns the minutes of town meetings, have been prepared with a card system that refers to the name of the person, subject and location.

Title searchers, town officials and others interested in titles to real property are thus enabled to secure complete information in an hour or two where here had given a verdict of suicide by hanging.

An number of towns have taken advantage of the opportunity to install modern, scientific assessors records, with the assistance of skilled personnel from the Professional and Sarvice Division of WPA.







State and federal revenue stamps are now attracting the attention of American collectors. Liquer, beer and tobacco tax stamps comprise the greater portion of the collections.

Some states permit direct sales to collectors of full sets of the tax stamps but offers probable indistamps, but others prohibit indi-vidual sales, and stamps must be obtained from the stamped article. Business and documentary stamps are also included in the collections.
